During Project Design	The TA was prepared with extensive coordination with stakeholders. It is part of several project proposals on food security prepared by ADB and FAO jointly for SAARC. The project proposals were presented at several workshops held in Kathmandu, Nepal and in other SAARC member countries and also in Bangkok, Thailand. This project has been identified as a priority regional intervention by key stakeholders including country representatives, NGOs and development partners.				
During Project Implementation	Regional cooperation will foster strong partnership among all the stakeholders and beneficiaries including livestock farmers, livestock traders, veterinarians, NGOs, border control units and pharmaceutical companies. ADB brings to the table its regional cooperation and integration work, which will help in coordinating the activities across countries, sectoral ministries and other development partners. The achievements under this project will be presented at SAARC ministerial meetings and the cross-sectoral aspect of the project will be featured.				

Business Opportunities

Consulting Services	The implementation of the TA is expected to commence in March 2015. SAARC will be the implementing agency through Ministries of Agriculture and/or Livestock of SAARC member states. ADB will be the executing agency. Engagement of consulting services will follow ADBs Guidelines on the Use of Consultants. The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) will be selected by ADB through single source selection to implement the TA and deliver the required services. The FAO has the necessary expertise at global, regional, and national levels to provide technical and operational services to deliver TA activities. The FAO is the only institution qualified, with technical expertise and experience for the assignment. The FAO plays an important role in managing and coordinating development partner inputs to TAD control programs at country and regional levels. It has also been working closely with both ASEAN and SAARC in the development of regional activities for HPAI control. The FAO structure in the region provides a comparative advantage for detailed technical project implementation, with a well-established Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific in Bangkok. Its Emergency Centre for Transboundary Animal Diseases (ECTAD) can provide full technical and administrative support. The FAO representative office in each SAARC member country provides an efficient high-level link to national animal health authorities. The FAO has a significant team of technical and operational personnel in the field, and this TA can be complemented by their activities. Single-source selection is justified, as the envisaged TA tasks represent continuity of the ongoing EU-funded regional cooperation program on HPEDs being implemented by the FAO.
Procurement	The FAO will propose a team comprising 144 person-months of international and 48 person-months of national consulting services to deliver TA activities. All procurement will follow ADB's Procurement Guidelines (2013, as amended from time to time). The FAO will be paid on a time-based contract basis. The RSU in Kathmandu, Nepal will implement the project activities. A project steering committee_composed of the SAARC Secretariat, experts representing each of the participating countries, the FAO, and ADB_will be established to provide (i) overall strategic and policy directions, (ii) guidance and oversight, and (iii) implementation guidelines to the project and RSU. The FAO will (i) ensure transparency and accountability; (ii) facilitate administrative procedures; and (iii) provide legal assistance, where applicable. All disbursements under the TA will be made in accordance with the Technical Assistance Disbursement Handbook (2010, as amended from time to time). The equipment procured under the TA will be turned over to the SAARC Secretariat upon TA completion.
