An inception mission was undertaken in mid of April 2016 to review general understanding and experiences with PPP, status of legal framework and institutional responsibilities of PPP. Three main OBCs has been identified including Cruise terminal in Sihanoukville, Bulkwater supply in Bavet, and Accommodation TVET. Along the same line, two OBC workshops are planned: the first one will focus on the analysis of the business case and the structuring of the PPP arrangement, and the second one is devoted to procurement.
