Description	The TA promotes innovations for inclusiveness in social protection through application of ICT together with capacity building for national agencies implementing and monitoring social protection programs. It will support two main outputs: (i) Regional Stocktaking of ICT Utilization in Social Protection Programs; and (ii) Capacity building for DMCs on ICT4SP. Both outputs are designed to draw out best practices on ICT utilization in social protection programs delivery and share these to policy makers and government officials to bridge knowledge and capacity gaps.				
Project Rationale and Linkage to Country/Regional Strategy	The recently approved Social Protection Operational Plan (SPOP) identifies information and communication technology (ICT) use in social protection as a potential area for investments and knowledge work to support ADB developing member countries (DMCs) in strengthening social protection programs. While many DMCs have expanded their social protection programs and developed national social protection strategies, opportunities from ICT use in social protection delivery have not been fully realized in Asia and the Pacific region. Innovations in ICT have been used to improve governance and public service delivery in sectors such as education, health, and social protection. Initiatives like Information and Communication Technology for Development (ICT4D or ICTD) have shown that actively using technology can improve living conditions in societies. ICT use in social protection has for instance enhanced targeting through more effective identification of beneficiaries; and improved payment mechanisms resulting to lower transaction costs to access payments or benefits. Recent examples in the region include increasing digitalization of cash transfers in Azerbaijan, Indonesia, Pakistan and the Philippines. ICT has also played a vital role in identity management (Id-M) linked to improving governance of public social services. Evidences of efficiency gains from ICT use in social protection programs are currently available for Latin America and Africa but best practices in Asia and the Pacific is currently limited and not disseminated. Furthermore, government capacity to maximize benefits from investments in ICT for improving social protection delivery remains weak. Knowledge and capacity gaps still exist in DMCs that permeate the digital divide between developing and developed economies. Within this context, the TA intends to draw global and regional best practices on ICT utilization in the design and delivery of social protection programs through a regional study, and build institutional and administrative capacity to apply o
