A regional S-CDTA covering these two countries was proposed in order to benefit from experiences in each country and to understand common issues faced by MICs in the ANRRD sector. INDONESIA. Food and water security will be the government's key priorities for the next five years. Planned public investments in these areas include rehabilitation of three million hectares of irrigated land, and development of one millione hectares of new irrigated land. The government's recent budget reflects increased priority for the sector. At the same time, it is recognized that the current planning and delivery mechanisms have been inefficient. There is a need to strengthen institutional responsibilities, mechanisms for funding, planning, delivery, and monitoring functions that prioritize activities according to the most beneficial social and economic returns possible. ADB plans to prepare investments in flood management, irrigation and water security over the next five years. VIET NAM. Likewise, the sector remains key to the government, which has introduced a number of sector strategies and reform measures. Such reform efforts inclide the New Targeted Program for New Rural Development (NTP-NRD) in 2009 to address rural-urban inequality, increasing pollution in the rural areas, and low farm incomes. The Decision on Agriculture Restructuring in June 2013 seeks to further reform the sector based on sustainable development principles, market-based and partnership orientation to shift the government role from provider to facilitator. ADB plans to prepare investments in basic infrastructure for inclusive growth over the next three years. RESULTS-BASED LENDING IN ANRRD. In both countries, there is a growing recognition among the development partners to take a programmatic approach for the ANRRD sector to support the government's rural development initiatives. The national policies and strategies need to be adjusted and translated into a medium-term framework in light of changing circumstances to bolster the rural economy (through infrastructure services, research support, and farmer education), stimulate off-farm employment, and to promote rural-urban migration as rural productivity rises and urban economy expands. A reorientation of the medium-term ANRRD investment portfolio and medium-term expenditure framework would (i) shift the due diligence focus from the inputs delivery to outputs and outcome as the capacity of executing and implementing agencies have been improving; (ii) continue to addressing the critical rural insfrastructure constraints; and (iii) develop a mechanism to continue supporting the institutional capacity to efficiently operate and effectively maintain the created assets. From ADB's portfolio management perspective, RBL is a new financing mechanism that can reduce high transaction costs and improve disbursement peformance based on Government progress on achieving disbursement linked indicators (DLI).
