Description	The quality of procurement systems varies significantly across developing member countries (DI across sectors and agencies within each DMC. The Asian Development Bank (ADB) has been pro resources and technical assistance to support various government reform programs, and severa have managed to hurdle the first generation of public procurement reforms through the enactmer procurement laws and the establishment of relevant national institutions.
