## I. INTRODUCTION

1. The proposed knowledge and support technical assistance (TA) will improve the institutional capacity of selected Asian Development Bank (ADB) developing member countries (DMCs) to localize the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).<sup>1</sup> In response to DMC demand, the proposed TA will add value to the programs and operations of regional departments by supporting (i) the strengthening of awareness, knowledge, and skills for effective localization of the SDGs in selected DMCs; (ii) testing of innovative institutional capacity interventions for localizing SDGs in selected DMCs; and (iii) enhancing dialogue, including among developing countries, on good practices in SDG localization.<sup>2</sup>

2. The proposed TA is included in the 2017 work program of the Governance Thematic Group (GovTG).<sup>3</sup> It builds on previous knowledge activities of the GovTG, such as the conferences conducted jointly with the Development Partners Network on Decentralisation and Local Governance (DeLoG) in August 2015 and September 2016,<sup>4</sup> and the international conference on the Role of Managing for Development Results in Achieving the SDGs 2030 (June 2017).<sup>5</sup> The proposed TA also takes into account the lessons from a series of learning programs on Multi-Stakeholder Engagement for Reform in different settings.<sup>6</sup> The TA is aligned with recent ADB strategy and policy papers on public sector management, institutional performance, and capacity development, and factors in lessons from past and ongoing decentralization and local governance operations in countries such as Cambodia, the People's Republic of China (PRC), Indonesia, Nepal, and the Philippines.<sup>7</sup>

# II. ISSUES

3. In September 2015, the United Nations (UN) General Assembly adopted Agenda 2030 (Transforming Our World: The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development), which includes 17 SDGs and 169 targets, as a new reference for global development efforts. ADB supports its DMCs in achieving the SDGs through a customized approach with respect to sustainable development investments and enhanced financing needs, and by incorporating sustainability into its corporate results framework and reporting processes and enhanced financing needs.<sup>8</sup>

4. Unlike the Millennium Development Goals, which were highly centralized, the SDGs capture environmental, economic, political, and social dimensions of development more holistically. While the text of the SDGs does not contain an explicit call for localizing the SDGs, local governments are recognized directly or indirectly in many of the goals, notably in Goal 11 (Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient, and sustainable) and Goal 16 (Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all, and build effective, accountable, and inclusive institutions at all levels).

5. Subnational governments have a critical role in implementing and achieving the SDGs, including those where localization is not explicitly mentioned, because (i) the experience of developed countries suggests that as economic and population growth and urbanization increase a greater share of public investments and spending will occur at the local level; (ii) addressing global resource challenges and constraints—such as pollution, biodiversity loss, and climate change—will require close involvement of subnational governments; and (iii) subnational governments are closer to citizens and better positioned to provide opportunities for the poor and marginalized to be heard. The proposed TA will support implementation of the roadmap for localizing the SDGs developed by the Global Taskforce of Local and Regional Governments, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and UN Habitat to support cities and regions to deliver the 2030 agenda; roadmap development included an intensive consultation process (footnote 1).<sup>9</sup>

6. Many DMCs lack the institutional capacity to localize the SDGs, and institutional strengthening is needed with respect to: (i) multilevel governance systems defined by national governments (i.e., related to functional assignments, intergovernmental fiscal relations, and national–subnational development plan integration); (ii) subnational governmental processes, to ensure that regulations, planning and budgeting processes; service delivery mechanisms; and infrastructure investments are responsive to SDG goals; and (iii) transparent and participatory multi-stakeholder engagement processes involving local governments and parliaments, citizens, and the private sector to ensure accountability on SDG target achievement, drawing on adequate national and subnational monitoring systems.

# III. THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

# A. Impact and Outcome

7. The TA is aligned with the following impact: performance of institutions in DMCs for localizing Agenda 2030 commitments for sustainable development improved. The TA will have the following outcome: institutional capacity of selected DMCs to localize the SDGs improved.<sup>10</sup>

# B. Outputs, Methods, and Activities

8. The proposed TA will support three key outputs, which are designed to respond flexibly to various potential DMC institutional strengthening needs for localizing the SDGs (para. 6). The ultimate support areas under the TA will be determined through consultations with regional

departments and DMCs. The TA can support the localizing of any of the SDGs, but the highest demand is expected to be for the service delivery- and infrastructure-related SDGs, as well as for goals related to sustainable cities, the environment, and climate action.

9. **Output 1:** Awareness, knowledge, and skills for effective localization of the Sustainable Development Goals in selected developing member countries strengthened. Under output 1, at least three customized regional or country-specific learning programs will be developed and conducted, focusing on the awareness, knowledge, and skills needed to localize the SDGs. At least 150 local stakeholders, preferably involved in ADB projects, will participate in the programs by December 2019. An existing program on Multi-Stakeholder Engagement for Reform developed by ADB and tested through ADB staff training since 2007 will be customized to better respond to SDG implementation challenges. The program teaches critical skills—such as understanding stakeholders and their underlying interests and power relations— in support of collective action in complex multi-stakeholder settings. The TA will respond to a request by the Pacific Department to implement a customized version of the Multi-Stakeholder Engagement for Reform learning program for participants involved in the Improving Quality of Basic Education Project in the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the Federated States of Micronesia.

10. **Output 2: Innovative institutional capacity interventions for localizing the Sustainable Development Goals in selected developing member countries tested.** Under output 2, at least two subprojects that respond to any of the various institutional strengthening needs (para. 6) will be identified in close cooperation with regional departments and DMCs, and be implemented by March 2020. Subprojects that present challenges in the form of high institutional complexity, innovation or learning potential will be prioritized, with findings disseminated to DMC decision makers and ADB programs and operations. One subproject will support the Institute for SDGs at Tsinghua University in cooperation with the UNDP office in the PRC to support testing of an innovative approach to integrating the SDGs into local 5-year plans in up to two cities in the PRC. At least two knowledge products will be published on the ADB website by June 2020, with careful consideration given to the needs of the relevant target groups, including possible use of social media and digital approaches.

11. **Output 3: Dialogue on effective localization of the Sustainable Development Goals enhanced.** The TA will enhance dialogue, including among developing countries, by identifying and documenting good practices and by bringing together DMC representatives at the global and regional levels to share their experiences in localizing the SDGs. The GovTG will hold a knowledge-sharing seminar in a DMC and an international seminar on Localizing Agenda 2030 for Sustainable Development in Manila, preferably in close cooperation with the DeLoG,<sup>11</sup> the Development Assistance Committee Network on Governance of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development,<sup>12</sup> and UNDP. The events will be based on a review of good practices from the region. The event documentation will be posted on k-learn, Development Asia, and the GovTG website.

# C. Cost and Financing

12. The TA is estimated to cost \$1,000,000, which will be financed on a grant basis by the ADB Technical Assistance Special Fund (TASF 6).<sup>13</sup> The key expenditure items are listed in Appendix 2.

## D. Implementation Arrangements

13. ADB will be the executing agency and will administer the TA. The GovTG Secretariat under the Sustainable Development and Climate Change Department will lead implementation. The GovTG Secretariat will support (i) workshop preparation, implementation, and evaluation; (ii) subproject identification, design, and implementation; and (iii) training and conferences.<sup>14</sup> The TA will be implemented in close coordination with the ADB Results Management and Aid Effectiveness Division in the Strategy and Policy Department and through the ADB-wide SDG coordination mechanism. The GovTG Committee will serve as the steering group for TA implementation, monitoring, and reporting. The TA will be implemented from October 2017 to September 2020. All activities will be coordinated closely with regional departments and relevant DMC stakeholders and will be designed to add value to country, sector and thematic operational priorities in at least three regional departments. The TA will finance consulting services, reports and other knowledge products, and workshops and conferences. For output 2, a call for subproject proposals from operational departments for up to \$225,000 will be issued on ADB Today once the TA is approved. Selection of subproject proposals will be conducted by the GovTG secretariat in close consultation with the GovTG Committee based on criteria such as operational relevance, linkages to country partnership strategies, degree of institutional complexity, innovation, and learning potential.

14. The TA will be implemented in cooperation with partner organizations, such as the DeLoG, the Development Assistance Committee Network on Governance of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, the Open Government Partnership, UNDP, and relevant country and regional institutions.

15. The TA will support cross-sector and -thematic work by coordinating closely with relevant sector and thematic groups, particularly through ongoing SDG-related TA projects.<sup>15</sup> For instance, the Education Sector Group will be closely involved in the preparation of the education sector case study for the Multi-Stakeholder Engagement Program in the North Pacific, and the Urban Sector Group will be consulted on the PRC cities subproject under output 2. Cooperation with the Social Protection Thematic Group will examine issues with respect to social protection indicators and financing strategies for social protection; and cooperation with the Environment Thematic Group will emphasize pollution and loss of biodiversity.

16. **Consulting services.** ADB will select, supervise, and evaluate all consultants. The TA is estimated to require 17 person-months of international consultant and 60 person-months of national consultant services, using individual consultants with expertise in governance, public sector management, decentralization and local governance, and/or capacity and institutional development. All consultants shall be engaged following the ADB Procurement Policy (2017, as amended from time to time) and Procurement Regulations for ADB Borrowers (2017, as amended from time to time), using output-based, lump-sum out-of-pocket contracts wherever possible.<sup>16</sup> The terms of reference for consultants will be further developed when specific TA activities are undertaken.

# IV. THE PRESIDENT'S DECISION

17. The President, acting under the authority delegated by the Board, has approved the provision of technical assistance not exceeding the equivalent of \$1,000,000 on a grant basis for Strengthening Institutions for Localizing the Agenda 2030 for Sustainable Development, and hereby reports this action to the Board.
