Consequently, direct benefits to women cannot be attributed to the project, or quantified. However, electricity generated will improve the overall access to and availability of power, especially in rural and less-developed areas. This is likely to have an indirect impact in terms of participation by and productivity levels of women, especially in non-agricultural activities and sectors. In addition, access to electricity will indirectly lead to better access to infrastructure and services, thereby improving their overall development status.
