A. Links to the National Poverty Reduction Strategy and Country Partnership Strategy The project will improve water resource management, ecological restoration and environment protection in Dengzhou City, Henan Province, where the branches of Han River, a major tributary of the Yangtze River, flows through. The project will help preserve the natural environment and improve the living conditions of people residing in Dengzhou City. The project is aligned with the (i) Thirteenth Five-Year Plan of the People's Republic of China, 2016–2020; (ii) Guidelines on the Yangtze River Basin Economic Development issued by the State Council in 2014; and (iii) Yangtze River Economic Belt master plan (2016–2030) issued by the National Development and Reform Commission in 2016. The project is also aligned with (i) Asian Development Bank's (ADB) country partnership strategy for the People's Republic of China, 2016–2020; (ii) ADB's Strategy 2020 and the Midterm Review of the Strategy; and (iii) ADB's Water Operational Plan, 2011–2020.

The project is proposed as general intervention in poverty reduction. About 4.5% of beneficiaries are expected to be the poor. The project will improve the overall living conditions of the poor as well as other local residents.

The poor water supply, environmental pollution and ecological degradation are key issues for the local residents. Improving water supply, water quality and ecological environment are priority needs of the beneficiaries.</li> </ul>				
Of the 1.78 million total population of Dengzhou City, about 0.77 million people in the project area will benefit directly from the project. The remaining 1.01 million people in Dengzhou City would benefit indirectly from the project. The beneficiaries will benefit from the improved water supply and water quality, ecological restoration and environment protection supported by the project.				
The transaction technical assistance (TA) will further identify the project's beneficiaries, undertake beneficiary analysis and prioritize their needs to be addressed by the project.				
2. <b>Impact channels and expected systemic changes.</b> The project will have positive impacts through both structura and non-structural measures. The beneficiaries will benefit directly through improved water quality and water supply wastewater and garbage management, river ecological restoration, wetland construction, and afforestation for water and soil conservation. Local socio-economic conditions are expected to improve after the improvement of water and ecological conditions, bringing further indirect benefits to residents of Dengzhou City.
