Links to the National Poverty Reduction Strategy and Country Partnership Strategy  The leasing industry has been growing rapidly in People's Republic of China (PRC), ADB will provide a loan of up to \$60 million to Zhujiang Financial Leasing (ZFL) to expand its lease portfolio, majority of which are with small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) operating in the agriculture, health, education, tourism, clean energy and water sectors. The project is consistent with the country partnership strategy, 2016–2020 for the PRC, which prioritizes supporting inclusive economic growth, reducing poverty and inequality, and promoting private sector development through improving access to finance.

The leasing industry is particularly suitable for financing small and medium size enterprises (SMEs), which typically lack eligible collateral required for bank finance. SMEs face significant barriers in accessing credit from financial institutions as banks have shown a preference in lending to state-owned enterprises and larger enterprises operating in priority sectors identified in domestic industrial policy. The project will directly benefit ZFL, a fully-owned subsidiary of Guangzhou Rural Commercial Bank, and ZFL SME clients.						
2. Impact channels and expected systemic changes. ZFL's development focus is reflected not only in its geographical coverage, but also its client profiles and target sectors: agriculture, health, education, in tourism, energy, and environmental protection.
