Recognizing the need to address the issues of rural poverty and lack of proper nutrition, the Government of India, Ministry of Agriculture developed the National Action Plan for Eggs and Poultry 2022 for Doubling Farmers Incomes. The program supports the poultry sector development to push farmer livelihood diversification and income improvement as well as tackle malnutrition. ADB's country partnership strategy for India underscores these goals by committing to support the strengthening of agricultural production and private sector investment in agribusiness and value-chain networks. The project reinforces these strategies by ushering the production expansion of a major player in India's poultry sector that will lead to increased poultry contract farming by smallholders leading to increased production of poultry meat.

Suguna Foods Private Limited (Suguna) has adopted a contract farming model oriented towards small-scale farmers, many of whom belong to the landless, marginal group owning less than 2.5 acres (1 hectare) of land. The contract farmers employ 1 or 2 contractual workers, mostly family members. Suguna also employs thousands of workers for their various facilities, such as, hatcheries, feed mills and processing plants. By supporting the poultry production expansion in India, the project will boost an inclusive poultry value chain that provides employment opportunities and supports sustainable livelihoods in poor rural communities.

1. Key issues and potential beneficiaries. The 2019 ADB Basic Statistics indicates that as of 2011, 21.9% of the Indian population live below the national poverty line. The World Bank group estimated that around 270 million Indian people are poor with around 80% living in rural areas. Poverty incidence in rural areas was higher at 25% compared with 14% in urban areas. The main source of income for the rural poor includes farming activities (30%) and casual labor in farm operations (34%) such as in poultry farming. Potential beneficiaries of the project include the additional workers and contract farmers that Suguna will engage due to its expansion. 2. Impact channels and expected systemic changes. The expansion in Suguna's production will result in the building of new facilities or upgrading of existing ones thereby necessitating an increase in the workforce and contract farmer partnerships. The growth in production will likewise raise the supply of safe, healthy, affordable chicken meat in the Indian market.
