A UN Policy Brief on the impact of COVID-19 outlines that the impacts of the COVID-19 crisis are made worse for						
women and girls simply by virtue of their sex. Compounded economic impacts are felt by women and girls who are						
generally earning less, saving less, and holding insecure jobs – often working on the frontline – or living close to						
poverty. The health of women generally is adversely impacted through the reallocation of resources and priorities, including away from sexual and reproductive health services. Unpaid care work has increased, with children out-of-						
school, heightened care needs of older persons and overwhelmed health services. With restricted movement and social isolation measures, gender-based violence is increasing exponentially.

The project will ensure that no workers will be laid off during the COVID-19 crisis and that their average annual incomes are sustained. Suguna, its partner farmers and service providers will be required to comply with national				
labor laws and take measures to comply with internationally recognized core labor standards and report such				

compliance to ADB annually. The project will help ensure that affordable animal meat will continuously be available in the market.
