Progress Toward Outcome	Target for skill development centers (SDCs) for 30 SDCs have been achieved ahead of time. 110 SDCs upgraded and operational. RFPs for 15 Community Skills Parks (CSPs) have been floated. They are expected to be operationalized by end 2017/early 2018. The original target in terms of SDCs for the entire RBL (ie Government of Kerala + ADB) was 105. The ASAP secretariat, has in fact, already exceeded operationalized 121 SDCs (including 30 of which were included in the ADB program).

(i) As of 1 January 2017, 99,325 students have enrolled for the foundation training and 90,522 students have enrolled for vocational training on a cumulative basis for the period, 2012-13 to 2016-17. Of the total enrollment (foundation as well vocational courses), on average, around 55% are females and 53% are below poverty line (BPL).</li> <li>(ii) For the academic year 2015-16 alone, 25,615 students have been enrolled for foundation training. During the same academic year under the Summer Skills Program, an additional 3,750 students enrolled for training. This took the total enrollment to 29,365,which was less than the original target of 61.861.</li> <li>(iii) During the academic year of 2016-2017, 32,294 students have enrolled in the foundation course and the enrollment is still going on. ASAP will thus, exceed the 2017 target by fair margin.</li> <li>3b. MOUs have been signed with 848 higher secondary schools and 106 colleges. Foundation training has been initiated in 50% institutions. Vocational training initiated in March 2015 after their annual examinations.</li> <li>3c.
