I. THE ENSUING PROJECT

1. The ensuing East to South Coast Road Connectivity Project (ESRCP) will support the government of Timor-Leste's transport sector priorities to enhance connectivity to markets and services and its social and national development agenda, through (i) rehabilitating and upgrading about 173.7 kilometers (km) of national road sections in east and south coast areas, (ii) improving road asset management, and (iii) strengthening awareness of road safety and gender-related issues. The ESRCP is estimated to cost \$180.0 million. The Asian Development Bank (ADB) will provide financing in an amount equivalent to \$110.0 million from its ordinary capital resources and \$35.0 million from concessional loan. The government will finance \$35.0 million including taxes and duties.

II. THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

A. Justification

- 2. The proposed transaction technical assistance (TA) will help the government to prepare and implement the ESRCP, particularly on: (i) safeguards analysis and documentation; and (ii) institutional and project management capacity development. The TA will supplement another transaction TA facility (F-TRTA), the Southeast Asia Transport Project Preparatory Facility, which has already been approved. The F-TRTA will support ESRCP through recruitment of (i) consulting firm which will conduct the feasibility study and due diligence on engineering, economic and financial assessments, social and gender development, and procurement, and (ii) the individual consultants who will conduct the tasks to meet the government's urgent needs (*i.e.* biodiversity specialist, replacement cost and appraisal specialist, and procurement specialist). The individual consultants under the proposed TA will fully coordinate the work with the consulting firm under the F-TRTA. The proposed TA has been included in the country operations business plan for Timor-Leste, 2020–2022.
- 3. The proposed TA will recruit individual environmental and social safeguards consultants to undertake environmental and social safeguards studies to help the government prepare the ESRCP. More specifically, the individual consultants will (i) conduct environmental safeguards due diligence including preparation of environmental impact assessment or initial environment examination; (ii) prepare climate change assessment, and (iii) undertake social safeguards due diligence including preparation of the resettlement plan and the ethnic group development plan. Further, the TA will recruit individual consultants to help develop the capacity of the government to implement the ESRCP for such areas as (i) livelihood restoration and development, (ii) indigenous peoples assessment, (iii) financial management and accounting, and (iv) overall project management.
- 4. For the output of safeguards analysis and documentation preparation for the ESRCP, the TA consultants will carry out (i) the due diligence for existing studies for Lautem—Com and Lautem—Lospalos road sections, and (ii) the feasibility study for Lospalos —Viqueque and Viqueque—Natabora road sections (Table 1). The government has prepared initial detailed engineering design (DED), and preliminary environmental and social safeguards studies for two road sections (Lautem—Com section and Lautem—Lospalos section), which need further due diligence and design review to make the project ready for ADB financing. For the south coast road

section (Lospalos–Viqueque and Viqueque–Natabora sections), a new feasibility study is needed, while the DED for the Lospalos–Viqueque and Viqueque–Natabora section will be conducted under the existing loan (e.g. Baucau to Viqueque Highway Project) after the conduct of feasibility study.

B. Outputs and Activities

- 5. **Output 1: Safeguards analysis and documentation prepared.** The environmental and social safeguards studies will include the environmental assessment, poverty and social assessment, land acquisition and resettlement plan, stakeholder communication strategy, and consultation and community engagement plans. The ESRCP will be designed taking into consideration the following: climate change and disaster resilience, sensitive social and environmental safeguards, gender mainstreaming, the need for paying attention to the ethnic minorities issues, obtaining broad community support of impacted ethnic minority communities and documentation of the same.
- 6. **Output 2: Institutional capacity strengthened.** The institutional capacity of relevant staff under the Ministry of Public Works will be strengthened for such areas as (i) livelihood restoration and development, (ii) indigenous peoples assessment, (iii) financial management and accounting, and (iv) overall project management. Capacity building needs will be assessed, training program and on-the-job training will be planned and conducted, and reporting including the lessons learned will be prepared. Modalities of trainings and workshops will depend on the coronavirus disease pandemic situation. If limited in-country, face-to-face trainings for government officials are not feasible, it will be conducted via online.

C. Cost and Financing

- 7. The TA is estimated to cost \$ 1.0 million, which will be financed on a grant basis by ADB's Technical Assistance Special Fund (TASF 7). The key expenditure items are listed in Appendix 1.
- 8. The government will provide counterpart support in the form of counterpart staff, office accommodation, office supplies and other in-kind contributions. The government was informed that approval of the TA does not commit ADB to finance any ensuing project.

D. Implementation Arrangements

9. ADB will select, supervise, and evaluate the consultants, and procure goods. ADB will hire individual consultants to provide the consultancy services to ensure integrated project delivery.

The TA subproject include procurement of office equipment and furniture and materials for workshops. The TA will be implemented over 26 months and is expected to commence no later than October 2021.
