1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background of the Project

ADB's interim country partnership strategy 2015-2016 for Sri Lanka is closely aligned with the priorities of the Sri Lankan government and reconfirms continuing ADB assistance for the development of the transport sector particularly rural roads which are important for rural development as it provides access to commercial, health, education and other state bodies.

Integrated Road Investment Program or iRoad program also follows above strategy and includes Conventional Road Contracts (CRC) covering rural access roads including post construction performance based maintenance. The iRoad program is now in the implementation stage in Southern, Central, Sabaragamuwa, North Central, North Western Provinces and Kaluthara District in Western Province.

Project Implementing Units (PIUs) have been established at Provincial level while three Project Implementing Consultants (PICs) have been established to assist contractors in carrying out civil work contracts. PIC 3 is established to assist civil work contractors in Central, Sabaragamuwa Provinces and Kaluthara district.

There are 328 No of rural roads(1,344km) expect to be improve in Central, Sabragamuwa Provinces and Kalutara District of Western Province and this project is divided in to 18 Contract Packages. Contract packages are summarized in Table 1.1.

As per the Resettlement Framework (RF) for iRoad it is required to prepare a compliance monitoring report on a semi-annual basis and this report is prepared to fulfill this requirement. This report cover the period from July to December 2016.

Specific objectives of this project are:


- To improve the road condition between rural communities and socioeconomic centres of the Sabaragamuwa, Central Provinces and Kaluthara District of Western Province.
- To upgrade and maintain the 1,344km of rural access roads connecting rural communities to all-weather standard,
- To improve connectivity between production centres and market places and improve linkage with the other districts and provinces,
- To facilitate the increase of mobility by improving road network which link up with other provinces,
- To open up rural areas for development,
- To facilitate to generate efficiency gains by lowering the unit cost of individual producers through transport efficiency which will lead to increase their margins and profits thus making them generating another round of investments,
- To reduce rural poverty through improved access to markets and economic centers social, health, and education infrastructure and new employment opportunities.

By amplifying the benefits of the country's rural road network, the project will contribute to one of the Government of Sri Lanka's key development goals, which is to reduce all constraints for rapid economic growth and lower poverty levels in the country. It will also improve access to economic opportunities, as well as basic social, health, and education facilities.

In addition, the project will ensure that women are closely involved in the design, improvement, and maintenance of this rural access roads.

1.3 PROJECT LOCATION

There are 6 administration Districts included in this project. Those are Matale, Kandy and Nuwara Eliya Districts in Central Province, Kegalle and Ratnapura Districts in Sabaragamuwa Province and Kalutara District in Western Province.

Map1.2: Locations of 51 Nos. (194 km) roads in Matale District







Map1.3. Locations of 50 Nos. (221.0 km) roads In Kandy District


Map1.4. Locations of 43 Nos (180.0 km) roads in Nuwara Eliya District


Map1.5. Locations of 63 Nos. (217.0 km) roads in Kegalle District

Map1.6. Locations of 38 Nos (255.0 km) roads in Ratnapura District



1.5 CONSULTANCY SERVICES FOR PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION

The PIC shall monitor and ensure that all the requirements of the construction contract are adhered by the contractor. And in case of any discrepancy/ deviation the PIC shall instruct the contractor to undertake corrective action. The contracts are governed under the International Federation of Consulting Engineers (FIDIC) construction contract conditions of contract for building and engineering works designed by the employer, DB Harmonized Edition, June 2010.

Egls-CEA (JV) has been appointed as the Consultant of the project from 15th November 2015.

The duties and responsibilities of the consultants are being set out in the Terms of Reference (TOR) provided in the contract for consultant's services as follows:

- a) Oversee the activities of the Contractors during the design development and execution of the construction of the projects.
- b) Review and approve contractors' detailed designs and the cost for each civil work contract.
- c) Safeguard compliance monitoring.
- d) Project performance and monitoring survey.
- e) Prepare and implement local and overseas capacity development program for staff of implementation agency.
- f) To train counterpart staff from the client's organizations.
- g) Reporting requirements.

1.6 PURPOSE AND STRUCTURE OF THE REPORT


1.6.1 Purpose of the report

1.7 OVERVIEW OF INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORK

The Executing Agency (EA) of the iRoad Investment Program is Ministry of Higher Education and Highways (MOHEH) and the implementing Agency is the Road Development Authority (RDA) Project Implementing Consultant (PIC) for Central, Sabaragamuwa Provinces and Kalutara District of Western Province is Egis-CEA JV. PIC is headed by Team Leader assisted by Resident Engineer for each district with Assistant Resident Engineers, Construction Engineers & Technical Officers. A full time Social, Gender and Resettlement Specialist directly assist the TL on Social/ Gender and resettlement and environment aspect.

Duties of Social/Gender/Resettlement Specialist are;

1. Check and ensure detail design prepared by civil works contractors have incorporated feasible features based on the outcome from transect walks.
2. During preparation of subsequent tranche, prepare due diligence reports on 20% of randomly selected sample of roads for all ongoing projects tranches.
3. Monitor and evaluate implementation of the community participation process prescribed in the RF and recommend improvements to the participatory process to ensure broader participation of rural population in project roads formulation.
4. For rural roads require land donation, monitor the land donation process and conduct field visit on a monthly basis until land donation is finalized.
5. During construction phase, conduct monitoring of all project roads and prepare monitoring reports on a biannual basis for all project tranches.
6. During maintenance phase, conduct monitoring of all project roads and prepare monitoring report on an annual basis for all project tranches.
7. Implementing the Gender Action Plan (GAP) activities at the field level.
8. Lead the implementation of specific gender-mainstreaming activities as detailed in the GAP.
9. Monitor and report the overall implementation of relevant activities included in the GAP for all tranches on a semi-annual basis.

To carry out his duties following staff members from PIU, PIC and Contractors assisting him.




Figure 1. 2 Staff Allocation for Social Safeguard Activities in Central, Sabaragamuwa Provinces and Kalutara District of Western Province

Each district has divided to 3 packages and 18 packages are in this program. Contract packages from Central and Sabaragamuwa Provinces are commenced on 17th of December 2015, and the Kalutara district package 1 was commenced on 28th of August 2016 and package 2 and package 3 were commenced on 29th of September 2016. 

Graph 1.1 Overall Physical Progress of Central Province (As at 31 of December 2016)





3.1 HIV / AIDS prevention and Health awareness program

- Epidemiological and behavioral surveillance, complication of other health and data relevant to HIV risk.
- Health education and risk education activities, including individuals, groups and community level interventions
- Build up linkages to diagnosis and treatment of other sexually Transmitted Disease (STD)
- Public information calculates on change the unhealthy attitudes.
- Health camp to the participant's checkup diabetic, Blood pressure condition and instruct to address the issues.
- HIV prevention capacity building activities.







Mrs. Somawathi is a widow who lives at Mustpanawatte, Balangoda. She is 75 years old and her husband has died 25 years ago. Her two children have abandoned her. Her only income is monthly social service assistant and Samurdhi subsidy (Poverty Alleviation subsidy). All together 1200 rupees monthly. Her small house is situated near the Rassagala, Haramitigala road (CH13.330 of ID 31) it is situated above the road elevation and endanger after the road development.

The contractor, PIU and PIC understood the dangerous situation of her house and constructed a packed rock wall at the road side for avoid potential slip. The contractor bear the construction cost.



4. MONITORING OF SOCIAL SAFEGUARD COMPLIANCE AT FIELD LEVEL

Section 6.1 of the CPF, Section vi of RF and sub section 'C' under section of EARF explain the need of handling public grievances especially during the project implementing period of I Road program. A Three level GRM has been adopted in iRoad PIC 3 to address public complaints.

- First level is establishing a grassroots level where request suggestions are directly received and addressed by the contractor PIC and PIU representatives.
- Level two is grievances which are simple but still cannot be addressed at the grate root level. These grievances are address at the GS level GRC committee which is chaired by the GN of the area and report by the PE (PIU)
- At the level three for solve more complex grievances which cannot be address at the level 1 and 2. This GRCs are chaired by the DS of the area and reported by the PE (PIU) of the package. Any complaint received to the GRC level one decision will be taken within 3 weeks of receipt of complaint. GRC level two also take the decision within same period and convey the decision to the complained person.



Graph 4.1 Status of Establishment of Grievances Redressing Committees in Divisional Secretariat & Grama Niladhari Levels



All the grievances received are classified according to the nature. Classified grievances and the status of action taken are summarized in the table below;




Figure 4.2 Mitigating Public Complaints





Graph 4.2.1 Status of public Complaints, Suggestions and Requests – Matale District




Graph 4.2.2 Status of public Complaints, Suggestions and Requests – Kandy District




Status of Total Number of complaints solution in progress and settled complaints. – Kandy District




Graph 4.2.3 Status of public Complaints, Suggestions and Requests – Nuwara Eliya District




Status of Total Number of complaints solution in progress and settled complaints. – Nuwara Eliya District




Graph 4.2.4 Status of public Complaints, Suggestions and Requests – Kegalle District




Status of Total Number of complaints solution in progress and settled complaints. – Kegalle District



Graph 4.2.5 Status of public Complaints, Suggestions and Requests – Ratnapura District




Graph 4.2.6 Status of public Complaints, Suggestions and Requests, – Central & Sabaragamuwa Provinces and Kalutara District of Western Province






In addition, 05 contact persons are designated to submit complaint within PIU & PIC. They are




Complaint/Suggestion and Request Boxes at the work sites has been identified as one of the effective methods to share views of public in design stages and Construction stages.

5. LAND DONATION PROCESS FOR IMPROVEMENT WORKS


As per the paragraph four (4) of RF for i Road programme states that for the rural road improvements will be undertaken completely within the existing right of way (ROW) which is between 2.5m to 5.5m, however, in paragraph eight (8) it states that voluntary land donation will be used if additional strip of private land is required for the road improvement program voluntary donation of the land involve to contribution by individuals for the protect that has the community benefit including rural roads that are part of the community driven development. The basic developments as follows.

- The project benefits will realistically offer the size of lands.
- If the negotiation for voluntary lands donation fail eminent domain or other powers of the state will not be used
- A maximum of 5 % of land can be donate particularly for the voluntary households and for house hold donating lands, no physical displacement take place.

In RF Appendix 3 written information is required for the donation made by the land owner

Written information is used as follows in land donation process in PIC 3 of i Road program. This is guidance made by the PIC 1 of i Road program.

Project Directors of Central Province organized a discussion on land donation process with ADB safeguard consultant, PIC, and PIU. At this discussion three parties agreed some conclusions for face practical situation in the grassroot level. Report on this discussion has attached as **Annexure 11**

5.1 Status of Land Donation

When implementing the i Road Program in PIC 3 it was identified that some contractors are in the need of obtain additional land Strips to carry out the road improvement

Hence the project has followed following steps in Land donation process

- Disseminate the information to all relevant agencies on project information and land donation concept. Continued public awareness on Land donation among road related community through public awareness notice displayed in notice boards at community sensitive places. (Religious Centers, GN office post office or Village Centers). Made discussions the GRC meeting and focus group discussion. The public awareness notice has been developing in local language as per the guide line of Resettlement Frame work land owners have donate their pieces of land to meet the additional land requirements for the Improvement for the road in reporting period.
- Identified and verify land ownership through deeds
- Consent letter or MOU have been signed the consent letter and MOU also signed by respective GN as a proof of transparency. when it need two type of MOU has introduce by the (PIU)

Abithi Menika for Land Donation with reference to KRN 40 iROAD Central Province

Abithi Menika who is a widow, 79 years old, underwrote for Development process by bestowing her land for road construction at iROAD Central Province - Hatharaliyadda Anludeniya School to Paragoda Gonathenna Road (KRN 40). She lives in Kandayaya which belongs to Aludeniya South (376) GN division of Hatharaliyadda DS division.



Abithi Menika is one of the exceptional donors in Kandy IROAD package because; she has challenging socioeconomic circumstances since she is the only breadwinner in family. She is suffering from two children who Amaratthna Banda aged 51 years with permanent disable and other Shanthi Thennakoon 58 years with mental imbalance. Only income she received from Hatharaliyadda Divisional Secretary as allowance for elders (Pin padiya), Samurdhi and Rs. 250 public donation for her daughter called

Shanthi. Poor Abithi Menika has to watch over her helpless children without proper earnings.

Curve widening was required to road safety purposes where closer to Abithi Menika's house. Afterward one request, Abithi Menika was agreed and signed consent letter with kind smile to donate her land if number of problems she had. **Abithi Menika mentioned "Paara Hadanawanam Idamen kepunata mage akameththak Ne, Apl mereddi mewa geniyanne nane"**. Simply it says, If the road is developed, I do not have any objection to use of land. We are not going to take those when our death.

At the Money-Making world, this poor stranded widow mother and her land strip was a kind of ideal lesson to seeking out society by comparatively.







9. CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

9.1 Conclusion

This report is the Semi-Annual Report for the Social Safeguard Monitoring of June 2017 to Dec 2016 in Central, Sabaragamuwa Provinces and Kalutara District of Western Province -PIC 03. It proves steps taken by the Project Implementation Unit (PIU), Project Implementation Consultants(PIC) and Contractors for the compliance with Resettlement Framework(RF), loan conditions and Facility Administration Manual (FAM).

This report deliberates measures taken by the project management for Social Safeguards component and practical usage of Grievances Redressing Committees (GRC), Gender Action Plan (GAP), Land donation process, Plan of HIV/AIDS Prevention and Health camps and other social activities conducts by the contractor's staff as cooperate social responsibility projects.

According to the loan conditions and other relevant document previously mentioned in this report recruitment of individual consultant has completed Gender Action Plan (GAP) In Facility Administration Manual (FAM) have been complied by all the contractors. They made Gender Sensitive Designs in road designs and employ poor women from the project related areas by using awareness notices at site offices, work sites and common places of the project related areas. Furthermore, they paid equal salary for equal duties and Contractors prevent from employing child laborers.

The iRoad program of PIC03 has very efficient Grievances Redress Mechanism to mitigate public complaints. Main feature of this system is collaborating with the public administration in Grama Niladhari Division (GND) level and the Divisional Secretariat Division (DSD) level. The community in project related areas have high credibility about GRCs. It proves the amount of received requests, suggestions and complaints in reporting period. It is 735. (551 requests, 60 suggestions and 124complaints) 674 out of above 735 public complaints, requests and suggestions have completely settled. 61 out of above amount solution in progress. For mitigate public greevences, iRoad Program has established 404 of (GND) level GRCs and 74 DSD level GRCs.

Under land donation process of iRoad program of PIC03, 81No.of land strips have donated by the community in the five districts. All the process is administrated by the PIU.

Public awareness poster, Complaint/Suggestions and requests boxes are the main sources receive the public responses for the iRoad program PIC03. It has monitored by the PIC and PIU.

Social service activities(CSR) are used as a public relation promotion measure in this program. The iRoad program of PIC03 conducted two training workshops for the staff of PIU, PIC and Contractor's staff of 6 districts. Kegalle staff members have participated for this awareness program.

During the period under review PIC 3 was able to establish strong coordination with stakeholders such as provincial councils, Pradeshiya sabha, Divisional secretariats, planning division of DS office, Department of Education, Department of Police, Department of agrarian services, Provincial road Authority, Ceylon Electricity board, National water supply board and community water supply Department.

PIC 3 has given special attention on monitor the social safeguard process of project. In addition of frequent site visit of PIC and PIU officers held monthly review meeting and fortnight meeting with contractor's staff. At two meetings discussion, the process and identify the weakness of the project activities and taken remedial action by PIC other than progress meetings and provincial meetings are conducted with social and environment

team monthly (PIC PIU and contactors) **Annexure 17 & 18 - Reports of monthly meetings.** In addition, the above meeting CSD social safeguard specialist of TA 8473 made frequent meeting and field visits and supported providing guidance to improvement in quality of social safeguard component.

According to the experience of PIC 1 and PIC 3 the PIC 2 proposed to employ 6 assistance to activate the social safeguard component. Project management accept the need of appoint district level officers and recruited one social and environment assistant. Their duties are

1. Assist to social and environmental officers of contractors for implementing Environmental Management Action Plans and social Gender and Resettlement Activities Assist to Environment Specialist and to Social/Gender/Resettlement Specialist for monitoring Implementation
2. Assist to Residential Engineer with relevant to social, environmental and safety matters of the project.
3. Assist to social and environmental officers of contractors for identification of disposal sites, stock yards and to obtaining relevant approvals and license for yards and plants.
4. Monitoring Implementation of Environmental Management Action Plans, Social, Gender and Resettlement activities of the project.
5. Inspect licenses and approvals of yards and plants.
6. Participate to GRC meetings and joint field inspections for identification of social, environmental and safety issues of the project, utilities to be relocate and trees to be removed.
7. Maintain a public complaint mitigate mechanism.
8. Checking Environmental Monitoring Check lists prepared by social and environmental officers of contractors.
9. Preparation of reports on social and environmental monitoring and progress.
10. Participate to monthly progress review meetings

After the employing this staff PIC was able to carry out the social safeguard activities in a commendable manner.

9.2 Recommendation

1. Complaint Suggestion and request boxes placed Contractor's site offices, relevant Grama Niladhari Offices or Public sensitive places near the developing road is one of one channel of receiving public requests, suggestions and complaints. Although adequate awareness has been created among public about these boxes, responses for these boxes are inadequate. As a remedy for this situation can be recommend to distribute a leaflet contain the project description and contact phone numbers of the relevant officers for make complaints at the initial stage of the road development. It can be handover to the affected people during the site visits of the PIU and PIC Officers. That will be a more fruitful awareness tool.
2. PIU and PIC encourage the Contractors to employ the poor women and

- discourage the employ labor as per grid line of Loan Conditions. However certain challenges have been faced by the Contractors in employing female works for road sites. Women employers ratio in 18 work sites in 6 District is 9 % in month of December. It was observed that the customary feature in Sri Lankan Society. So, this condition need to be amend and propose to increase the women membership in level 1 and level 2 GRCs.
3. For female members in the local community, it is recommended for an awareness program to organize package level 'local community capacity building' training as a billing item (BOQ).
 - a. This training program can be activated as a family income, family food security and family cordiality development program.
 - b. Contractors also can contribute to this program as a Cooperate Social Responsibility (CSR) activity.
 4. Following needs can be proposed to improve the social safeguard component of the iRoad program.
 - a. Widen the level of monitoring.
 - b. Conduct more workshops on sharing experiences among the Social/Gender and Resettlement Specialist of PIC01 and PIC03 iRoad programs.
 - c. Need of occasional site visits of ADB safeguard coordinating consultant.
 - d. Improve the employment facilities for the social and environmental assistants.

In next social safeguard monitoring reporting period (January – June 2017), plan to carry out more social safeguard activities and to report accordingly

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An independent report on the public complaint made on 3 August, 2016 with respect to road improvement works on Road ID 70 in KE1 package, Sabaragamuwa Province.

1. Introduction

Integrated Road Investment and Development (IROAD) program in Sri Lanka is funded by a Multi-tranche Financial Facility loan from Asian Development Bank (ADB). The program is now on to its 3rd tranche and civil works in Sabaragamuwa Province which includes Ratnapura and Kegalle districts have now commenced. The civil works is carried out under the supervision of a Project Implementing Unit (PIU) under a Provincial Director (PD) and a Project Implementing Consultant (PIC) under a Team Leader (TL). The PIU is manned with an Environmental Safeguards Officer (ESO) and Social Safeguards Officer (SSO) while the PIC has an Environmental Specialist (ES) and a Social, Gender and Resettlement Specialist (SGRS) to look in to matters arising on environmental and social aspects during implementation of the project.

As per the requirements stipulated under the Environmental Assessment Review Framework (EARF) and the Resettlement Framework (RF), the Grievance Redress Committees at Grama Niladari and Divisional Secretary levels have been established. In addition to the public information notice, the PIU has also distributed an information leaflet among the residents who live within the road corridor (Annex 1). Public suggestions, requests and complaint boxes have also been placed on all the roads (including Welangalla – Nagoda road) in which civil works have commenced in Sabaragamuwa Province. All these measures were taken by PIU, PIC and contractors to maintain transparency about the project and to obtain public support for the project (including donation of small strips of land).

On 3 August, 2016 a resident in Welangalla – Nagoda road had called ADB Sri Lanka Resident Mission (SLRM) and has informed his concerns about on-going construction works along this road. He had also made several allegations against the contractor who is carrying out the construction works.

2. Purpose of this report

On receiving the complaint, ADB/SLRM requested an independent report on this incident from CSD and Safeguards Coordination Specialist (Consultant) under the TAB473. This report is prepared to fulfil the above request.

The report is based on information available in the transect walk record and Involuntary Resettlement Due Diligence Report related to this road, field observations and discussions held with a group of residents (including the person who called SLRM) who explained their concerns and suggestions for road improvement works and explanations given by Project Engineer (PE), SSO and ESO of PIU; Technical Officer of PIC and Site Engineer, Environmental Officer (EO) of Contractor at site.

3. Back ground, details and current status of the road in question.

Manyangama to Welangalla Kadamandiya is a section of Welangalla – Negoda road. This section is about 4.5 km in length and is the road section which is rehabilitated and improved under ROAD program. The road number given to this road is Road ID 70 (Kegalla). The road is located in Kegalla district within the Divisional Secretary Division of Dehiwita and passes through Viharakanda (124B), Welangalla (125A) and Rangagama (122A) Grama Niladari Divisions (GNDs). This road belongs to Provincial Road Development Authority (PRDA). Location map of the road is presented in figure 1 below.

Construction works of this road has commenced on February 2016. Contractor responsible for the improvements of this road is K.D. Ebert and Sons Holdings (Pvt) Ltd. As a PRDA road the Asphalt pavement is constructed to a width of 4.0 m. Drains and earth shoulders are also be provided. Sections of this road have been identified to get inundated and for such locations the road surface will be concreted.

Improvement to the T junction at the road start point (T junction with Panawala – Avissawella road) has already been identified jointly by PIU, PIC and contractor. And the PIU has already obtained concurrence from the land owner to the Right Hand Side (RHS) to donate a strip of land for the improvements (improve the visibility and improve the turning circle).

4. Key issues/ concerns raised at site by residents

With the request by ADB/ SLRM, the consultant informed the PIU and PIC to organize a meeting with residents of above road and to conduct a joint inspection. As such the consultant met a group of residents (attendance list is attached as annex 2); PE, SSO and ESO of PIU; Technical Officer of PIC and Site Engineer and EO of Contractor at site on 5 August 2016. During this discussion Mr. K.G. Piyal Sampath (resident) stated that he had given the call to SLRM on this issue. After the discussion a joint inspection was conducted along the full length of the road (i.e. 4.5 km from start to end).

During the discussion following key issues/ concerns were pointed by the residents;

- *To improve the T junction at road start point*

It was requested by the gathering of residents to improve the T junction at road start point. This was because at present buses and other large vehicles turning towards the road in concern faces difficulties.

- *Small cavities on the asphalt surface*

It was stated that pieces of aggregate laying over the AC surface when crushed by moving vehicles cause small cavities on the asphalt pavement. And people fear that these cavities will enlarge with time damaging the entire pavement.




Figure 3. A small cavity on the asphalt surface as shown by residents

- *Movement of construction vehicles over asphalted sections*

Two residents were in the opinion that construction vehicles should not travel on the completed asphalt surface. The reasons given by them were that it brings in dirt on to the road surface and could damage the road surface.

There was a concern of the residents on how the road base was improved, especially on the sections where the road passed through paddy lands and at places where the road was on filled soil. Their opinion was that it requires extensive excavation (up to 2 to 3 m in depth), removing and replacing the existing soil layers.

They were also questioning about the material used for sub base work. According to their opinion the material used was not to the standard.

- *Need to construct lined drains throughout the road*

Some of the public who participated in the discussion and inspection were in the opinion that the entire drain system for the road needs to be constructed as concrete drains. Their point was that walls of earth drains could get eroded due to water flow.

- *To have much wider shoulders*

Residents were concerned of having narrow shoulders at some sections of the road (shoulders less than 1.0 m in width). It was pointed out that land could be obtained from residents adjacent to these sections.

5. Independent observations and verifications made at site

As stated in the previous section a joint site inspection was carried out with the residents, representatives of PIU, PIC and contractor. Explanations and clarifications were made by PE, Site

Engineer on the issues pointed by the public. The inspection was a success as it also helped the PIU and PIC to resolve few issues which appeared from their side. These points are summarized below:

- *To improve the T junction at road start point*

PIU has already taken the consent from the land owner (Mr. K.K.S Kulasekara of No - 167/ 3, Mahagedara, Maniyangama, Awissawella) to obtain a strip of land having a width on average of 0.7 m for a length of approximately 50 m. This is to improve the T junction at road start point.

At the same point Mr. K.K.S Kulasekara informed that a gate on the property opposite the junction had been damaged by a truck of the contractor. The consultant immediately raised this matter with the contractor and he agreed to rectify the damage which will be closely monitored by SGRS of PIC, PE and SSO of PIU.

- *Need to construct lined drains throughout the road*

It was explained by PE that with the allocated amount of money for a kilometre of road construction it is not possible to provide lined drains throughout the entire length of the road. But he stated at all locations as identified and verified by PIU and PIC the contractor will construct lined drains. And for the rest of the road length there will be earth drains but the walls of the earth drains will be turfed and there will be flow velocity breakers.

The public showed few locations at which the earth drains had already been eroded. Contractor was advised to place sand bags in these locations as an immediate measure to avoid further erosion which could even damage the paved road surface. And the contractor agreed to re-construct these sections of drains as concrete drain sections.

Also at chainage 0+051 there was a need of additional land to construct a catch pit to the culvert at same location. Residents who gathered took the initiative to discuss with the land owner and to get some land for the catch pit. It was decided to have a 2 x 2 pit at this location.

Near ch. 0+190 it was observed that storm water was flowing over a residential land (In front of a premises) Due to raising of road surface. It was agreed to divert this water through a pipe line (about 10 - 15 m length) and in to the existing drainage patti.

- *Small cavities on the asphalt surface*

The contractor was advised to keep the asphalt pavement clean from debris and other inert matter. It was also explained to the public that the same contractor has to maintain the road for three years and the PIU will not take over the road unless it is completed to the satisfaction of PIC and PIU. Therefore any faults in the pavement will have to be rectified by the contractor before handing over is done.

- *Movement of construction vehicles over asphalted sections*

It was explained to the public that movement of construction vehicles over the completed surface could not be avoided due to the limitation of road width and non-availability of alternate routes. However the contractor agreed to keep the road surface clean.

- *Improvement to the road base*

It was explained by the site engineer that remedial measures have been taken at locations where road sub-base was weak. However it was stated that excavations to depths of 2 -3 m was not necessary and also could not be carried out under the present scope of work. It was also stated that the material used is tested in the laboratory and certified before use.

- *To have much wider shoulders*

The consultant reiterated that road improvement works are mainly done within the available ROW. And only at locations where it is extremely necessary that voluntary land donation will be carried out. As such few locations were identified by all parties as places where additional strip of land will be required for construction of shoulders and reducing curvature of bends (improvement to road safety) e.g. ch. 1+232 where a bend needs to be improved.

Other than these issues, the contractor also agreed to rehabilitate two common wells adjacent to the road and provide them with proper access (steps) as Community Social Responsibility (CSR) work.


6. Conclusion

Public living along Maniyangama – Nagoda road have taken a keen interest on the improvements made to their road. They wish to have the best possible road surface for their villages. Being enthusiastic they think that the contractor is not properly constructing the road and finally end up with a poor road. They did not know that the works of the contractor is monitored by a multiple set of people representing different organizations and the handover of the road is done after a detailed inspection carried out by PIU and PIC.

However after the discussion and joint site inspection they felt more comfortable with the construction work and assured their fullest cooperation to construct a good road for the village.

Consultant never the less praised the group of residents who joined to site visit and told them to continue monitoring the works of the contractor.



01. Introduction

The Rehabilitation/Improvements of 76 Km rural roads in Mathale District MA1 TROAD Project is funded by the Asian Development Bank (ADB). The area covered by the RDA/ADB/ROAD(CP)-NCB/CP-RR (MA1) road package consist of 18 numbers of roads which are belongs to the Yalawaththa, Raththota and Ukuwela Pradeshiya Shabas (PS) & Provincial Road Development Authority (PRDA). 


Figure 06 - Mr. W.A.D. Wijesooriya (Social Development Specialist - Project Implementing Advisory Unit)




Figure 07 - Mr.A.C.S.Fernando (PE) is addressing the program







Figure 10 – Invitation / Stage Banner



Attendance sheet of villagers and consent letter for a new culvert is attached herewith as Annex 01.

Request from public has been received to construct a new culvert at 8+660 of 96 Junction to Panamura Road. Project Engineer (PE), Construction Engineer (CE) & Asst. Design Engineer of Contractor visited the place where the new culvert has been requested by villagers. Officers observed that there is an existing causeway at 8+610 with small lead way.

According to the villagers, there is a heavy water flow from the hill side during the rainy days. The provided causeway is not adequate to pass the water to the downstream and houses in either side are getting flood. Because of that villagers had requested from Divisional Secretary in year 2012 to construct a cross drain across the road at 8+660. A copy of relevant letters are attached as Annex 02.

Officers observed that there is a cross drain constructed by laying two pipes across the road at 8+660 with properly excavated trenches in upstream and downstream. Contractor has proposed a box culvert for that location. CE pointed out that, it will be the most viable solution to pass the water flow properly to the downstream. PE inquired any objections from the villagers.

All the participants agreed to the decision except one villager whom land is located next to the lead way. Other villagers explained to the objector that lead way is excavated through the neighbor's land and that would not effect to the fence or the land of the objector.

CE & PE explained that decision was taken to improve the condition of the road and to the benefit of the villagers. Also, said that all the stakeholders must agree to the decision to implement that.

Villagers discussed and then all agreed to construct a culvert. Further a letter was signed by all the participants to give the consent. Attached as Annex 01. Issue related to construction of new culvert was then solved. It was decided to get the recommendation of Grama Niladhari(GN) immediately.

Then the villagers accompanied the officers to show a culvert at 8+950 location where the road should be more wider. CE monitored the location and it was decided to consider it in designing.

Then it was shown a location where the water seepage occurs and subjected to base failures. Officers inspected the location and then Contractor's Design Engineer proposed to excavate the trench properly. Further it was proposed to build a lined drain to a 30m length in the area of heavily subjected to base failures. CE instructed design engineer to implement the work.


Finally Villagers agreed with the solutions given by officers within their limitations. Then the meeting was adjourned at 17:30 Hrs.





Land Donation Procedural Framework – Integrated Road Investment Program

For the rural road development component, Voluntary Land donation is applicable for the development process. During the construction progression in the packages throughout Central province following issues were identified,

PART I

- Maximum number of Consent letters that could be received from a road. In the case of too narrow roads there are more than 20 land donations per one kilometre. To avoid the situation Common consent is suggested to get land occupants from both sides. Recommendation is needed to implement common consent process.
- If the ROW is not enough from starting to ending points means too narrow roads, land donations process required to implement from D+000 to end. Sometimes both RHS & LHS. According to RE, Shramadana Campaigns is good practice if the land occupants willing to donate their lands directly using on their resources. But it is a problem that an excavation machine is given by the contractor instead of labours. Team leader suggested that getting consent from each land occupants if Shramadana was done.

PART II

- There are some crops (paper, tea, Spices) fences at road edges that we need to remove for road widening. Community voluntary donated the lands with removing crop fences. But if it is possible to giving crop plants for them after the donation it would be more significance.

PART III

- As per the Team Leader instruction, Layout plan will be prepared by Survey team of Consultant Group to handing over Total land donations for relevant DS Offices based on our data base. Require the idea about it.

The discussion was carried out basically on three main Parts as Part I, II and III. After the Project Director's introduction, following things were highlighted.

PART I

- CSD & Safeguards Specialist from ADB, mentioned about acceptance of Common Consent from present land occupants is applicable in the case of too narrow roads (More than 20 consents per 1Km) when the requirement of road widening in land donation process. At the task, it is important to point out if there is any request from land occupants when donating their lands and receiving of GPS points at the locations. One common consent document for 1Km is appropriated.
- Shramadana Campaign should has to be done by villages before the contractor mobilization to the road as well as Giving Excavation machine instead of labours by contractor for Campaign is a problem, CSD & Safeguards Specialist from ADB noted.
- Further he highlighted that, there is no any requirement for receiving consents after the Shramadana, because it was done by villages before contractor mobilization and RP also included that, Shramadana for land donation process as community base systems. Reporting with signature sheets for Shramadana Campaigns are essential to impending requirements.
- Team Leader- PIC 3 will be informed by CSD & Safeguards Specialist from ADB on the issues of Shramadana Campaign.

PART II

- Commonly all responsible officers including Environmental specialist (CEA), Environmental officer (RDA) and CSD & Safeguards Specialist (ADB) agreed to significance of organizing CSR works for donating Economic value Crops (Paper, Tea etc.) to land donors who have donated lands including economic value crops fences.


PART III

- CSD & Safeguards Specialist (ADB) explained that Survey Plan for donated lands especially Corridor Survey is important for the process. Consent letter document plus survey plan are key documents that can be given to the relevant institutions when the requirements of land transferring process in future. Further he mentioned that including of GPS Location is essential.
- Land Surveyor (Egis- CRA) pointed out the way, which is going to be processed by him. That is, Lot will be inserted to the existing Topo Survey and making out Road Lot Numbering System to 0+000 to end. Its' reference is linked to the related consent letter.
- Project Director also agreed the discussed process.
- Project Director, CSD & Safeguards Specialist (ADB) and Land Surveyor suggested for upcoming land donations process, it is important to preparing location map for required additional strip of lands based on the Topo survey data before receiving consent letters from land occupants. It is more worth to the land donation process and it can be shown to the next ADB mission as new approach.
- For the Government Land component, it is basically land transferring. Ex: Estate, agrarian Departments, Forest etc. RDA involves informing for relevant institution by issuing official letters about additional strips of lands which required.

Other issues

- CSD & Safeguards Specialist (ADB) noted that , the requirement of RF is to carry out minimum Three Transect Walks to each selected road during construction, can be done as Join Inspection which conducted by relevant officers in three parties. SGRS from EGIS/CRA also agreed for it.





Upgrade the construction of the existing an access road for the benefit of devotees. Improvement of the access road for the temple is beneficial and useful for more no of people living in the area.


7. Participants

Introduction

Introduction of the meeting was done by ES PIC03 by explaining objective of the meeting as follows

This meeting can be use as a platform to discuss matters related to social and environmental in Sabaragamuwa Province and Kalutara District of Western Province and share the experiences of the team members. Also solution can be discuss for the problems and issues identified during the implementing construction activities.

Monitoring System and Land Donation Activities

Mr. Wakkumbura (ESD-RDA) stated the changing of monitoring system is the nature of developing sector. But there should be proper communication system for inform strongly to lower levels about the changes with the explanation. As a gap of communication, the activities of land donation process have faced unclear situation currently. Furthermore, he said the officers also haven't sound idea about the land donation process because the same thing have explained different ways in different places.

Furthermore, he stated there are not clear note about crack damages therefore need clear note for it as reporting and valuation of it.

In there ES and SGRs was thankful to ESO-RDA, and they agree with the above matter.

SGRS mentioned the TI & PD (CP) strictly stated not to hold shramadana campaigns during the discussion held with the PM of KA1. But Mr. Saranga (CSD & Safeguard Coordination Specialist - ADB) said the opposite meaning regarding shramadana campaigns. SGRS said he had not enough time to discuss above matter with him and he is preparing a report of above discussion and expect to discussed with TI for final solution.

Furthermore, he suggested to give a copy of land donation documents to land donator for inform them.

ES stated the current issue regarding Land donation process should be solve by upper level. The main issue is the things which is mentioned in documents have explained different ways in different situations, it was big issue for work to all. Therefore, expect to request in writing document of correct path with explanation step by step from ESSD and ADB.

He also stated there are 02 laws related for the project.

1. ADB guidelines and policy statements.
2. Present law of Country

As a result of combine above two laws there is a guideline prepared by RDA Social and Environment Division. In this guideline, there is clear note about land donation including crack damages. Further he stated, According to his knowledge if someone followed this guideline properly can do their role without problems. Somebody change the guideline only for their advantage it's not for the project. He explained more about that by showing examples.

Mr. Nissanka (EO-NE2) said as a result of following guideline properly their team could handover 05 roads without making issues with community.

Ms. Sandrauwari (SSO-RDA) stated if SES and TOs like to support, they haven't confident idea about the works as the some double meaning of something.

ADB Mission

ES stated in the last ADB Inspection in Central Province lot of lapses were found. In future to avoid doing same things consultants and clients levels should make decisions and will be inform Project Manager by a discussion as an action of protect this project.

He also stated the Environment and Social Section is a valuable part of the project, hence he asked to inform if they have any problems when they working with their team. Because he has seen some situations SEs and TOs was going to hit some EOs, their duties took as joke and they did not pay their attention. Furthermore, he requested Inform to PIC or PIU such problems for make a decision by taking with upper levels.

Further he instructed EOs to check and maintain their documentation side properly. Also, he requested EOs to give their support to the relevant S&EDAs for update and maintain documents in a proper manner.

Public complaints suggestion and Request.

In there Mr. Wakkumbura (SSO-RDA-SP) place Complaint Boxes and Awareness Notices in every 3Km distance.

Ms. Sandarywani instruct EOs to attend all complaints suggestions and requests and maintain clearly and separately those are without Jumble.

SGRS instructed EOs to place Awareness Notices and Complaint Boxes in community Sensitive places and also instruct to use suggested template when they prepare new complaint boxes and stated they can use existing complaints Boxes with the high privacy and protection of its and also should informed the authorized officer regarding the subject, that the time it should be open.

Furthermore, he stated that all complaints which are reported on Complaints Register should have been solved within 14 days and should have mentioned clearly the way it solved. Also, instruct EOs to maintain a log book properly.

Finally, he said that he regrets about the matters discussed in last meeting as he noticed that those were not completed during site visits.

Corporate Social Activities

SGRS stated CSR activities reporting formats filling and forwarding to PIC within 14 days is essential and it would be a chance to add value and participation of S&EDAs or him and suggested them to share the knowledge with S&EDAs.

He mentioned the EOs of KE1, KE2 and KE3 packages were followed that properly and did more fruitful CSR Activities during the last month. KE3 package has done a none Infectious Disease Clinic and it was great help for the village people.

He also stated that at least one social work should be done by each for a month. He requested to do fruitful and female friendly CSR activities in future.

SGRS showed the advantages of doing CSR Activities.

Formation of GRC, conducting GRC and reporting GRC

SGRS requested forward copies of GRC reports for PD, RE, TL and also PE and instructed to maintain GRC Reports properly at Contractor's Office with the register for GRC Reports.

Context Sensitive Designs

Ms. Sandaruwani (SSO-RDA) suggested EOs to make report regarding context sensitive designs by showing the situations of existing and after the design change.

ES stated EOs to make a presentation by identify the CSD needy situation and build-up a story through the situation.

Any other matter

Mr. Wakkumbura ESO (RDA) stated it has shown the weakness of reporting of Mr. Amerasekara (Former S&EDA.Matale). it made a situation for him to work himself. In future, should avoid doing the same things.

He requested EOs to Inform CEs and TOs to provide travelling facilities for S&EDAs as the time they can.

As there are no any other issues, the meeting was adjourned by 5.30 p.m. Next meeting will be informed in due course.

Introduction

Introduction of the meeting was done by ES PIC03 by explaining objective of the meeting as follows

This meeting can be use as a platform to discuss matters related to social and environmental in Sabaragamuwa Province and Kalutara District of Western Province and share the experiences of the team members. Also solution can be discuss for the problems and issues identified during the implementing construction activities. And ES apologized for the delay of submitting last meeting minutes.

Tree planting program

ES stated that he expects to do presentation on tree planting at next meetings and was thankful for submitting their tree planting programmes.

In addition, ES requested from all participants to come on time to the meetings as the main purpose of Social and Environment Component is human habits rehabilitation.

Also, ES stated that he expects to conduct a training programme for Environment Officers to learn how to work with community smoothly and how they should practice patience. Then SGRS stated that basically problems are depending on more than one fact therefore it's better to build up good relationship with the community without making problems and it will help in solving problems.

ES said paying attention is the best thing when working together and it is most important to TOs and SES as they work with the community more than other officers. Furthermore, ES mentioned he expect to give a chance for all EO's to do a brief presentation using their experience and own talents.

ES did a presentation about tree planting and how to protect trees. In there he explained the purpose of planting trees, value of planting trees, advantages of it and etc. After that ES asked whether they have any question regarding the presentation and not any question was asked by participants.

Furthermore, ES suggested to plan tree planting programmes by going through the knowledge they got from the presentation.

ADB Mission

ES stated that all members (PIU, PIC and Contractors) should face the ADB mission together as a one. He also mentioned that the mission is based on Social and Environment activities and everybody must prepare themselves properly to achieve the success of the mission.

Further he instructed EOs to check and maintain their documentation side properly. Also, he requested EOs to give their support to the relevant S&EDAs for update and maintain documents in a proper manner.

Also, he instructed to keep one file for each disposal yard and informed that EOs can talk with PIC and PIU in private for further clarification.

Furthermore, ES stated that they expect to visit sites with Mr. Saranga to identify lapses and correct them before ADB mission.

Public complaints suggestion and Request

In there Mr. Dissanayake (SSO-RDA-SP) instructed to EOs to try their best for satisfaction of ADB team. For that he requested from EOs to complete Complaints Register and to use complaint register as road wise.

Also, he instructed all packages to keep documents clearly and properly. Further he requested from EOs to be creative when reporting and presenting without depending on existing formats and take this as a chance to show their own talents.

SGRS stated that all complaints which are reported on Complaints Register should have been solved and should have mentioned clearly the way it solved. Also, he asked to do their role genuinely as it may save themselves automatically.

Furthermore, he said that he regret about the matters discussed in last meeting as he noticed that those were not completed during site visits.

He instructed again to place Complaint Boxes and Awareness Notices in every 3Km distance to mention relevant change on it and to use suggested template for prepare Complaint Boxes which can be easily prove and monitor the relevant locations.

SGRS also instructed to S&EDAs to fill and forward Social activities checklist for every road in every month end. Further he stated that he expects to make a report after every road visit for send to the RE & PD.

ES instructed to the EOs, if a client or a consultant solves a complaint there should be a written document received by complainer proving that they are satisfied about that solution.

He acknowledged that if a complaint receive over the phone, try to make it written and if unable to write in that situation or the complaint is simple (eg. watering against the dust) no need to waste time to take it in written. But asked not to reply over the phone regarding serious complaints such as culverts and design changes.

He clearly mentioned that if complaint can solve in contractor's level take immediate actions to solve it and inform to PIC and PIU. If can't it should be send to PIC and PIU.

Corporate Social Activities

SGRS stated CSR activities reporting formats filling and forwarding to PIC is essential and he was thankful to EOs of KE1, KE2 and KE3 packages for following that properly. He mentioned KE3 package has done a none infectious Disease Clinic and it was great help for the village people. He also stated that at least one social work should be done by each for a month. He requested Contractors of Kalutara and Sabaragamuwa to do fruitful and female friendly CSR activities in future. For Example, sewing classes, shoe making classes.

SGRS showed the advantages of doing CSR Activities.

Formation of GRC, conducting GRC and reporting GRC

SGRS requested forward copies of GRC reports for PD, RE, TL and also PE.

Land Donation Activities

SSO - Sabaragamuwa stated contractors should contact relevant Grama Niladhari and Economics Development Officers for land donation process. It is essential for participation of PIU and PIC.

Further he stated that KE2 and KE3 packages have followed correct path for land donation process and instructed other packages to follow the same.

ES stated that land donation process should be discussed in Progress Review Meetings and Key Staff Meeting. He asked to inform ESO, SSO (RDA), ES and SGR when the time informing RE until finalized the process.

Also, he stated that providing machineries for shramadana campaign of land donation is prohibited.

Any other matter

SSO (WP) stated sharing experience and documents among the same level is most effective way when working as a group and she suggested that KE2 and KE3 package EOs should participate for the next meetings for sharing experience. ES stated that take action to inform them officially to participate next meetings.

As there are no any other issues, the meeting was adjourned by 12.00 p.m. Next meeting will be informed in due course.



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
