#### I. THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE SUBPROJECT

#### A. Overall Progress of the Technical Assistance Cluster

1. The knowledge and support technical assistance (TA) cluster Asian Development Outlook (ADO) 2022–2024 was approved by the President on 19 November 2021 to support the preparation of the flagship publication—the ADO—for 3 years. The TA cluster has three subprojects and is financed by the Asian Development Bank (ADB), on a grant basis, from its TA funding program. It was identified as one of the Economic Research and Regional Cooperation Department's (ERCD) corporate priority TAs. The first subproject was approved on 25 November 2021 and is scheduled for completion on 31 December 2023. Most of the activities under subproject 1 have been completed including the successful launch and dissemination of *ADO 2022, ADO 2022 Update*, and the July 2022 issue of the *ADO Supplement*. The outreach activities to disseminate the key messages of the *ADO 2022, ADO Supplement, July 2022, and ADO 2019 Update* were well-covered in top tier international media and carried on international newswires. The subproject has also financed initial activities for the next ADO cycle. As of 10 October 2022, about 62% of the subproject's funds have been committed and 41% disbursed.<sup>1</sup>

#### B. Subproject Outcome

2. The TA will have the following outcome: ADO content informs policy discussions by ADB and officials from developing member economies, views of the public, and analysis of researchers.<sup>2</sup> The subproject will contribute to the outcome of the overall TA cluster by producing flagship knowledge products that provide views on the macroeconomic prospects for all the 46 developing member economies and insights into the economic issues these economies face. The subproject will produce these outputs to guide ADB operational decisions and provide timely and relevant insights to policymakers, ADB staff and shareholders, and researchers.

#### C. Subproject Outputs, Methods, and Activities

Output 1: ADO reports disseminated in 2023. ERCD produces four issues of ADO per 3. year-one in April, another in September, and two short supplements in July and December. The TA subproject will support the production of these reports in 2023 through the following activities: (i) preparing background analytical papers following the 2-year rolling research plan, (ii) further developing and refining analytical methods, (iii) drafting of ADO content, (iv) editing economic content and manuscripts, (v) preparing and laying out of materials for publication, and (vi) disseminating key results and policy messages. The publications will be widely disseminated in collaboration with ADB's Department of Communications (DOC) and participating resident missions. Lessons learned from the implementation of the previous TA cluster-such as further coordination with DOC to include better metrics for measuring the impact and reach of ADO, improving the dissemination of the ADO, and other lessons-will be considered during the implementation of the subproject. The TA will continue to use online platforms for disseminating ADO reports, as the previous TA cluster has found online means effective in reaching a wider audience that includes policymakers. This will complement in-person international launches, as well as presentations cohosted by ADB development partners within and outside developing Asia, which has resumed in 2022. Outreach will include discussions of the issues in partnership with

academic institutions and think tanks. The ADO publications will be disseminated as electronic files on the ADB website<sup>3</sup> and sent via DOC's targeted mailing list. However, as printed copies are still in demand from Management and outside researchers, ERCD will print a limited number (about 100) in compliance with the Administrative Order on Energy, Environment, Health, and Safety Management System.<sup>4</sup> Printing of the ADO switched to print on demand in 2017. The TA subproject will support Output 1 of the overall TA cluster.

With its comprehensive analysis of evolving macroeconomic advances and emerging 4. development challenges in the region, the ADO plays an important part in supporting ADB in strengthening its role as a knowledge institution. The ADO supports the knowledge and operational work of the regional departments. As ADB President Asakawa noted in his closing remarks at the June 2022 Board-Management Retreat, "ADB needs to strengthen macroeconomic surveillance and diagnostics including scenario analysis to become the region's knowledge leader." Country chapters monitor the latest economic developments and near-term outlook toward developing appropriate policy recommendations for ensuring macroeconomic stability. The country chapters and the regional outlook section of the ADO 2023 will provide a general discussion of issues including the coronavirus disease's (COVID-19) continuing impact and the challenges in fostering post-COVID recoveries, the Russian invasion of Ukraine and its spillovers on global commodity prices, impacts of the more aggressive tightening by the US Federal Reserve and other central banks, and implications of the zero-COVID policy of the People's Republic of China on the region. Further, the chapters' policy challenge sections will include analysis of key obstacles to inclusive economic growth such as (i) factors preventing productive employment generation, (ii) human development constraints, (iii) gender and other socioeconomic barriers, (iv) spatial and geographical limitations, (v) institutional and policy weaknesses, and (vi) factors preventing expansion of social protection programs. The thematic chapters will tackle important development challenges facing developing Asia.

5. Developing Asia is vulnerable to climate change and is accelerating its transition towards net zero emissions. The transition to net zero calls for a profound transformation of economic systems; emitting sectors play a large role in Asia's economy. Asia also faces increasing demand for infrastructure, energy, and goods as the region continues to move up the income ladder. The theme chapter will conceptually outline the socioeconomic impacts of developing Asia's mitigation policies, and simulate associated economic and social benefits and costs under different transition scenarios. The chapter will present evidence and case studies to show growth opportunities in investment, consumption, and trade, social co-benefits, as well as challenges during the net zero transition. To ensure the transition is timely as well as economically and socially friendly, this chapter reviews existing mitigation policies and proposes policy advice to facilitate a timely and just transition in developing Asia.

6. The ADO 2023 Update theme chapter will discuss Asia's preparedness to deal with public health emergencies—health situations where the scale and timing can potentially overwhelm capabilities to address them. The COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the limitations of healthcare infrastructure to adequately cushion the impact of public health emergencies on health and economic outcomes. Investment in health emergency and disaster risk management preparedness, which includes a full range of prevention, mitigation, and recovery protocols to avoid spending heavily when a crisis hits, is therefore required. The chapter will delve into how

adequate the region's public health infrastructure and delivery systems have been to deal with health emergencies, and explore ways to improve the systems' capabilities to handle such emergencies. It will provide a comparative study on existing states of public health infrastructure and healthcare delivery systems in the region and explore workable designs to reform them.

7. **Output 2: Background papers disseminated.** To provide a solid empirical and analytical foundation for ADO content, the subproject will commission background research papers to supplement Macroeconomics Research Division (ERMR) research on selected thematic topics by analyzing issues and policy implications for developing Asia. The TA team will organize workshops and seminars focusing on the thematic chapters to strengthen ADO content, and will invite distinguished researchers to discuss initial drafts of the background papers to improve the analytical rigor and policy relevance of the thematic chapters. These will be posted as background papers when the ADO reports are launched, and may be consolidated in edited research volumes to provide researchers with more extensive analyses related to the thematic topics. The research volumes may be co-published with a reputable publishing house, which could entail a buyback arrangement. Background papers will also be published on the ADB website. The papers may also be published as working papers or journal articles, as appropriate. The TA subproject will support Output 2 of the overall TA cluster.

#### D. Subproject Cost and Financing

8. The TA subproject financing amount is \$1,000,000 which will be financed on a grant basis by ADB's Technical Assistance Special Fund (TASF-7 for \$500,000 and TASF-other sources for \$500,000). The key expenditure items are listed in Appendix 2.

#### E. Subproject Implementation Arrangements

9. ADB will administer the TA. ERMR will directly handle TA subproject administration and supervision, management of consultants, procurement, and accomplishment of outputs. Adopting the One ADB approach in knowledge solutions, ERMR will continue to collaborate with regional departments, including resident missions; other knowledge departments; and relevant sector and thematic groups on subproject activities. To ensure continuous support to the 2-year rolling research plan which will enhance the quality of ADB's flagship publications, the subproject may finance engagement of experts and activities for the succeeding ADOs.

11. Consulting services. Individual consultants and resource persons will be recruited through individual consultant selection or framework agreements wherein shortlisted consultants may be hired as needed for the duration of the agreement (as may be appropriate) to provide international and national consulting. The TA subproject will require international consultancy from economists and sector specialists who will prepare background papers and analyses supporting the thematic chapters or topics related to the outlook. International economic advisory and editing consultants will be required for the economic and technical editing of ADO manuscripts before final publication. National economics consultants and research assistants will be required to assist with data management and to conduct research on a particular topic. ADB will engage resource persons for a maximum of 33 working days to conduct training on macroeconomics and economic forecasting, serve as discussants during workshops, peer review papers, and serve as technical experts on short-term assignments. Contracts for consulting services will consist of output-based. lump-sum, time-based or framework contracts, as appropriate. ADB will engage consultants and resource persons as individuals to ensure that individuals with the requisite experience and qualifications are recruited. The ADO covers a wide range of topics, and highly qualified consultants with expertise relevant to ADO requirements will most likely be associated with various research institutions, think tanks, and universities. Further, the TA subproject will require rapid mobilization of the editorial consultants. The consultants will be engaged following the ADB Procurement Policy (2017, as amended from time to time) and its associated project administration instructions and/or staff instructions.

12. **ADB's procurement.** ERCD will procure ICT-related equipment and/or supplies, subscriptions to third-party databases, and statistical software under the TA as needed and in coordination with the Information Technology Department and Corporate Services Department. Procurement will follow the ADB Procurement Policy (2017, as amended from time to time).<sup>5</sup> Procurement Plan is accessible from the list of linked documents in Appendix 3. Disbursements under the TA will be made in accordance with ADB's Technical Assistance Disbursement Handbook (2020, as amended from time to time).
