Description	Based on the successful implementation of the ongoing project, the government has requested ADB for additional financing to expand and deepen its outreach to targeted SME segments, in particular (i) women-led/owned SMEs, and (ii) tea smallholders as key export-oriented SM cluster. An \$80 million new additional loan was included in the recent Country Operational Business Plan (COBP) as 2020 firm project. The consultation mission on 20 22 June 2019 confirmed government's commitment on the proposed new additional financing.	
Project Rationale and Linkage to Country/Regional Strategy	SME finance ecosystem development with focus on women entrepreneurs. Over 3.5 years of implementation, PFIs have been undergoing their transition to mainstream their SME operations and proactively reach out to underserved SMEs, such as women-led, first-time borrower, and located in rural areas. The continuation of ADB's credit line will further expedite this PFIs' transformation. The ongoing initiative is being further strengthened by another ADB project to strengthen Regional Development Bank, a state-owned financial institution following a mandate on promoting financial inclusion in rural areas. In particular, support for women's business should be further promoted as policy priority in Sri Lanka given its low-level of women's economic participation despite gender parity in access to social services. Although the ongoing blended-finance has been accessed by 482 women-led/owned SMEs exceeding the original target of 250, the continued financial support, utilizing the remaining We-Fi grant balance of \$3.07 million, will further enhance the effectiveness of the GEN project with the ongoing We-Fi TA for strengthening capacity of banks, government, women-led/owned SMEs, and other key stakeholders to promote sustainability and systemic behavioral change. Support for tea smallholders. In Sri Lanka, tea sector has been an important socio-economic fabric with significant macroeconomic policy implications in terms of earning foreign exchange and promoting inclusive economic growth. The sector accounts for 15% of the exports and employs 10% of the workforce, majority of whom are less educated and stuck at the bottom of the social ladder with chronically low wages. The tea sector currently depends for 75% of the total production on over 400,000 tea smallholders, most of which are informal family business with landholdings less than one acre. Despite its brand recognition, the Sri Lanka tea has been recently losing international competitiveness with declining quality and quantity of tea leaves due to aged tea bushes and l
