#### **Project Overview**

The Majuro Distribution Network Strengthening Phase 1 (the Project) will make an investment in smart meters at roughly 450 distribution transformers (13.8kv/0.4kv) on two of Marshalls Energy Company (MEC)'s two distribution feeders serving the bulk of Majuro's load. This will allow MEC to record electricity consumption patterns throughout all segments of its network, and to identify where system technical and commercial losses are greatest. This will inform technical design for subsequent investments in distributed generation throughout the relevant portion of the Majuro atoll, and will allow MEC to address commercial losses that are estimated at 10% of annual electricity production on Majuro, or approximately 5,500 MWh per year, with an estimated value of \$2,475,000. The Project will also provide consulting services for implementation of the referenced metering program (including assignment and recording of customer meters with their respective distribution transformers), as well as the preparation of a comprehensive reform program addressing MEC's deficiencies in governance, management, and business practices and systems. The approximate value of this Phase 1 of the project is estimated at \$2 million, consisting of \$1.25 million in procurement and delivery of metering hardware, and \$.75 million in consulting services.

The Project will not involve any land acquisition, nor affect any assets, nor cause any resettlement impacts.
