### **DEVELOPMENT COORDINATION**

# A. Major Development Partners: Strategic Foci and Key Activities

- 1. The water and other urban infrastructure and services sector is one of the six priority sectors identified under the Viet Nam country partnership strategy, 2012–2015 of the Asian Development Bank (ADB). Other development partners active in this sector include Agence Française de Développement (AFD), Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), Export Import Bank of Korea (KEXIM), and the World Bank.
- 2. During project processing, ADB actively pursued cofinancing possibilities from other development partners through close consultation. Although the International Cooperation and Development Fund of [Taipei,China] and the European Investment Bank indicated strong interest in cofinancing the project, such cofinancing did not materialize. The reasons are because the terms and conditions of their loans were less concessional than the government hoped, and it was difficult to synchronize the project approval processes with those of the government and ADB. However, the project will be supported by grants from the Urban Climate Change Resilient Trust Fund for the flood forecasting and warning system and the integrated coastal management components.
- 3. The water and other urban infrastructure and services sector often requires multisector interventions with components in the subsectors of water supply, wastewater collection and treatment, sanitation, flood protection, solid waste management, and institutional and capacity development in urban planning and management. The following table details the ongoing projects and programs in water and other urban infrastructure and services financed by the major development partners in Viet Nam.

# B. Institutional Arrangements and Processes for Development Coordination

- 4. In 2005, development partners and the government signed the Hanoi Core Statement on Aid Effectiveness, a localized version of the Paris Declaration, which sets out joint commitments and targets for improving the effectiveness of aid delivered to Viet Nam. Various issues to improve aid effectiveness are discussed jointly by the government and development partners at the Aid Effectiveness Forum. The government is committed to manage and utilize official development assistance (ODA) in a transparent and accountable manner under the decentralization policy.
- 5. ADB works with other five financial institutions—AFD, JICA, KEXIM, KfW, and the World Bank—under the Six Banks initiative, which accounts for more than 80% of the total ODA flow to Viet Nam, and has contributed substantially to improving the portfolio performance and strengthening ODA management. Through implementation of biannual joint portfolio performance reviews, the Six Banks and the government developed and have implemented the joint action plan to (i) accelerate project preparation, appraisal, and approval; (ii) expedite project start up; and (iii) improve project implementation.

#### C. Achievements and Issues

- 6. ADB, under the Six Banks initiative, has been working with the government. Recent achievements under the initiative include (i) developing a harmonized project detailed outline template; (ii) developing feasibility study guidelines; (iii) legalizing advance actions; (iv) reforming the government cost norms; (v) improving payment, disbursement, and counterpart fund allocation; (vi) establishing an ODA monitoring system; and (vii) harmonizing social and environmental safeguard procedures.
- 7. Continuous and close consultation and communication between ADB's project teams and development partners resulted in several joint and parallel cofinancing efforts in the water and other urban infrastructure and services sector in Viet Nam. The cofinanced projects include (i) Loan 2034-VIE: the Central Region Urban Environmental Improvement Project (joint cofinancing by AFD); (ii) Loan 2511-VIE: the Thanh Hoa City Comprehensive Socioeconomic Development Project (parallel cofinancing by KEXIM); and (iii) Loan 2826: the Comprehensive Socioeconomic Development Project in Viet Tri, Hung Yen and Dong Dang (parallel cofinancing by KEXIM).<sup>1</sup>

## D. Summary and Recommendations

8. The Six Banks initiative should continue as a platform for development partners to identify and address systemic ODA preparation and implementation challenges, and to jointly raise such challenges with the government. Stronger development coordination is expected to minimize transaction costs, maximize responsiveness, address policy issues more systematically, provide greater support for reforms and capacity building, and promote better accountability to achieve greater development impact.
