Description	PRAN Agribusiness Project ADB will support the development of new agribusiness production facilities by PRAN, the largest food and agribusiness group in Bangladesh. As part of its vertical integration and import substitution strategy, PRAN will invest in a liquid glucose plant and a flour mill. The project also includes a frozen food processing plant. Frozen food produced will be mainly flat breads made from flour. Maize and wheat will be procured from local farmers to produce liquid glucose and flour. ADB will provide a \$25.1 million loan to the new project company, which will be guaranteed by several existing group companies. This is ADB's first non-sovereign agribusiness project since 1985. It reflects PSOD's strategy of being more active in sectors with high development impact potential, particularly in Asian Development Fund countries such as Bangladesh	
Objectives and Scope	The project will help sustain high agricultural growth by connecting farmers to local and global food markets. The project will help strengthen national food security by improving nutrition with affordable, high-quality food products. PRAN will be one of the first groups in Bangladesh to produce flour fortified with vitamins and minerals. The project will create significant employment opportunities for the poor. The project company will hire about 1,000 workers, at least 30% of which will be women. In addition, some 50,000 farmers will benefit from guaranteed purchase from the project. PRAN has been leading the development of contract farming in Bangladesh, with 42,000 farmers already under contract with the group.	
Status of Operation/Construction	Financial close was achieved 26 June 2013 and first disbursement occured shortly thereafter on 3 July 2013. In 13 January 2014, SAL formally notified ADB of their intent to partially cancel the facility corresponding to the flour mill and the frozen food processing plant, amounting to USD 12.95 million. Final disbursement for the liquid glucose plant was achieved on 27 January 2014 and the said plant is ramping up to full operations.	
Linkage to Country/Regional Strategy	The project aligns with ADB's agriculture sector strategy. In particular, the Operational Plan for Sustainable Food Security in Asia and the Pacific recommends an _expanded partnership with the private sector_to attract _more direct investments in productivity enhancement, agro-processing, agro-retailing, and other nonfarm rural business Assistance to an integrated food and agribusiness company also addresses the operational plan's objective of _increasing synergy and value addition in the backward and forward linkages along the food and agriculture value chain Improved linkages along the value chain enhance productivity, employment opportunities, exports, and regional trade, as well as food security for the poor. Agriculture and natural resources is one of the six sectors identified for ADB assistance under its country partnership strategy for Bangladesh, 2011 2015. In particular, the strategy document mentions that ADB's private sector operations will consider financial support for the food processing industry. The project will benefit from synergies with ADB's sovereign assistance to rural infrastructure and water resource management.
