Project Rationale and Linkage to Country/Regional Strategy Additional financing is proposed to meet a financing shortfall from the substantial increase in the cost of completing the five slaughterhouses. The cost increase is primarily due to changes in the design. The government places a high priority on the slaughterhouse component, as there are no modern slaughterhouses in Afghanistan . There has been increasing demand for safer and more hygienic meat from consumers, and stronger urban environmental and public health concerns from unhygienic and rudimentary slaughtering practices in all major cities. However, failure of agribusiness financing market, lingering security concerns and unfavorable investment climates prevent the private sector from investing in agribusiness in general, and slaughterhouse in specific.

The activities to be supported under the additional financing will not alter the scope and scale of the original project. As such, it is likely to have minimal or no adverse environmental impacts. Nevertheless, MAIL is required to ensure construction and subsequent operations of the slaughterhouses are fully compliant with the safeguard policy requirements of the Government and ADB. Procurement Presently, the slaughterhouse contractors are on site, and construction and supervision are ongoing. Thus, additional financing will not entail new procurement. Additional finance will support the continuation of ongoing civil and installation works through amendments to existing contracts, with construction scheduled to be completed by 30 June 2017
