GY-L1031 Public Consultation Report

Background

Consistent with the Stakeholder Engagement Plan for GY-L1031 a total of five (5) public consultations were held with the nine (9) respective regularized sections of the South Georgetown area commonly referred to as "Sophia". The consultations were held on 3 consecutive Sunday afternoons on September 10, 17 and 24, 2017 (see attached Annexes). The objectives of the consultations were to provide information, explain the impacts and mitigation measures of the project, answer questions and obtain stakeholders input on issues and concerns to be addressed in project development, planning and implementation. Central Housing and Planning Authority (CHPA) facilitated the consultation, which was led by the Agency's Community Development Department and supported by the Projects Department and other staff.

The process entailed CHPA making a verbal presentation on the proposed scope of the project and explanations on the positive and potential negative impacts of the programme during the construction and operation phases. CHPA then facilitated discussions with residents on questions, concerns and suggestions that they may have. Cordless microphones were provided to ensure that the contributions made were audible to all.

In addition, signage (sign language) was also provided to ensure that persons who were hearing impaired were also given the opportunity to participate in the discussion.

Mobilization was led by Community Development Facilitator, Mrs. Jacqueline Sookram, with support from the respective community leaders. Written correspondences were sent to organized groups which were identified in the "Sophia" Stakeholder Register inviting their participation in the consultations. Follow up phone calls were also made to ensure that the stakeholders were in receipt of the written correspondences. Additionally, flyers were posted at strategic locations in the community (shops, Public Buildings, etc.) as well as distributed by hand by community leaders and CHPA staff. Radio and television advertisements were also done to sensitize the community about the respective consultations. Further, CHPA staff appeared on live local television programmes to create awareness about the public consultations.

A brochure was also prepared and was distributed to community leaders and to persons attending the consultation. This brochure included information of the proposed Environmental Social Health and Safety (ESHS) Management Measures for the project area.

RESULTS

The public consultation exercises helped residents understand the objectives of the proposals and allow the implementing Agency to consider comments from residents before the implementation of this programme. This consultation also helps the implementation agency ensure that the proposals meet the needs of the residents within the project area.

A total of eight hundred and thirty one (831) residents (of which 302 were male and 529 female) attended the consultations over the three weeks period from Block 'X' Liliendaal, Section 'C', Cummings Lodge, Pattensen Turkeyen, Section C South Turkeyen, Section D South Turkeyen, Block 'E', Sophia, Block R North Sophia, Block 'F' Sophia, GPL Reserve, Homestretch, Dennis Street, University of Guyana Reserve, Sophia Reserve, ALR Pattensen, and Block "AA" and Block 'BB', Sophia.

The following main issues were raised by participants at the Public Consultations:

• Re-Branding

The area situated in South Georgetown, colloquially referred to as "Sophia" consists of several plantations: Block 'X' Liliendaal, Pattensen Turkeyen, Section C South Turkeyen, Section D South Turkeyen, Section 'C', Cummings Lodge, Block 'E', Sophia, Block 'S' Sophia, Block 'F' Sophia, and Block "AA" and Block 'BB', Sophia. All these areas, with the exception of Block 'S' are former squatter settlements that have been regularized by the CHPA.

Residents and community leaders have clearly articulated that they would like the communities to be referred to by the correct names and not to all be lumped together and called 'Sophia'. According to the residents there is a negative stigma of attached to 'Sophia'. Moreover, just the way other communities are correctly branded they wish the same for their community.

• Drainage

Poor maintenance of drains and irrigation canals has reduced the flow carrying capacity of the community's drainage system, triggering floods whenever it rains. Residents stated that once this problem is not remedied drains remain clogged, with more debris dumped in the flow system, and with heavy rains persisting, the problem of flooding will remain a problem in these communities.

"Urgent remedial work is needed to alleviate this situation since there has been no improvement for years and the residents are apathetic about the implementation of any other programme until the drainage situation is remedied.

CHPA explained that the National Drainage and Irrigation Authority, with support from the Pan American Health Organization (NDIA) is implementing a project that will target the cleaning of the main drains in the area. CHPA further clarified that the implementing agency will be coordinating with NDI A regarding the main drains since it has implications for the success of this project. In the longer term, CHPA clarified that the City Council is responsible for cleaning and clearing of drains and canals, and that once the area has been handed over to the local authority for management and operation this would be part of the Council's usual maintenance programme.

• Squatting

There has been a continuous influx of squatters to the government reserves in these communities consulted. This has led to the occupation of road reserves, buffers, increased criminal activities and deaths due to illegal wire connections placed by these squatters along residents' parapets and drains. Consequently, legitimate residents are unable to assist in the cleaning and clearing of their drains due to the number of exposed electrical wires tossed in these drains and canals "according to residents". Thus, residents opined that squatters pose a serious problem to the development of these communities.

The CHPA indicated to residents that, outside of the scope of the Project (GY-L1031) an effort to alleviate squatting is being made by the CHPA. The Authority will be developing a Squatter Resettlement and Relocation Plan in collaboration with several stakeholders. To this end, CHPA facilitated a meeting on September 20, 2017 with community leaders from Block 'X' Liliendaal, Pattensen Turkeyen, Section C South Turkeyen, Section D South Turkeyen, Section 'C', Cummings Lodge, Block 'E', Sophia, Block 'S' Sophia, Block 'F' Sophia, and Block "AA" and Block 'BB', Sophia. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss a collaborative approach for containment of squatters on the reserves. A committee was established comprising residents, CHPA and several sector agencies to address this issue.

• Road Upgrade

Residents consistently emphasized the great need for the construction of several quality roads, bridges and pathways. These, they insisted, would improve access to social services and to link their communities with other communities and social services such as health centers, schools etc.

They insisted that roads in their community should not be done with 'chip seal' but that Asphaltic concrete finish was preferred since it was a better quality and will last longer.

In addition, residents maintained that any road(s) that are damaged during the construction process, must to be properly repaired and debris removed when the project is completed.

• Management of Housing Areas

Residents requested that the CHPA urgently hand the area over to the City Council for operation and Management so that they can benefit from the services offered by the Council.

CHPA informed residents that the process of engagement in this regards has commenced and that a work group has been established directly address this issue.

• Employment of Residents

The communities consistently requested that residents gain employment from the project. CHPA agreed that 30-40% of the contractor's work force must come from the community.

• Individual Lots and Boundary Issues

Several residents raised individual lot allocation and boundary issues, including disputes. CHPA provided contact information for residents to come to the office and have these matters directly addressed by the authority.

Livelihood Restoration

The CHPA explained An Environmental & Social Assessment Management Plan was done for the Sophia area along with an Environmental & Social Management Framework. This document has been posted on CH&PA's website; <u>www.chpa.gov.gy</u>. The Environmental & Social Assessment found that during the implementation of the project, it is possible that the economic activity of some persons might be disrupted, for example those persons who have shops along the roadways, especially those that are encumbering.

As such, CH&PA will be developing a Livelihood Restoration Plan. This will be done closer to the implementation of the project, when there is better idea of who will be affected. The Livelihood Restoration Plan would indicate what measures would be out into place to minimize the impact of disrupting economic activities during project implementation.

There were no objections raised to this by residents.

• Traffic Management

CHPA further stated that it is expected that there would be disruptions in the flow of traffic during the project. During the project implementation the Authority will be working with contactors and residents to minimize this as much as possible.

Residents did not raise any objections to this.

• Grievance Mechanism

Contact information was provided to persons to communicate with CHPA prior to and during project implementation. Persons who have concerns that they would like to share after the consultations or during project implementation were advised to do so via:

CHPA indicated to residents that the community will be kept informed of the project progress via the media, updated brochures and community leaders.

Residents were also advised that during the project implementation, a site office would be set up, where concerns and grievances could also be registered.

Conclusion

The issues raised by the residents of the project area are very similar in nature to those raised by the community leaders. It is noted that many of these issues have been identified and mitigation measures proposed in the ESA and ESMF.

However, worthy of note here are the issue of the re-branding (correctly addressing each plantation by its correct name instead of referring to the entire development as 'Sophia') and the issue of squatter relocation. These have not been captured in the existing ESA and ESMF, and are hereby recommended for inclusion.

It is acknowledged clearly here that squatter relocation is NOT within the scope of this project, and will be addressed separately by the CHPA. It is imperative, however, that this issue be included in the ESA and ESMF as an issue that will be dealt with by the borrower as part of the mainstream CHPA programme, as it was raised by residents at every public consultation.

In keeping with the Stakeholder Engagement Plan a public consultation was held with 298 residents, organization representatives and community leaders of the above mentioned communities in relation to the Reformulation of the Road Network Upgrade and Rehabilitation Programme. The programme is to be funded by a loan from the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) to the Government of Guyana. The objective of the consultation was to provide information, answer questions, explain the potential impacts and concomitant mitigation measures of the project and obtain stakeholders input on issues and concerns to be addressed in Project development, planning and implementation. Central Housing and Planning Authority (CHPA) facilitated the consultation, which was led by Senior Community Development Officer, Mrs. Donell Bess-Bascom. The Director Community Development, Mr. Gladwin Charles and Engineer and Engineer, Mr. Randolph Hunte provided support to the facilitator.

The process entailed CHPA making a brief verbal presentation about the scope of the project, explaining potential positive and negative impacts of the programme during the construction and operation phases, then facilitating discussions with residents on questions, concerns and suggestions that they may have. Cordless microphones were provided to ensure that the contributions made were audible to all.

In addition, signage (sign language) was also provided for the duration of the meeting to ensure that persons who were hearing impaired were given the opportunity to participate in the discussion.

Mobilization was led by Community Development Facilitator, Mrs. Jacqueline Sookram, with support from the respective community leaders. Nine (9) other members of the CHPA staff provided support for the consultation. Flyers were posted at strategic locations in the community (shops, Public Buildings, etc.) as well as distributed by hand by community leaders and CHPA staff. Radio and television advertisements were also done to sensitize persons from Block X Lilendaal and Pattenson about the consultation. Further, CHPA staff appeared on live local television programmes to create awareness about the public consultations

In accordance with the Stakeholder Engagement Plan for the GY-L1031 a public consultation was held with 152 residents, organization representatives and community leaders of the above mentioned communities in relation to the Reformulation of the Road Network Upgrade and Rehabilitation Programme. The programme is to be funded by a loan from the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) to the Government of Guyana. The objective of the consultation was to provide information, answer questions explain the possible impacts and associated mitigation measures of the project and obtain stakeholders input on issues and concerns to be addressed in Project development, planning and implementation. Central Housing and Planning Authority (CHPA) facilitated the consultation, which was led by Community Development Facilitator, Mrs. Jacqueline Sookram and Engineer, Mr. Randolph Hunte (CHPA). A total of 152 persons attended the consultation (see attendance summary below)

The process entailed CHPA making a brief verbal presentation about the project, explaining the positive and negative impacts of the programme during the construction and operation phases then facilitating discussions with residents on questions, concerns and suggestions that they may have. Cordless microphones were provided to ensure that the contributions made were audible to all.

In addition, signage (sign language) was also provided for the duration of the meeting to ensure that persons who were hearing impaired were given the opportunity to participate in the discussion.

Mobilization was led by Community Development Facilitator, Mrs. Jacqueline Sookram, with support from the respective community leaders. Thirteen (13) other members of the CHPA staff provided support for the consultation. Flyers were posted at strategic locations in the community (shops, Public Buildings, etc.) as well as distributed by hand by community leaders and CHPA staff. Radio and television advertisements were also done to sensitize persons from Section D and E (Cummings Lodge), Turkeyen about the consultation.

A brochure was also prepared and was distributed to community leaders and to persons attending the consultation. This brochure included information of the proposed Environmental Social Health and Safety (ESHS) Management Measures for the project area.

The objective of the consultation was to provide information, answer questions, explain the potential impacts and concomitant mitigation measures of the project and obtain stakeholders input on issues and concerns to be addressed in Project development, planning and implementation. Central Housing and Planning Authority (CHPA) facilitated the consultation, which was led by Senior Community Development Facilitator, Mrs. Donell Bess-Bascom and Engineer, Mr. Shaud Majeed who provided support to the facilitator.

The process entailed CHPA making a brief verbal presentation about the scope project, and explaining the positive and potential negative impacts of the programme during the construction and operation phases. Discussions were then facilitated with residents on questions, concerns and suggestions that they may have. Cordless microphones were provided to ensure that the contributions made were audible to all.

In addition, signage (sign language) was also provided for the duration of the meeting to ensure that persons who were hearing impaired were given the opportunity to participate in the discussion.

Mobilization was led by Community Development Facilitator, Mrs. Jacqueline Sookram, with support from the respective community leaders. Thirteen (13) other members of the CHPA staff provided support for the consultation. Flyers were posted at strategic locations in the community (shops, Public Buildings, etc.) as well as distributed by hand by community leaders and CHPA staff. Radio and television advertisements were also done to sensitize persons from Blocks 'F' and 'R' Sophia about the consultation.

A brochure was also prepared and was distributed to community leaders and to persons attending the consultation. This brochure included information of the proposed Environmental Social Health and Safety (ESHS) Management Measures for the project area.
