Detailed report of training programme:

Day-1 (24-05-2016)

- ❖ Firstly, Mr. H.S.Dhillon (Forest Specialist, PIU) gave a welcome speech with introductory session to resource person, trainers and all the participants. He also briefed the five day workshop Schedule, purpose and benefits. He told detailed training schedule to the trainees that the training workshop timing is from 10:00 am to 4:00 and during this their two time tea refreshment and lunch was available.
- ❖ Ms. Sumati Bhaskar (Gender Specialist, PIU) introduces the entire participants with their trainers and done a brief discussion on benefits of Self Help Group (SHGs) formation.
- ❖ After this, Mrs. Madhu Sharma (Coordinator, Nabha Foundation) gave a brief lecture on Phulkari Embroidery and its traditional value in the culture of Punjab.
- ❖ After the discussion, all participants had a tea break.
- ❖ After the tea break the training of Phulkari embroidery started. Firstly the trainers taught all the participants the Basic Phulkari Stitch with phulkari thread on the Khaddar Casement Cloth without stamping. All the participants took interest and practiced the basic Phulkari stitch very efficiently. First day this only stitch was practiced by the women because most of the participants were new and didn't have the knowledge about Phulkari embroidery stitches.
- ❖ During the training workshop, on the behalf of Mrs. Bhavneet Kaur CDS from PMU, a visit was done by Mrs. Reetu Garg, Craft Assistant from PMU. She took a feedback from trainees about the ongoing Phulkari workshop.
- ❖ Participants took their lunch and fill their attendance.
- ❖ The women also took the cloth to their home to do practice.



Day-2 (25-05-2016)

- ❖ On the 2nd day of training workshop Mr. H.S.Dhillon, F.S, Project Implementation Unit (PIU) conducted a brief talk session with the participants and trainers on the previous day activities.
- ❖ Ms. Sumati Bhaskar, Gender Specialist, asked to the participants about any problems, doubts and questions during the learning of previous day Phulkari stitch.
- ❖ Mr. kamaljeet, Community Development Officer, Project Implementation Unit (PIU) explain to all about a format for Craft Details and told all the participant to fill the foam with the help of Mrs. Saranpreet Kaur , CD Staff, DSC during the tea break time.
- ❖ Trainers taught the Phulkari Flower Design (Sindhu Motiff) and Phulkari Border Design to the participants. Firstly trainers showed the samples of the both designs to the participants then participants started the embroidery work.
- ❖ In between the workshop trainees took a tea break and again started their embroidery work.
- ❖ During the tea break Mrs. Saranpreet Kaur , CD Staff, DSC filled the Craft Detail Format of some participants.



Day-3 (26-05-2016)

- ❖ On the 3rd day of training workshop Mr. H.S.Dhillon, Forest Specialist, Project Implementation Unit (PIU) done a brief discussion with the trainers about the participant's interest and progress.
- ❖ Ms. Sumati Bhaskar, Gender Specialist, showed the Phulkari embroidery samples prepared by the trainees which showed that trainees were grasping the Phulkari embroidery with keen interest.
- ❖ Trainers told all the trainees that today they were taught Phulkari Peacock Design and Phulkari Kite Design. So firstly trainers showed the both embroidery stitches and then taught the techniques of these designs. The trainees started the embroidery works. Some of them were very well.
- ❖ Some women made very well designs for the Phulkari Products.



Day-4 (27-05-2016)

- ❖ On the 4th day of training workshop Mr. Ashok Nanda, Project Manager, Project Implementation Unit (PIU) took a short discussion session with all participants. He asked to the participants about any complaints and suggestions related to this training workshop. So some suggestions were given by the participants regarding the travelling allowance/ arrangements, increase the days of training e.t.c. He ensured all the participants that their suggestions may be taken into action in the next training workshop. He also asked from the trainers about the progress of the trainees. At last, he also saw the embroidery samples prepared by the trainees.
- ❖ After the whole discussion a group photo also taken.
- ❖ Trainers taught the Phulkari Design namely "Chammas". Trainers firstly told the techniques for the embroidery also showed a sample design of same Phulkari stitch. Then they given the plain Khadar Casement cloth to all the trainees for the preparation of the Chammas Design.
- ❖ After having the lunch some of participant started stitching the Phulkari products i.e. Potli, Dining table mats e.t.c. with their Phulkari sample design.



Day-5 (28-05-2016)

- ❖ On the 5th day of training workshop Mr. Ashok Nanda, Project Manager, Project Implementation Unit (PIU) met with the participants and done some discussion on the previous days activities and trainees progress. He also saw the Phulkari products prepared by the trainees i.e. Potli, Dining Mats, Cushion Covers e.t.c.
- ❖ Ms. Sumati Bhaskar, Gender Specialist, Project Implementation Unit (PIU) showed a feedback form to all the participants and told them that after the training workshop ending they have to fill the form and give their feedback suggestions.
- ❖ Trainers taught the Phulkari Design namely "Til Patra". Trainers firstly told the techniques for the embroidery also showed a sample design of same Phulkari stitch. Then plain Khadar Casement cloth was given to all the trainees for the preparation of the Til Patra Design.
- ❖ After the completion of designs the participants also stitched some other Phulkari products i.e. Glass Mats, Shagun Envelope.



Conclusion:-

With the ending of training workshop all the participants filled the feedback forms and they highlighted some points in the feedback forms i.e. travelling arrangements or travelling allowances, issue separate copies to the self help group members individually and increase the duration of training days.

At last, they were enthusiastic by having the skills of Phulkari embroidery.

The training workshop was ended with a brief vote of thanks by Ms. Sumati Bhaskar, Gender Specialist, and Project Implementation Unit (PIU).

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1. Background

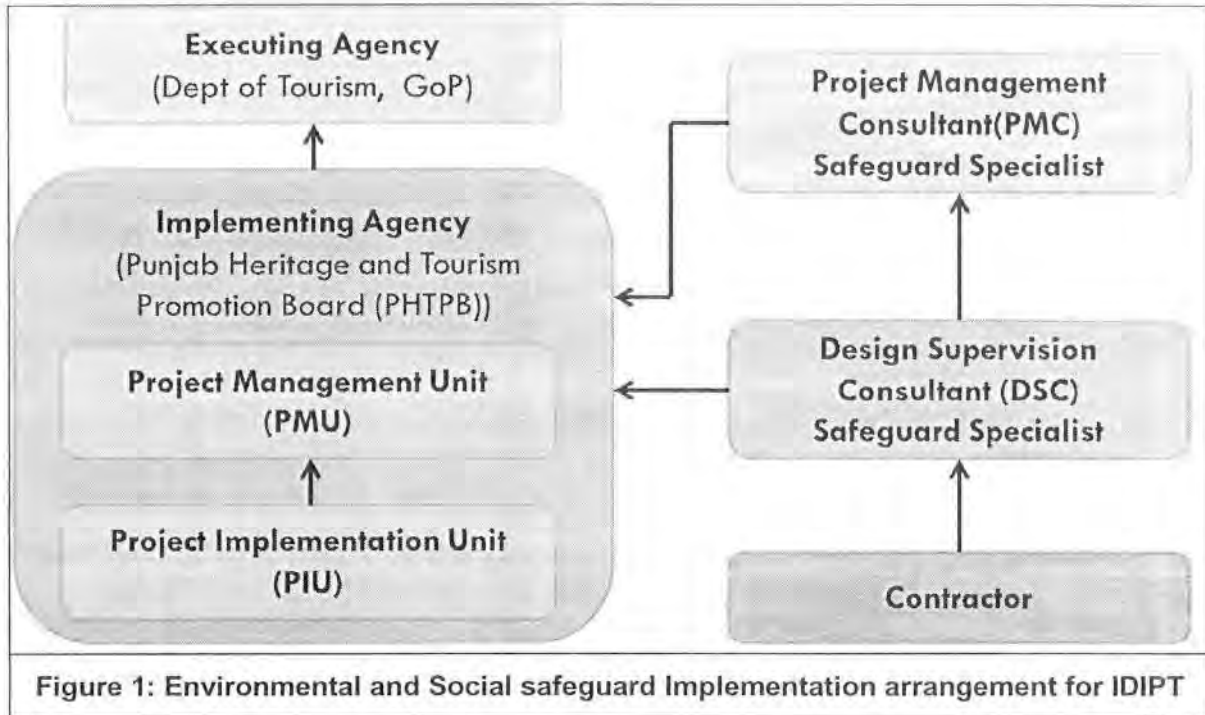
1. The India Inclusive Tourism Infrastructure Development Project (IDIPT) envisages an environmentally and culturally sustainable and socially inclusive tourism development in the state of Punjab. Based on the important tourist destinations within the state, the Department of Tourism, Punjab under the Punjab Heritage and Tourism Development Board, has chosen the following tourist destinations (**Table 1**) to renovate/ rehabilitate and to provide basic amenities to attract more tourists to visit the state.

2. For implementing the given packages, Project Management Unit (PMU) and Project Implementation Unit (PIU) have been appointed by the Department of Tourism, which acts

as an Executing Agency (EA). The key responsibility of the PMU and PIU is to initiate the project work as per the requirements of Government of India (GoI) rules and regulations and Asian Development Bank (ADB) guidelines. To assist the PMU and PIU, Project Management Consultants (PMC) and Design Supervision Consultants (DSC) have been appointed to monitor the progress of the work performed by the contractor. The proposed environmental and social safeguard implementation arrangement is depicted in the following Figure 1.



3. The given sub projects (**Table 1**) are not under the ambit of Environmental Clearance (EC) from the State Environment Impact Assessment Authority (SEIAA), Government of Punjab or Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEF & CC), Government of India. However, as per the ADB guideline, all the projects are classified under 'B' category which mandates to implement the project with project specific Environmental Management Plan (EMP) as outlined in the Initial Environmental Examination (IEE).

2. Need for Training

4. The Contractors involved in implementing the sub projects under Tranche-3 does not have exposure to the prevailing environmental rules & regulation and safeguard policies that are to be adopted during construction activities. Hence, a list of capacity building/training programs pertaining to safeguarding the environmental and social components have been identified and briefed in the Facility Administration Manual (FAM), Project Preparatory Technical Assistance Report (PPTA), IEE and EMP (refer **Appendix – 1** Environmental Safeguard Training Programs suggested for IDIPT). The primary responsibility for conducting the capacity building/ training programs lies with PMC, hence in accordance to it, one day training program/ workshop was organised at Rupnagar, Punjab for the PMU staff, Amritsar PIU, Rupnagar PIU and Contractors (refer **Appendix – 2** Attendance sheet). The training program/ workshop have been conducted for various environmental and social safeguard topics (refer **Appendix – 3** Environmental and Social Safeguard Captions Covered under the Training Program) that are to be adopted during various stages of the project including planning, designing and implementation stages.

3. objectives of the training

5. The objectives of the safeguard training includes;

- **Environmental Safeguard:**

- To highlight the importance of Climate Change and its consequences due to anthropogenic activities (including infrastructure projects).
- Highlighting the Environmental Rules and Regulations adopted by the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEF&CC) and the ADB policy SPS, 2009 its importance in project screening and categorisation and subsequent procedures/ methodology that needs to be adopted in framing/ preparing the safeguard documents for various site specific construction activities
- To explicate the potential environmental Impacts including activities causing pollutions during construction and operation stages and its mitigation / management measures
- Understanding the approach/ procedures that are to be adopted in implementing the project specific Environmental Management Plan (EMP)
- To highlight the importance and need of construction safety and the use of specific PPE's for construction activity.
- Understanding the roles & responsibilities and coordinating with other departments (various relevant stakeholders) in implementing environmental safeguard measures, including those requiring environmental clearances/ NoC's etc.
- Explaining the various environmental monitoring formats that are to be complied by the contractors during sub project construction
- Highlighting the provisions made in the contract agreement/ bid document for safeguarding the environment during the project construction and to provide quality in the project implementation with respect to the environment by adopting good engineering practices

- **Social Safeguard:**

- Understanding the ADB Social Safeguard Policy, requirements and compliance with the safeguard measures in Infrastructure development projects

- **Gender Requirements:**

- Gender mainstreaming as the key strategy for promoting gender equality and women's empowerment
- To have an overview of Gender Action Plan in IDIPT, its compliance requirements, contractual arrangements and modalities to enforce gender and core labour standards.
- To highlight the gender related risks in infrastructure development projects and its mitigation measures through awareness campaigns

- **Community Participation and Development**

- To highlight the importance of the community participation and development in conservation of natural and cultural heritage
- To explicate the roles and responsibilities of the Self Help Group's (SHG) in local product identification and marketing skills
- Sharing views in organising/ formation and sustaining local committees for assisting SHG's

4. Scope of training

6. The scope of the training includes;
- To create awareness among the participants about current trends in Climate Change and its influence in the global warming
 - Organisation of stakeholder workshops to review the needs and options for implementing the Environmental and Social Safeguards in the IDIPT
 - To provide training on Environmental Rules and Regulations adopted by Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEFCC), Government of India and Environmental Safeguard Policy (SPS, 2009) adopted by Asian Development Bank (ADB)
 - To illustrate the environmental Impacts that are likely to arise during construction and operation stages and its mitigation measures
 - To detail the necessity in implementing the project specific Environmental Management Plan (EMP)
 - To highlight the requirement of construction safety and the use of PPE's
 - To provide an overall understanding of roles and responsibilities and coordination approach in implementing the EMP's
 - To train the stakeholders in the preparation of environmental monitoring and reporting system (EMR) at various stages of the construction
 - To highlight the safeguard clauses in the contract agreement/ bid document and its implementation requirements in safeguarding the environment
 - To outline the social policies and frameworks adopted by Government of India and ADB in conducting Social Impact Assessment (SIA)
 - To train the stakeholders in the preparation of social monitoring and reporting system (SMR) at various stages of the construction
 - To explain the salient features of the ADB gender policy and gender mainstreaming that are to be adopted in IDIPT
 - To explain the need for the Gender Action Plan (GAP) its requirement and its preparation process by way of using various formats available in the Facility Administration Manual (FAM)
 - To highlight the requirement for community participation and development in conservation of natural and cultural heritage; and the role of Self Help Group's (SHG)

5. Topics covered under training

7. Topic – 1: *Need for taking environment into consideration, climate change scenario and its impacts on living being*

- Aim: To create awareness among the participants (Including PMU, PIU and the Contractors) about the importance of the climate change and its consequences. The presentation slides are enclosed in **Appendix – 4 (a)** for ready reference.
- Keywords:
 - i. The policy formulated by the Intergovernmental Panel for Climate Change (IPCC)
 - ii. Fundamental greenhouses gases and its impacts on Climate Change
 - iii. Impact due to Infrastructure projects on the Climate Change
 - iv. Climate Change consequences/ impacts
- Discussion/ Outcome of the training: The basic understanding of the Climate Change and its impacts has been presented with suitable illustrations. The consequences of the Climate Change in the global warming and its impact on the various environmental components including the change in rain pattern, extension of drought, increase in sea level, melting of glaciers etc., has been detailed with suitable case

studies. The necessary measures that are to be adopted in the IDIPT for minimising the environmental impact which in turn can reduce the climate change risks have been discussed. The environmental friendly initiative like provision for groundwater recharge pits, harvesting solar energy, utilising bio-toilets/ flush free urinals, increasing landscaping with provision for more trees, using environmental friendly construction materials are discussed.

8. **Topic – 2: Basic concept of environment, environmental regulations and statutory requirements as per Government of India and ADB Guidelines.**

- Aim: To create awareness / capacity building among the implementing agency (including Project Management Unit (PMU) and Project Implementation Unit (PIU)) and the Contractors regarding the fundamental requirements of Environmental Safeguard during the project implementation that are adopted by Government of India (GoI) and Asian Development Bank (ADB). The presentation slides are enclosed in **Appendix – 4 (b)** for ready reference.
- Key Words:
 - i. Environmental Rules and regulation adopted by Government of India (*Environmental Protection Act, Air Act and Rules, Water Act and Rules, Manufacture, Storage and Import of Hazardous Chemical Rules, Forest (Conservation) Act, Wildlife Protection Act, Biological Diversity Act, Environmental Impact Notification, National Policy on Resettlement & Rehabilitation and Ancient Monuments and Archaeological sites and Remains Act*)
 - ii. Environmental Safeguard adopted by ADB (*Principles of ADB Environmental Safeguard, Policy Objectives, Environmental Category - Environmental Assessment Guidelines 2003*)
 - iii. Environmental Standards adopted by Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB)
 - iv. Environmental clearances that are to be obtained by the Contractor
- Discussion/ Outcome of the training: Various environmental acts and rules adopted in implementing the infrastructure projects in India as a whole has been discussed, from the prevailing acts and the rules, the IDIPT project specific/ related acts and rules has been identified/ chosen and detailed with its applicability towards the project requirement. The role of the MoEFCC and CPCB has also been illustrated with schematic diagram. The relevant environmental standards stipulated by CPCB including the Ambient Air Quality, Noise Quality and Drinking Water Standards have been discussed with the participants. The project related Environmental Clearances (EC) have been listed and shared with the contractors as a guiding tool for obtaining clearance from the authorised agencies/ departments. The presentation has given an overall understanding of the environmental legislations and its applications in the preparation of IEE's and EMP's.

9. **Topic – 3: Environmental components impacted in construction and operation stages Activities causing pollution during construction and operation stages.**

- Aim: To create awareness among the Contractors and to train the implementing agency in addressing the various environmental components getting affected during the project construction and operation stages. The presentation slides are enclosed in **Appendix – 4 (c)** for ready reference
- Key Words:
 - i. Environmental Impacts and Typical Issues (Soil Pollution, Air Pollution, Water Pollution, Noise Pollution, Construction Waste Management, Storage of fuel etc.,)

- ii. Environmental Management Plan (Location Impacts, Design Impacts, Construction Impacts and Operation and Management (O&M) Impacts)
- Discussion/ Outcome of the training: Under the environmental impact and typical issues, the key environmental factors/ parameters that would be impacted/ affected due to solid waste dumping, spillage of oil and grease, surface runoff etc., on the ambient air quality, water quality, noise quality, land environment, flora and fauna and the same has been discussed with suitable examples and case studies. For better understanding of the participants, the EMP prepared for the subproject Package – 6 Surface parking near GGF (Tranche - 1) was presented. The construction activity based impacts (with respect to) the (i) Location Impacts, (ii) Design Impacts, (iii) Construction Impacts and (iv) Operation and Management (O&M) Impacts) along with the suggested management measures and the responsibility has been discussed with illustrations. The management measures that are to be adopted for the on-going sub-projects have been discussed and corrective/ management measures for further improvement have been provided.
- Based on the organisation structure adopted for the IDIPT Punjab, the Environmental and Social Safeguard Roles and Responsibilities for the implementing agency, PMC, DSC and Contractor have been discussed. The EMP Contract Clauses for safeguarding the environment have been discussed in detail. The necessity for obtaining valid certificate / license/ permits for the vendors/ agencies, where the contractor is planning to procure construction materials has been explained with suitable illustrations. The environmental monitoring procedures that are to be adopted by the contractor has been detailed and it has been advised to engage NABL accredited laboratories with valid certificates for performing environment monitoring for key environs like ambient air, noise quality etc.

10. Topic – 4: Training for workers to use protective gears, comply with health and safety procedures

- Aim: To create awareness among the contractors and the implementing agency about the importance of the Construction Safety and the use of Personnel Protective Equipment's (PPE's). The presentation slides are enclosed in **Appendix – 4 (d)** for ready reference
- Key Words:
 - i. Construction Safety (structure and excavation, Work at height, Material Handling, Electric city and Power)
 - ii. Use of PPE's (Head protection, Eye and face protection, Hearing protection, Foot protection etc.,)
 - iii. Accidental / incidental record preparation and maintenance
- Discussion/ Outcome of the training: The Health and Safety requirement towards (i) Protection of workers/ labours and the public, (ii) during structures and excavation works, (iii) Working at height, (iv) Manual handling of construction materials, (v) Electrical safety and (vi) use of PPE's at construction site has been illustrated. The environmental mitigation measures that are to be adopted during the project construction have been discussed. The presentation has given an overall understanding of the various environmental constructions related impacts and management measures that are to be adopted and the necessity of the use of PPE's in the construction site.

11. Topic – 5: Roles and Responsibilities of Officials/ Contractors/ Consultants towards Protection of Environment and Implementation of Environment Mitigation Plan (EMP), Monitoring and Reporting System to the target audience such as Engineers and staff of implementing agencies, and PMU/PIU.

- Aim: To train the Project Implementation Agency (PMU/ PIU) and the Contractors their roles and responsibilities in maintaining/ improved co-ordination with other government departments/ agencies for obtaining project related permissions/ NoC's/ clearances etc and also in fulfilling the Environmental Monitoring requirements as an integral part of the EMP's and guiding them with appropriate reporting system. The presentation slides are enclosed in **Appendix – 4 (e)** for ready reference
- Key Words:
 - i. Challenges in implementing environmental monitoring and reporting systems by the executing agencies and the Contractor
 - ii. Project specific environmental consents / permits/ NoC's required for construction activities
 - iii. Environmental management & areas of concern
 - iv. Implementation of Environmental monitoring and reporting approach
- Discussion/ Outcome of the training: The roles and responsibilities of the Executing Agencies (PMU/ PIU) and the Contractors in maintaining Co-operation & Co-ordination with other Government Departments/ agencies for obtaining statutory clearances has been discussed. The project specific Environmental Consents / Permits/ NoC's that are to be obtained by the Contractor has been discussed in detail. The environmental management & areas of concern including the Construction Camps, Construction Plants, Quarries/ Crushers, Borrow Areas, Debris Disposal, Air, Noise and Water Pollution, environmental enhancement and safety during construction has been discussed with suitable illustrations.
- The likely challenges that are to be faced by the Executing Agencies (PMU/ PIU) and the Contractors in implementing Environmental Safeguards Monitoring and Reporting system in IDIPT has been discussed based on experiences from other ADB funded projects. The Project Level Monitoring approach in fulfilling the environmental monitoring and reporting system has been discussed. The safeguard protection clauses indicated under the General Conditions (GC) and the Technical Specifications of the contract / bid document has been highlighted and discussed for better understanding of the Contractors. Various safeguard monitoring and reporting formats for Implementation of Environmental Management and Monitoring Plans has been discussed with timeframe for submission of the monitoring reports.

12. **Topic – 6: Overview of ADB's Social Safeguards - Policy triggers, Requirements and compliance with the safeguards, Social Safeguards Performance and Current Status of Its Implementation**

- Aim: To train and to familiarise the Project Management Unit (PMU) and the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) and the Contractors on ADB SPS 2009 and the compliance requirements that are required to be met throughout the project cycle (viz during the preparation, implementation and monitoring). The training is also aimed to explain the necessity of implementation of safeguards by the Implementation Agency as per the Resettlement Frameworks prepared for IDIPT. The presentation slides are enclosed in **Appendix – 4 (f)** for ready reference
- Key Words:
 - i. Policy and legal framework (ADB Safeguards Policy Statement (SPS) 2009, The Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act (RFCT in LARR), 2013; National Rehabilitation and Resettlement Policy, (NRRP) 2007 and relevant state laws)
 - ii. Social categorisation of projects (as per ADB)
 - iii. Institutional arrangement defined with roles and responsibilities in implementing the social safeguard

- iv. Set up of Grievance's Redressal Mechanism and its purpose
- v. Necessity of Labor clauses in the bid document/ contract agreement
- Discussion/ Outcome of the training: The social safeguard policy as per ADB and the rules and regulations adopted in GoI (NRRP 2007, The RFCT in LARR Act 2013) and GoP for mitigating/ managing the social issues were presented and discussed. The other safeguard measures including the Gender Mainstreaming in IDIPT and preparation of Gender Action Plan (GAP) with suitable indicators including women participation in civil work, community participation, STI awareness program, consultation program etc., were explained with suitable illustrations. Though the Tranche – 3 sub projects are not having any major social impacts, the social impact assessment with suitable management measures to counteract any unforeseen impacts that are likely to arise during the project construction has been detailed with illustrations for better understanding. The Tranche – 3 subprojects like Qila Mubarak, Nabha Qila, Ropar wetland (Interpretation center) to Mata Gujarkaru Gurudwara approach road and tombs that are likely to cause social impacts like traffic jam, public space used for storage of material by the contractor, debris storage etc has been discussed and suitable mitigation/ management measures were suggested.
- The Non Compliance (NC) to the public consultation and disclosure of project information and Grievance Redressal Mechanism has not been furnished at site, this has been discussed with the Implementation agency and the Contractor and it is agreed to provide notice/ information boards at project sites
- The necessity for adopting the Labour Act 1951 provisions at site by the Contractor has been discussed in detail. The key requirements of the Act such as Minimum wages for the labours, no to child labours, equal wages for men and women has been discussed in detail. The other provisions of the Labour Act including Occupational, Health and Safety, use of personal protective equipment's (PPE's), labour shelter's/ labour camp cleanness and hygiene, toilet facilities for men and women, crèche for children's, medical check-up for labourers, registration of labour from labour commissioner of concerned jurisdictions has been explained with illustrations.

13. Topic – 7: Gender Mainstreaming in Infrastructure Development Investment Program for Tourism, Capturing Gender Equality Results - Monitoring and Reporting of Project Gender Action Plan (GAP)

- Aim: To create awareness among the Contractors and Implementation Unit (PMU/PIU) in developing the IDIPT project as a community based tourism activities so has to promote Gender Equality through improved opportunities for women and to emphasise the need for the Capturing Gender Equality Results in IDIPT project implementation and specifying procedures/ approach for monitoring and reporting of Project Gender Action Plan (GAP). The presentation slides are enclosed in **Appendix – 4 (g)** for ready reference
- Key Words:
 - i. Gender equality/mainstreaming aspects for IDIPT
 - ii. Women empowerment through community-based tourism activities
 - iii. Strong institutional environment for gender mainstreaming
 - iv. Women to have equal opportunity to participate in and benefit from the project
 - v. Sex ratio and other aspects of gender differentiation
 - vi. GAP implementation, monitoring and reporting
- Discussion/ Outcome of the training: A brief introduction on the difference between sex and gender has been illustrated for better understanding of the participants. The reason behind gender inequality in the society including an imbalance in the political, economic, social and cultural power against women has been discussed with class

exercises. The key factor behind the gender socialization and environment that induces differences among the men and women has been discussed with suitable illustration. Various kind of gender inequality (including mortality inequality, natality inequality, basic illustrated facility inequality, special opportunity inequality, professional inequality, ownership inequality and household inequality) were presented and discussed. A short film on gender inequality and gender mainstreaming has been shared with the participants for their better understanding. The following key benefits through the gender mainstreaming in Infrastructure Development Investment Program (IDIPT) for Tourism has been explicitly discussed.

- Mechanisms to promote women's representation in decision-making processes;
 - Inclusion of women's needs into relevant project components;
 - Quota / tangible targets for female staff in project implementation;
 - Capacity building of communities, government officials, and other stakeholders on gender issues and risks related to tourism (including HIV/AIDS, sexually transmitted infections, trafficking, and other social risks);
 - Effectively involving women in project monitoring and evaluation, including gender-disaggregated data for these purposes; and
 - Targeting at least 50% women in all capacity development and training activities
- The purpose of the GAP used as a tool in gender mainstreaming in the ADB funded project has been discussed. The following key points of the Gender Action Plans (GAP's) has been discussed explicitly
 - Preparatory work undertaken to address gender issues in the project
 - Quotas, targets, design features included in the project to address gender inclusion and facilitate women's involvement and/or ensure tangible benefits to women
 - Mechanisms to ensure implementation of the gender design elements
 - Gender monitoring and evaluation indicators

The outcome of the GAP implementation in the Tranche-1 has been discussed in detail and the Tranche -3 project contractors are requested to adopt the similar approach in their project to fulfill the Gender mainstreaming and women empowerment in IDIPT.

14. Topic – 8: *Integrating Community Development in projects of Infrastructure Development Investment Program for Tourism.*

- Aim: To create awareness among the participants (Implementing Unit (PMU and PIU) and Contractors) with respect to the necessity to have an Integrated Community Development in IDIPT project (being a discussion program, the presentation slides are not enclosed).
- Key Words:
 - i. Community Participation and Development in conserving the tourism destinations (natural, cultural etc.)
 - ii. Socio economic/ livelihood development among local communities through IDIPT
 - iii. Orientation program for stakeholders in community development and participation
 - iv. Self Help Groups (SHG's) and local committees roles and responsibilities in improving self-employment opportunities through tourism projects

- Discussion/ Outcome of the training: The advantages of having an integrated community development in implementing the IDIPT have been discussed with suitable illustrations. The following integrated community development measures were explicitly discussed
 - Approaches/ methods by involving local community in conserving the natural and cultural heritages
 - Involving local and indigenous communities in its planning, development and operation contributing to their well-being
 - To create an enabling environment for tourists through Integrating Community development
 - Development of village/ rural tourism by expanding the opportunities by increasing tourists inflow to villages and towns
 - Improving the social livelihood (by eradicating poverty through the supply of handicraft, agricultural and other products) of the community by engaging them in the IDIPT
 - Providing an opportunity to the local community to get engaged in the businesses and direct employment in the tourism area
- The need for the Self Help Group (SHG) and its defined roles and responsibilities (including creating employment opportunities from the production of tourism – related activities) in improving the village/ rural tourism has been discussed. It is also suggested to have dedicated committees at local level to maintain sustainability of the SHG's growth.

6. Major Achievements

15. The training topics for environmental and social safeguard as suggested in the Facility Administration Manual (FAM), Project Preparatory Technical Assistance Report (PPTA), IEE and EMP (refer **Appendix – 1** Environmental Safeguard Training Programs suggested for IDIPT) has been fully covered and completed through three successive training programs¹ held in the year 2013 and 2014 for Tranche – 1 projects. The fourth training program (21st August, 2015) on "Environmental Safeguard and Gender Empowerment and Women Equality" was organized as a refreshment program for the implementing agency (PMU & PIU), Consultants (DSC) and Contractors. The training topics on the Gender Empowerment and Women Equality and LARR Act 2013 have been presented by the safeguard specialist and gender specialist from the ADB, India resident mission (INRM).

16. Following the success of the safeguard training programs, it has been decided to conduct similar training program/ workshops during every quarter. In view of this, as it is a new tranche project (Tranche - 3), the fifth safeguard training on "Implementation of Social, Environment Safeguards and Gender Equality & Women Empowerment (GEWE)" In Asian Development Bank (ADB) operations was conducted on 8th January, 2016 at Rupnagar (Ropar), Punjab. The impact of the training program in implementing the environmental and social safeguards at the construction sites is a huge success. However, some of the sub-projects coming under the Tranche – 3 were recently awarded and the contractors are new to understand and to implement the safeguard measures. Hence In order to have a capacity development for the contractors and implementing agencies, the sixth safeguard training on "Implementation of Social, Environment Safeguards and Gender Equality & Women Empowerment (GEWE)" In Asian Development Bank (ADB) operations was conducted on 24th May, 2016 at Rupnagar (Ropar), Punjab.

¹The first training on the environmental and social safeguard was conducted on 10th and 11th June, 2013, the second training program was conducted on 20th and 21st August, 2013 and the third training program was conducted on 13th and 14th February, 2014.

17. The environmental and social safeguard training that was conducted is the first training of this kind for the new Contractors working for Tranche -3 sub-projects and it's refresher course for Contractor's and Implementing agency (site engineers), who have already attended the fifth training program. At the start of the presentation, there were not much discussions/ interaction due to the lack of information/ awareness about the environmental issues/ impacts that are likely to arise during the project construction and operation. However, after understanding the concepts involved in preparing the IEE's and EMP's the discussion among the participants were over whelming.

18. Various clearances/ permissions/ NoC's that are to be obtained by the Implementation Unit (PMU & PIU) and the Contractor from other stakeholders departments which are applicable for this IDIPT project has been explained with case studies (representing various infrastructure projects). The requirement in having a close coordination with other stakeholders department was detailed to the participants. Query related to their roles and responsibilities in obtaining various clearances/ permissions/NoC's were discussed with case studies for better understanding. The discussions went on well with more queries pertaining to have a better understanding about their roles in coordinating with other departments.

19. The Environmental Management Plan (EMP) and the environmental safeguard clauses indicated in the bid document had been taken and discussed in detail. The purpose of the discussion is to create awareness among the participants (PMU/ PIU and Contractors) for mitigating various environmental impacts that are likely to arise during the project construction and operation. The provision for environmental budget has been highlighted to utilize it for safeguarding the environment in a better way. Necessary monitoring formats have been discussed with the participants (PMU/ PIU) for monitoring the Contractor while preparing the monthly/ bimonthly progress reports with environmental compliances.

20. To fulfill the Social Safeguard requirements, the social safeguard policy as per ADB and the rules and regulations adopted in GoI (NRRP 2007, The RFCT in LARR Act 2013) and GoP for mitigating/ managing the social issues were presented and discussed. Training session on "Gender Empowerment and Women Equality in the IDIPT projects" has been conducted to cover the following topics (i) ADB's Gender Policy, (ii) Gender Mainstreaming in Infrastructure Development Investment Program for Tourism, (iii) Capturing Gender Equality Results - Monitoring and Reporting of Project Gender Action Plan. The aim of this session is to create awareness among the Implementing Unit (PMU & PIU) and the Contractors to have minimum 50% of the women labours/ employees in the ongoing IDIPT project works. The outcome of the discussion shows an acceptance from the participants to have more women labors/ employees in their ongoing works.

21. The importance of having community participation and development in the IDIPT projects has been presented and discussed. The need for Self Help Group's (SHG's) and the formulation of appropriate committees to support the growth of the SHG's and their involvement in conserving the tourism destination (natural and heritage) has been explicitly discussed. The participants have raised queries on the roles and responsibilities to be adopted for conducting the community participation and development and accordingly suitable suggestion have been provided.

7. Comments about Training

22. The feedback forms collected from the participants are enclosed in **Appendix -5**. Few snap shots of the training session and the feedback are given below

8. Way forward

23. The training provided an insight to the social and environmental safeguard/ management measures covering the various topics suggested in the IEE, which in turn will give an overall idea for the project implementing agency (PMU&PIU) in addressing the various environmental impacts that are likely to arise during the project construction and operation phase. With this training, it shall be assured that the Contractors under the guidance/ supervision of the Design supervision consultants (DSC) and Project Management

Consultants (PMC) can achieve better progress in implementing the project specific EMP's. However, their success shall be assessed through proper monitoring. The way forward for implementing the EMP shall be

- Conducting the environmental monitoring plan through analysis of the various environs like air, noise, water and soil as stipulated in the project specific EMP's
- Preparation and submission of the monthly progress report with the duly filled in environmental monitoring formats that have been shared among the contractors
- Conducting monthly training program for the implementing agencies and the Contractors in implementing and monitoring the proposed EMP's
- Discussion with the DSC and PMC for environmental non compliances during the project construction
- Utilisation of the environmental budget in safeguarding the environment during project construction and operation












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

This one day training program on HIV/AIDS was organized to educate and trained the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) staff, DSC Staff, and Contractors.

Trainers educated the entire participant in detail about HIV/AIDS, its symptoms, causes and preventive measures. He discussed the preventive and remedial actions for the laborers at project site.

Objectives:-

- ↓ **GENERAL OBJECTIVE:** To ensure that the human resource in the tourism sector is educated in HIV/AIDS awareness (its symptoms, risks and control).

Detailed Training Sessions:

Session-1- WELCOME SESSION AND INTRODUCTION

The first session initiated with a warm welcome note from Mr. H.S. Dhillon (Forest Specialist) who greeted all the members at the gathering. He introduced the trainers/resource persons with the participants and participants introduce themselves.

- ❖ After the introductory session a talkative session was taken by Ms. Sumati Bhaskar (Gender Specialist) on HIV/AIDS, its impact on society, both as an illness and as a source of discrimination. Economic impacts and misconceptions about HIV/AIDS, thereby giving awareness note on the need to be aware and make others aware about HIV/AIDS.

Session-2- UNDERSTANDING THE DEIFFERENCE BETWEEN HIV/AIDS

Second session started with a presentation by Mr. Jaswinder Singh (Project Manager, DACS). He focused on difference between HIV and AIDS.

He discussed in detail about the history of HIV and told to participants that first case of HIV in India was found in 1989 at Tamil Nadu.

He also told all the participants in details about the HIV, that it is a virus that gradually attacks the immune system, which is our body's natural defence against illness. If a person becomes infected with HIV, they will find it harder to fight off infections and diseases. The virus destroys a type of white blood cells. And AIDS is a syndrome caused by the HIV virus. It is when a person's immune system is too weak to fight off many infections, and develops when the HIV infection is very advanced. This is the last stage of HIV infection where the body can no longer defend itself and may develop various diseases, infections and if left untreated, death. He gave detailed description about the causes and prevention from HIV/AIDS. He also differentiates between STIs and STDs. He motivated the whole gathering for routine blood test (six month) to be safe from the dangerous diseases.

Session-3- UNDERSTANDING THE SERVICES GIVEN BY PSACS FOR HIV/AIDS.

After the tea break 3rd session was again taken by Jaswinder Singh (Project Manager, DACS). He showed a short movie "Sulekha" on social impact and societal reaction especially on women having HIV/AIDS.

Then he discussed in detail about various services provided by the PSACS to their target population and about different awareness campaigns running in

Punjab state on HIV/AIDS. He discussed that as our projects having labourers (mostly migrated) and labour class are considered on risk of HIV especially migrated labour. So it is recommended to conduct their blood check up on monthly basis, for this the Civil Hospital having a free mobile van facility. After the discussion he also distributes some IEC materials to the participants.

CONCLUDING SESSION

Lastly, the concluding session was taken by Mr. Ashok Nanda (Project Manager, Project Implementation Unit (PIU), Ropar) who took a brief of the whole day sessions on HIV/AIDS and also took feedback from the team members who gave a satisfactory response.



After the concluding session a Thank You note was given by Mr. H.S.Dhillon (Forest Specialist). He directed all the Support Engineers to tie up with mobile vans of civil hospital and conduct a blood check up of labourers during monthly health check camps. He thanked the entire team for this gathering and making this program a successful one.




