### 2. Project Development Objective(s)

The proposed PDO is to support DSWD to improve the use of health and education services of poor children.

### 3. Project Description

This project contributes to the financing of the DSWD's conditional cash transfer program and related MTEP over the next four years, as recently endorsed by the Development Budget Coordination Committee (DBCC) and whose total cost is projected at US\$ 5.84 billion. The amount of the proposed IBRD project is estimated at US\$ 450 million (7.7 percent of the total CCT cost in 2016-2019).

Component 1: Support to the CCT Program (IBRD Funding: US\$ 450 million; ADB Funding: US\$ 400 million; Government Counterpart Funding: US\$ 4.98 billion)

The objective of this component is to support the continuous delivery of the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino CCT Program to poor households with children. It will continue to contribute to the financing of the health and education grants given to the CCT beneficiaries nationwide over the period of four years, starting from the date of Project effectiveness. Financing would amount to about 7.7 percent of total cash grants in the CCT program. The beneficiary households – poor households with children 0-18, should continue to be selected using the national household targeting system -Listahanan - that follows a standardized targeting mechanism with rigorous quality control process.

Component 2. Strengthening of CCT Implementation and Monitoring and Evaluation (IBRD Funding: US\$ 0; ADB Funding: US\$ 0; Government Counterpart Funding: US\$ 5.2 million)

This component will allow DSWD to undertake necessary enhancements to the CCT Program. It will do so by allowing DSWD's National Project Management Office (NPMO-Pantawid) to enhance implementation of the CCT, through a strengthened capacity for monitoring, evaluation and data analysis, enhanced payment and GRS, streamlined and improved family and youth development sessions, and faster compliance verification and beneficiary data systems.

Specifically, the component will use own Government funds as planned in the above referenced MTEP to undertake institutional and capacity development and monitoring and impact evaluation activities, including: (a) strengthening policy analysis and monitoring and evaluation capacity, including conducting a CCT Program impact evaluation and annual CCT Program implementation spot checks; (b) training of central, regional and municipal staff to deliver the CCT Program; (c) developing content for, and strengthening capacity to deliver, strategic communications, including strengthening the beneficiary feedback mechanism; and (d) training for the development and delivery of family and youth development sessions.

#### 4. Project location and salient physical characteristics relevant to the safeguard analysis (if known)

The project will cover the poor and vulnerable households, which includes indigenous people. No negative social impact is expected from the project.

Environmental Assessment OP/BP 4.01		The project supports conditional cash transfer to poor households. The project does not support construction of physical infrastructure, civil and earth-moving works nor

		expected to directly promote activities that may have adverse effects on the environment. Thus, the project has no direct environmental impact. However, OP 4.01 is triggered on account of the need to assess the social impacts of the project on the beneficiaries and other major stakeholders, including the Indigenous Peoples (OP 4.10). A social assessment is included in the PAD (Annex 6), which also included the assessment of the IP safeguards instrument (i.e., IPPF) for the previous CCT project.  The project will not support any civil works.

The project will not support any physical investments or civil works, hence any environmental impacts is not expected. The project, however, is likely to benefit directly the indigenous peoples (IPs) through the conditional cash transfer (CCT) program, which targets poor areas where IPs may be present.

### 2. Describe any potential indirect and/or long term impacts due to anticipated future activities in the project area:

The long-term positive impact on IP is improved human development conditions particularly resulting from improved access to basic education and health services.

### 3. Describe any project alternatives (if relevant) considered to help avoid or minimize adverse impacts.

Not applicable.

## 4. Describe measures taken by the borrower to address safeguard policy issues. Provide an assessment of borrower capacity to plan and implement the measures described.

DSWD has prepared an enhanced Indigenous Peoples Policy Framework (IPPF) which defines the mechanism for identifying or screening the grantees in indigenous communities; various strategies to ensure that the program elements are all IP-sensitive; various mechanisms for representation/participation of IPs at all levels of operations from national to local levels and the monitoring of the IPPF implementation. In most part, the enhanced IPPF drew lessons drawn from almost 7 years of implementing the previous IPPF for the SWDRP which is the predecessor project.

DSWD is familiar with the Bank's safeguard policies since it is currently implementing World Bank other projects for which safeguards policies/framework have been formulated and implemented satisfactorily.

# 5. Identify the key stakeholders and describe the mechanisms for consultation and disclosure on safeguard policies, with an emphasis on potentially affected people.

Consultations with IPs regarding Pantawid Pamilya were done regularly through annual focused group discussions with IP grantees and through the regular meetings of the program Advisory Committees at all levels (from national to municipal) wherein the National Commission on Indigenous People (NCIP) is represented or a regular member. The IPPF has been cleared by NCIP on September 4, 2015. DSWD disclosed the IPPF in its website (www.dswd.gov.ph) on September 8, 2015, and the Bank has disclosed the IPPF in Infoshop on September 13, 2015.
