## 2. Project Development Objective(s)

### A. Original Project Development Objectives – Parent

The development objective of the proposed Project is to assist, as part of a global polio eradication effort, the Government of Nigeria to achieve and sustain at least 80% coverage with OPV immunization in every state in the country

### C. Proposed Project Development Objectives – Additional Financing (AF)

To assist the Recipient, as part of a global polio eradication effort, to achieve and sustain at least 80% coverage with oral polio vaccine immunization in every state in the Recipient's territory, and sustain national routine immunization coverage.

### 3. Project Description

The revised Project Development Objective (PDO) is to assist the Government of Nigeria, as part of a global polio eradication effort, to achieve and sustain at least 80% coverage with oral polio vaccine immunization in every state in the country, and to sustain national coverage for routine immunization.

The Federal Government of Nigeria (FGON) made an urgent request to the Bank for the proposed additional financing (AF) which will provide critically needed funds to: (i) avoid any disruption in polio eradication activities; (ii) prevent a deterioration in routine immunization (RI); and (iii) take advantage of opportunities to introduce new vaccines that will have a large impact on under-5 mortality. The FGON made the request because it has previously made large investments in polio eradication, RI, and new vaccines but is facing a critical shortfall in revenues due to declining oil prices.

The activities under the AF build on a very strong network of development partners (DPs) that have helped Nigeria make progress. All of the funds under the AF will be coursed through WHO and UNICEF who have a large and well-functioning presence on the ground. These are the arrangements that the FGON itself has used and which have been successfully used during the original project.

The Bank has provided about \$300 million to support the polio eradication program in Nigeria over the last 12 years through the previous project (which also included 3 additional financings) and the current project. Now that Nigeria is on the cusp of interrupting wild polio transmission, there is an opportunity to ensure that an acute financing gap does not derail hard earned gains.

The original project was approved on July 12, 2012, for an amount of US\$95 million, and has a closing date of July 31, 2015. The proposed additional financing would extend the closing date to July 31, 2017.

The project will take in all 36states of the federation including the Federal Capital Territory (FCT).

### A. Summary of Key Safeguard Issues

## 1. Describe any safeguard issues and impacts associated with the proposed project. Identify and describe any potential large scale, significant and/or irreversible impacts:

The Project is not envisaged to cause an potential large scale, significant and /or irreversible impacts. The environmental risks and the environmental category of additional financing will be upgraded to B.

There is no construction financed under the project. Overall environmental impact of the Project is likely to be positive with potentially significant environmental benefits with medical waste disposal as the main risk. Vaccination is potentially a significant source of waste generation, especially through expired vaccines due to poor stock management and cold chain. However in the context of Nigeria this is of modest environmental concern since the volume of waste from wasted vaccine vials is small and because they are sterilized vaccines which do not present a public health or environmental risk. The overall social impacts of the Project are likely to be positive with main issue being utilization of services. No land requirements or restriction of access to sources of livelihoods or involuntary resettlement of any kind under the Project.

## 2. Describe any potential indirect and/or long term impacts due to anticipated future activities in the project area:

There is no potential indirect or long-term impacts due to anticipated future activities in the project area.

# 3. Describe any project alternatives (if relevant) considered to help avoid or minimize adverse impacts.

## 4. Describe measures taken by the borrower to address safeguard policy issues. Provide an assessment of borrower capacity to plan and implement the measures described.

Nigeria has demonstrated its commitment to mitigating adverse social and environmental impacts in the implementation of a range of World Bank projects. There are adequate legal and institutional frameworks in the country to ensure compliance with World Bank safeguards policies. On September 4, 2013, the Nigerian Federal Executive Council (FEC) approved a new National Strategic Healthcare Waste Management policy, including National Strategic Healthcare Waste Management Plan and Guideline for the country. The fact that Ministers of Environment and Health jointly presented the memo seeking Council's approval for the adoption of the National Healthcare Waste Management policy, underscores the high level of the commitment of the Government toward improving the situation of the sector. Annex 3 presents a summary of the new policy context, including applicable plans and guidelines.

Generally, Nigeria is considered to have a fairly complete set of regulations and legal instruments however consistent implementation of monitoring and enforcement measures remain a challenge.

# 5. Identify the key stakeholders and describe the mechanisms for consultation and disclosure on safeguard policies, with an emphasis on potentially affected people.

Key stakeholders include: (i) poor and vulnerable groups, including populations in the three states affected by the state of emergency, Yobe, Borno, and Adamawa, and vulnerable groups such as women and children who face a disproportionate risk of mortality and morbidity due to avertable causes; (ii) state and local governments; (iii) the government at the federal level, including the National Primary Healthcare Development Agency (NPHCDA); and (iv) the development partner community, including UNICEF and WHO who will implement the project as well as the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and JICA.
