Environmental Assessment

Overview

The proposed programme loan is composed of sub-projects that intends to finance a range of measures to support the health emergency response and pandemic preparedness interventions for five South Asian countries.

The programme finances the shortages in the healthcare services and supply of critical medical supplies, medicines and vaccines during the period whilst WHO maintains the pandemic or health emergency status for COVID-19. Due to the nature of the investments (purchase of equipment, devices, consumables, COVID-19 vaccines and coverage of vaccination campaigns, etc.) and if properly managed (proper discharge of materials), it is unlikely that the project will have significant negative impact on the environment. The Bank will require the promoters to ensure that implementation of the sub-projects will be done in accordance with the Bank's environmental and social policy and standards.

An independent environmental assessment will be performed at the level of each sub operation.
