## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

### E.1 Background

India has 5,254 large dams in operation – the third largest in the world, besides many other smaller size dams. As a good number of dams are quite old, the situation has compelled attention towards undertaking remedial measures for ensuring their safety. In this context, the Central Water Commission (CWC), Government of India (GOI) sought assistance from the World Bank in 2012 and embarked upon a six-year long Dam Rehabilitation and Improvement Project (DRIP) covering 223 dams spread across seven states – Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Odisha, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Uttarakhand and Jharkhand. The project has three components: i) Rehabilitation and Improvement of Dams and Associated Appurtenances focusing on structural and non-structural measures at project dams; ii) Dam Safety Institutional Strengthening focusing on regulatory and technical frameworks for dam safety assurance; and iii) Project Management focusing on overall project coordination and management in each participating state. The project is currently into the fifth year and proposes to undertake a major remedial measure in Odisha - the Hirakud Dam.

### E.2 Hirakud Dam Rehabilitation and Improvement

Hirakud Dam is a multipurpose project built across Mahanadi river, about 15 km upstream of Sambalpur town in Odisha and was commissioned in the year 1957. The proposed intervention – construction of an additional spillway on the Left Dyke of the Dam-- comprises the following components: a Spillway with 5 Radial gates with a release capacity of about 3.20 lakh cusecs; an Approach Channel first 714m width is 120m and rest 1.186 km width is 200m; and a Connecting New Dyke having a length of 1.15km. The additional spillway at left dyke will pass through and encompass seven habitations resulting in significant resettlement related impacts. To address this, Water Resources Department (WRD), Government of Odisha (GoO) has prepared a Resettlement Action Plan (RAP) based upon an Environmental and Social Management Framework (ESMF) approved for the overall project by the state/ national governments as well as the World Bank. The preparation has been highly participatory with several rounds of consultations, focus group discussions and dissemination workshops.

### E.3 Displacement of People

The RAP has been prepared following a census study which led to an understanding of the baseline situation analysis and social impact assessments. Situational analysis reveals that the interventions will affect 716 households (PAHs) comprising 1,415 families (PAFs) and 3,022 persons (PAPs). The households are spread across seven habitations/ colonies and all of them are in an urban area and some 120 households had undergone displacement during the construction of the dam nearly sixty years back. Unfortunately, none of the 716 households own title to the land/ house and are considered as ‘squatters’.

Half of the PAPs are women, with female headed households accounting for as high as 20%. Social composition wise, Scheduled Castes (SC) (38%) together with Scheduled Tribes (ST-10%) constitute the majority. Other Backward Communities form 21% and the remaining one third belong to the General Category. A majority of the persons are literates (81%), though only less than 10% have had relatively higher education. On the employment front, 65% PAPs are in the age group of 18-60 years, rendering high employability, yet only 25% are ‘earners’ and the remaining are ‘dependents’. Further most persons take out their livelihood from wage or services. Most people are poor as 66% households have annual income less than Rs 100,000/annum while 15% are categorized as ‘vulnerable’. A quarter of the house structures are categorized as ‘pucca’ (with RCC roof), but majority of them are in a dilapidated condition and hence are categorized as ‘kutchha’. Lastly, one third of the households do not have access to piped Water supply and 50% lack sanitation services and resort to open defecation.



#### E.4 Impacts

Positive impacts/ benefits of the project are twofold: one, for the public living under the river/ dam spread viz., country at large; and other, for the prospective displaced persons. The former relates to enhanced safety of the dam as it will add additional discharging capacity of the dam, when there is high rush of water impeding the capacity of the dam, there by prevent large scale loss to life and properties in the downstream areas. The latter provides an opportunity for the affected families as it would result in formal secured ownership of house/ lands. It will also lead to: b) improved residential plots/ habitation; c) better infrastructure-water supply, sanitation facilities and electricity; and d) enhanced livelihood support and assistance. Adverse impacts include: a) displacement of 716 households comprising 1415 families and 3022 persons. b) loss of all 622 residential and commercial structures comprising 152 Pucca and 470 semi-pucca structures including 20 shop/Kiosks; c) impact on 455 vulnerable groups/persons (BPL, widow, Divorcees, Female headed households, orphans, persons with disabilities); d) loss of common property resources and social services institutions; e) loss of common property resources and social services institutions such as Community hall, Kalyan Mandap, and Anganwadi center; impact on livelihood, loss of business due to loss of clientele, loss of employment for persons dependent, small enterprise and wage labor.

#### E.5 Entitlement

Preparation of an entitlement package was a challenging task as none of the households have any title to their lands/ house rendering them as ‘squatters’. Neither the latest national Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act 2013, nor the World Bank policy (Operational Policy on Resettlement OP 4.12) is explicit in dealing with such a situation. However, GoO has exuded high degree of empathy and formulated a special package, drawing upon their state R&R policy of 2006, to address the displacement while taking cognizance of their vulnerabilities and preferences. It is consistent with the existing national/state policies and World Bank’s OP 4.12 and with the overall provisions of the ESMF for the Project. The package provides for each PAF: a) residential housing/ house site/cash assistance in lieu; b) house building assistance; c) shifting allowance; d) subsistence allowance/rental allowance; e) full replacement cost of the asset; and f) livelihood support assistance for poor and vulnerable. The Cut-off date established for defining families as eligible to receive entitlement package is May 25, 2016. Details of the package for each of the PAF, enumerated separately for rural and urban resettlement, are presented in the table below.

In addition to the above package, for the vulnerable groups as identified in the socio-economic survey, project will:

- (i) provide financial assistance to the FHHs for income generation activities (Rs 25,000 per household);
- (ii) livelihood support assistance for SC/ STs, drawing upon the resources from Special Component Plan (CP) / Tribal Sub Plan (TSP); and
- (iii) encourage Civil Works Contractor to provide work opportunities on a preferential basis to at least one able bodied member of the other vulnerable affected households.

The GoO has identified piece of land at different locations for resettlement of displaced population. Initially the GoO identified two resettlement sites: one at Basantpur and the other at Rangapalli village about 20 km away from the affected site. Both the resettlement sites were located in the rural areas. However, during 2<sup>nd</sup> level consultation most of the affected families disagreed to these sites owing to the long distance from their present settlement. They expressed their concerns about risk of their livelihood, difficulty in commutation to their work site and disruption of brotherhood relationship. They requested to find out alternative resettlement site closer to their present settlements. Consequently, GoO identified four more sites, all in urban areas – Solpali, Solband and Garmunda as well as Larbanga—all within the Sambalpur Municipal Corporation (SMC) limits. The urban sites are within a radius of 3-8 Km and are quite acceptable to the affected households.

*In order to compensate persons who lost their lands and were displaced during construction of main Hirakud Dam, Government of Odisha (GoO) has established a mechanism and provisioned a sum for this purpose. GoO periodically issues notices in local newspapers for persons to submit required documentation to claim compensation. Such notices will also be prominently displayed in the existing colony habitations. From the project's side, efforts will be made to put forward the cases out of the 119 persons identified by the census study as experiencing second time displacement.*

### E.6 Consultation

Consultations, Focus Groups Discussions and public hearings with affected communities were conducted during Census and Socio-Economic survey and also post identification of resettlement sites to elicit people's concerns, issues and perceptions on the overall project, proposed entitlement package and also on the identified resettlement sites. Information on the salient features, necessity of the intervention in respect of safety of the dam, purpose of surveys and provisions of the entitlement package were communicated to the persons. The public hearings were attended by representatives of the PAPs, District administration, Project authorities, Media, Non-government organizations, Project Management consultants and RAP preparation agency. Key benefits perceived by PAPs included: new opportunities for small scale business, more employment opportunities in the area, restoration of common property resources, R&R package including livelihood support and better civic infrastructure at the resettlement site, etc. Adverse impacts perceived included: loss of basic amenities, loss of ethnic group unity, disruption and irregularity to children's education and sports, increased time in commuting longer distance to workplace and disruption of brotherhood relationship. During course of RAP implementation, information dissemination and consultations will continue in respect of processes for disbursing of entitlements, grievance redressal mechanism, identifying and implementing suitable income generation and livelihood enhancement/restoration measures, etc.

The Executive Summary of the RAP has been translated into the local language (Oriya). This along with full RAP and a list of PAPs with impacted assets will be shared with each colony through public consultative workshops before the implementation and disclosed on websites of Central Water Commission and Orissa WRD as well as that of the World Bank.



## **E.7 Implementation**

The Central Water Commission, GOI is responsible for overall project implementation, guidance and monitoring. Whereas, Dam Authority will play an apex role through the State Project Management Unit (SPMU) established under the DRIP Project, Special Land Acquisition cum R&R Officer (Spl. LARRO), functioning under the guidance of the District Collector (DC), will support the RAP implementation specially with regard to extending lands and housing provisions. At the dam level, a committee comprising all the relevant stakeholder representatives will be set up to provide operational guidance on a regular basis. A RAP Execution Team will be put in place to shoulder day-to-day responsibility for the implementation of the RAP. They will mobilize and involve people in the project implementation, facilitate grievance redressal, look after relocation and resettlement, restoration of common property resources. They will be supervised by R&R Directorate and the Dam Authority.

The RAP shall be implemented over a period of 12 months. Implementation schedule shall comprise the following key activities: contracting a RAP Execution agency; constitution of Project Level Grievance redressal cell and orientation of its members; preparation of Microplans for each Project Affected Family; Opening of Bank account for affected families; finalization and development of resettlement site and allotment of plots, payment in installments of amounts towards house building assistance, shifting and cost of structures linked to house building and relocation; livelihood assessment and assistance and support measures; restoration of common properties including cultural properties; and submission of RAP implementation completion report.

## **E.8 Monitoring and Evaluation**

Monitoring of RAP implementation will be undertaken by Project Level Rehabilitation & Resettlement Committee (PLRRC) that will be headed by District Collector and comprise representatives from District and Block Administration, Municipal Corporation, Revenue Department and members of the Affected communities including 5 members from affected communities including 1 SC, 1 ST and 1 Woman member. In addition, internal monitoring will be carried out by SPMU, GoO. Additionally, an external agency will be contracted to concurrently monitor RAP implementation and also conduct an Impact evaluation at the end of RAP implementation period to evaluate the RAP implementation – activities and process; ascertain if there are any pending issues and make recommendations towards improvement of outcomes, if any.

## **E.9 Grievance Redressal Mechanism**

Mechanisms to redress grievances would be at three levels. First level would be a Project level Grievance Committee comprising representatives of the project authority, R& R Directorate, district administration, SMC, RAP Execution Agency and representatives of the colonies. Key functions of the committee will be to: i) record the grievances received, categorize and prioritize them and provide solution; ii) committee may undertake site visit to ascertain facts and status and seek information as necessary from concerned authorities; iii) fix a time frame to resolve the grievance; and iv) inform PAPs through SPMU about their decision to PAPs for compliance. Second level Committee would be constituted at the District level under the Chairmanship of the District Collector and comprise representatives of R&R Authority, Project Authority, R&R Manager and the representatives of the colonies. The third level committee will be at the state level under the Chairmanship of Secretary, Department of Water Resources and shall comprise R&R Director, Engineer in Chief, Water Resources Department, Chief Engineer (Dam Safety), District Collector and representatives of the colonies. The decision of the Grievance Committees will not be binding on the PAPs and they will have the option of taking recourse to court of law, if she/he so desires.

## **E.10 RAP Budget**

The budget estimates include the cost of: a) compensation against loss of structures, b) resettlement and rehabilitation, c) shifting/ relocation of common properties resources; d) common infrastructure facilities

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(civic amenities); e) services of implementing institutions and f) monitoring and evaluation. Total RAP implementation cost is Rs. 95,41,35,308/- (**Rs. 954 million**). However, this is likely to go up as the actual budget for all above (including budget for registration and development of Resettlement site, i.e. all weather road connectivity, supply of water, electricity and other basic necessary amenities) shall be determined and finalized by the appointment of special LAO by the Odisha State Government in coordination with project authority.



## CHAPTER-1: INTRODUCTION

### 1.0 BACKGROUND

India has 5254 large dams in operation, the third largest in the world. Besides this, there are several thousands of smaller dams. A good number of dams, however, are quite old, construction of which dates back as long as sixty years. While these dams ensure in enabling water security, as adequate investments have not been made in the past, the situation has compelled attention towards undertaking remedial measures for ensuring 'safety'. Any lapse could result in huge loss of lives and property as well as flora and fauna. It is in this background in April 2012, the Central Water Commission (CWC), Ministry of Water Resources, River Development & Ganga Rejuvenation, Government of India (GOI) sought assistance from the World Bank and embarked upon a six year Dam Rehabilitation and Improvement Project (DRIP) at an estimated cost of Rs.21,000 million. The project originally envisaged the rehabilitation and improvement across four states -- Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Odisha, and Tamil Nadu. Subsequently, three more states -Karnataka, Uttarakhand and Jharkhand—joined. Total number of dams covered under DRIP aggregates to 223 dams. The main objectives of the DRIP are to:

- improve the safety and performance of selected existing dams and associated appurtenances in a sustainable manner, and
- strengthen the dam safety institutional setup in participating states as well as at national level.

The objectives are to be achieved through investments for physical and technological dam improvements, managerial upgrading of dam operations, management and maintenance, with accompanying institutional reforms. This will in turn help to keep dams safe, respond to changing water demands, and keep the downstream population safe from floods. DRIP also aims at restoring the capacity of project dams for effective utilization of the stored water, and monitoring and managing the long-term performance of the dams. The project has three components –

- (i) *Rehabilitation and Improvement of Dams and Associated Appurtenances* focusing on structural and non-structural measures at project dams spread;
- (ii) *Dam Safety Institutional Strengthening* focusing on regulatory and technical frameworks for dam safety assurance; and
- (iii) *Project Management*: Focusing on overall project coordination and management in each participating state

The project is currently in the 5<sup>th</sup> year of implementation and works are underway across 198 dam sites. Out of them, 26 dam sites are in Odisha. Now, it is proposed to embark upon a major remedial intervention in Odisha—the Hirakud Dam. The investment entails construction of an additional spillway as a key dam safety measure. This has necessitated a major enquiry into social and environmental aspects.

**Environmental and Social Management Framework (ESMF):** While repairs and remedial measures for dams underpin the bulk of the investments, given that a dam forms a part of the socio-economic and eco system, project has paid due attention to social and environmental aspects. Towards this, an Environmental and Social Management Framework (ESMF) has been developed as a part of the project preparation in accordance with the safeguard policies of the state/ country as well as that of the World Bank. This document is being used in identifying and mitigating the potential negative environmental and social impacts that may emerge at different stages of the sub-projects. It also provides a guideline for the entities for implementation of the mitigation measures and their monitoring. The framework has been accorded approval from the state/ national governments as well as the World Bank. The same is adopted for Hirakud dam as well and a Resettlement Action Plan (RAP) has been prepared.





## 1.1 THE HIRAKUD DAM

River Mahanadi, the sixth largest river in the peninsular river systems of India gracefully flows 494 km in the North-Eastern part of Odisha state measured from its total traverse of 851 km from its origin to the outfall point at Bay of Bengal. In its basin area of 65,628 sq km in Odisha State, the river influences development scenario of 23 districts, 7 nos. in full and 16 nos. in part. The River Mahanadi forms the lifeline of the state and carries sacred feelings for the people of Odisha.

The Hirakud Dam project is built across river Mahanadi about 15 km upstream of Sambalpur town in the state of Odisha and was commissioned in the year 1957. It is a Multipurpose project and is the longest earthen dam in Asia having a total length of 25.8 Km. It is a composite dam of earth, concrete, and masonry. The main dam has an overall length of about 4.8 km and spans between two hillocks of Lamdungri on the left and Chandlidungri on the right. The length of main dam is 4.8 Km. The total area of the Reservoir at FRL is 743 sq Km with gross water storage of 5896 million cum.

The Hirakud Dam has catchment area of 83,400 Sq Km, gross command area (GCC) of 181,376 Ha, Culturable Command Area of 159,106 Ha with annual irrigation potential of 267,491 Ha. The project provides 159,106 Ha. of Khariff and 108,385 Ha. of Rabi irrigation in the districts of Sambalpur, Bargarh, Bolangir, and Subarnapur. The water released through the power house irrigates an additional 2,51,000 Ha. of C.C.A (Cultivable Command Area) in Mahanadi delta. The installed capacity of Hydropower at Hirakud Dam is 347.86 MW with Average Annual Energy Generation 937.813 of MU. A population of about 30 million from Coastal area of Khurda, Puri, Kendrapar and Cuttack districts are main beneficiaries of the dam. Besides, it provides flood protection to 9,500 km<sup>2</sup> of delta area in undivided districts of Cuttack and Puri.

Thus, the above features establish not only the size of the river but also its importance in terms of impacting on the economy as it supports among others, irrigation, drinking water, power supplies and flora and fauna. It also establishes that any breach could result in huge losses affecting huge number of human settlements. Hence, it is essential to accord priority attention to provide for management of additional water discharge by passing part of it through additional spillways and absorbing a part of it in the reservoir so as to avoid catastrophe by preventing overtopping of the dam and its consequent failure.

There are two spillways in the main dam on the left and right sides located on the two channels of the main river. The main dam toe Power House is on the right flank of the main dam. The dam is flanked by two earthen dykes on left and right sides with a combined length of about 21 km to close the low saddles.

The salient features of the Hirakud Dam are given below:

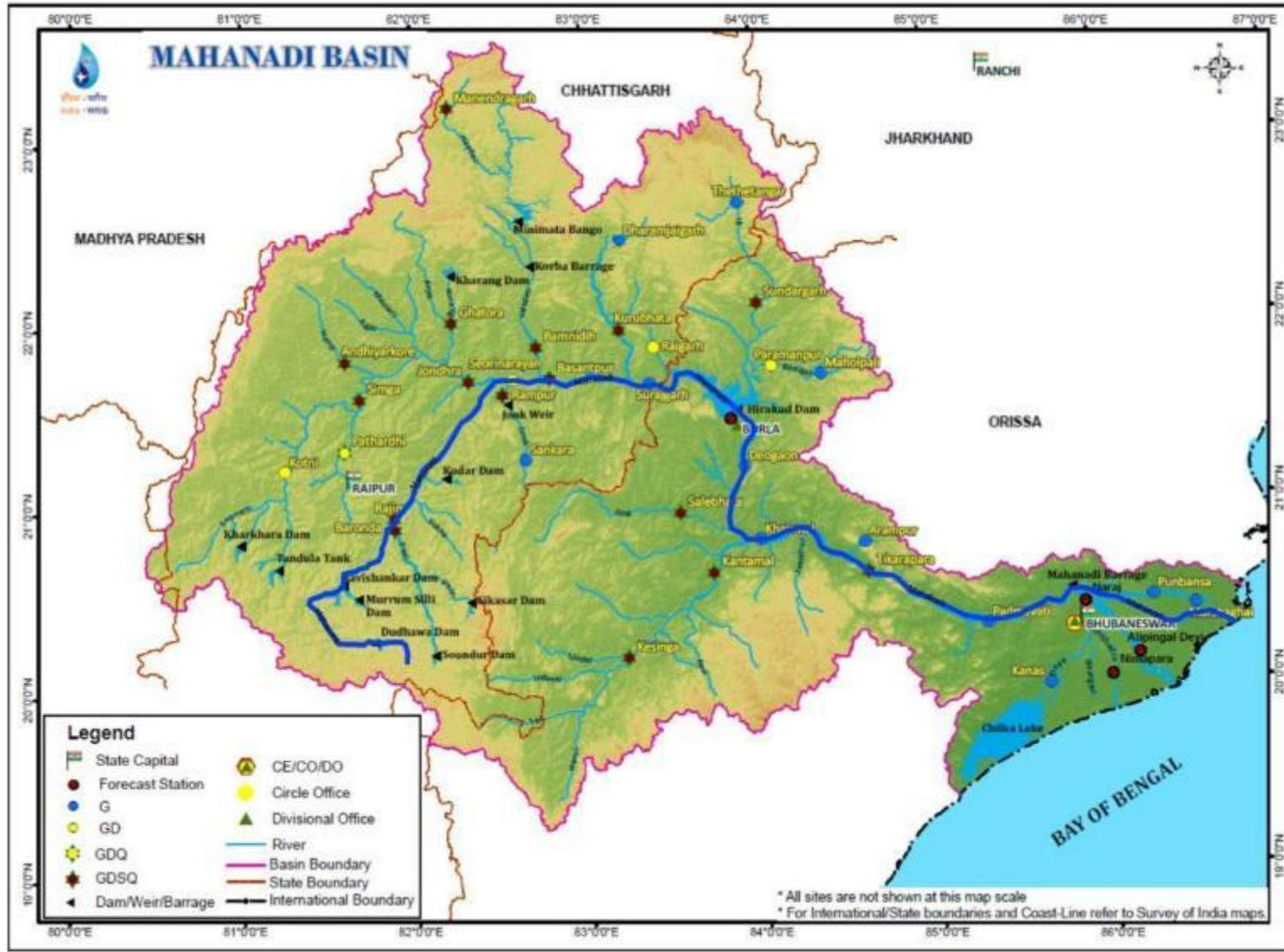
## 1.2 NEED FOR ADDITIONAL SPILLWAY PROJECT

Spillways are structures constructed to provide safe release of flood waters from a dam to a downstream area, normally the river on which the dam has been constructed. Every reservoir has a certain capacity to store water. If the reservoir is full and flood waters enter the same, the reservoir level will go up and may eventually result in over-topping of the dam leading to risk of dam break and random flooding of the area around the dam. To avoid this situation, the flood has to be passed to the downstream and this is done by providing a spillway which draws water from the top of the reservoir. A spillway can be a part of the dam or separate from it.

In the Hirakud dam also two controlled spillways have been provided – one at left bank and another at right dyke of the dam. The left spillway of the Hirakud Dam has 40 sluice gates and 21 crest gates. The right spillway has 24 sluice gates and 13 crest gates. The total discharging capacity of both the spillways is 42,450 m<sup>3</sup>/sec (150 million cusec). Further due to operational restrictions 11No. Sluice gates & 9 no. crest gates are not to be operated except in case of grave emergency. This limits the normal safe release capacity of the existing spillway to 11,67,720 cusec (33066 cumec). Also high flood were observed at the dam site of the order of 152.5 million cusec (43183 cumec) in July 1959 and 133.2 million cusec (37718 cumec) in Sept 1980, threatening safety of the dam. Further the dam safety analysis reveals that affected area is 10,700 square Km, where the severity of the consequences or the combination between depths and velocities can be classified as high and extreme in more than 65% of the total area. When the designed flood is routed through the reservoir and using the available spillways it was assessed that the dam can get overtopped which can result in failure of the dam resulting in large scale loss to life and properties in the downstream cities/Towns of Hirakud, Sambalpur, Cuttack, Burla, Jagatpur, Bhubaneswar, etc.

**1.2.1 Alternatives Considered**

The state government sought views & methods from experts and consultants to address the present problem of passing the additional flood discharge ensuring safety of Hirakud Dam. Amongst several alternatives, five of the following were considered for appraisal:

1. Raising the height of existing Dam.
2. Additional spillway on the left bank dyke near Gandhi minar and adjacent hillock.
3. Additional spillway on the right dyke.
4. Lowering the spill way crest level with corresponding increase of spill way crest gates.
5. Additional spillway with 5 Nos. crest gates at the left dyke and 8 nos. gates at the right bank dyke.

Further studies were carried out for all these feasible above alternatives through CWC experts, SPMU & WB’s consultant team and finally the best option considered was additional spillway at Left bank dyke and right bank dyke to meet the estimated discharge as per PMF level. These additional spillways will be constructed in two Phases. In Phase 1 the proposed spillway at left dyke will be taken up for which this RAP has been prepared. Phase 2 is not envisaged currently.

#### 1.4 RESETTLEMENT

Since the proposed alignment of the additional spillway at left dyke will pass through settlement area, displacement of 1,415 families from 716 households is envisaged due to the project. None of these households possess land title as they have occupied government lands. While it is considered as unauthorized occupancy, a few of them were displaced during the construction of the dam (sixty years back). None of them own any (agricultural) lands. In fact, it is an urban area and the affected habitation forms a part of Sambalpur electoral constituency. And most of them are quite poor drawing livelihoods on working as laborers. Thus, it is a unique situation wherein no household has any title, with the result, no policy (GOI/ WB) can be adopted to extend full scale resettlement and rehabilitation (R&R) assistance. However, Government of Odisha has exuded a very high degree of empathy and developed a special package for providing R&R assistance. Towards the preparation of a resettlement action plan (RAP), Government of Odisha (Water Resources department) has undertaken a baseline situational analysis and a social impact assessment.

## CHAPTER-2: APPROACH AND METHODOLOGY

### 2.1 INTRODUCTION

The chapter section presents the approach and methodology followed in collection and analysis of data. It involved both quantitative and qualitative approach to data collection

### 2.2 PRIMARY DATA COLLECTION

The entire exercise involved seven stages which are as follows:

The integrated approach to collecting information included primary census survey of households, secondary source information collection, physical observation of the situation, stakeholder consultation, colony level meetings, discussions with key informants, Focus Group Discussions, Participatory Rural Appraisal etc. Effort was made to collect and collate as much information possible so as to strengthen the database. Effort was made to involve all the affected

family members in the process of data collection at the household level so as to have a representative view of the household on the issues of displacement, compensation, resettlement and rehabilitation. Secondly, since such information aimed to shape their future life and livelihoods, sufficient time was given to family members to think and exercise their choice relating to compensation, resettlement and rehabilitation.

#### 2.2.1 Methodology

The methodology selected to conduct the study was to satisfy the objective and scope of laid down in the TOR approved by the World Bank. People's cooperation, involvement and participation were very crucial to collect data and other information that are adequate, relevant and reliable. Further, as people's participation is a pre-requisite to the success of any project various methods were therefore adopted to involve people and assess their needs and priorities. Table 2.2 below summarizes the approach.

### 2.2.2 Tools

Questionnaire and checklist method were adopted to conduct socio-economic and census surveys of the affected area. Survey questionnaire was prepared to capture wide range of socio-economic and cultural features of the affected persons and assets. Separate sections were incorporated to segregate types of information. In addition, separate check-lists were prepared to guide the Focused Group Discussions (FGD), colony (habitation) level discussions and discussion with the officials of the requiring department (water resources department) and other line departments.

The main household questionnaire was prepared in consultation with the requiring department and approved by it. Secondary information about the socio-economic profile of the district and project area was collected from authentic sources such as published government data and maps. Primary data on different socio-economic profile and cultural features were collected from actual site surveys. The different types of primary and secondary data collected are listed in following table:

#### Focus Group Discussions (FGDs)

In a focus group discussion, people from similar backgrounds or experiences are brought together to discuss a specific topic of interest to the investigators. The purpose of the FGD is to explore the range of opinions/views on displacement issues and to check if they corroborate with or complement to the household survey findings.

#### Methodology Used

The survey covered 100% of the households as it required to address issues and concerns of each and every household besides the broader issues confronting the common interests of the colonies. A brief description on these two types of information collected in the present study is presented below.

### 2.2.3 Quality Control of the Study

Monitoring and cross checking of the field level data collection was done to ensure quality of the collected information and by using the following methods.

- Regular cross checking in the field by Supervisor and Team Leader
- Daily meeting with the field team to get feedback
- Regular meeting with the project officials
- 10% data checking by the Survey Coordinator
- Checking of the data by the Team Leader
- Visit by the DoWR representatives

#### IT- enabling of Data

Data entry was done through different stages for this project. As the volume of data collected was huge, the IT-enabling had to be done in a step by step process. In the first stage, the entire data were entered through a single database system i.e. MS Access. Designing the database was done separately for the respondents across various occupation categories, the following steps were used.

- Discussion on the project with concepts



- Assessment of output requirements
- Scrutiny and validation of data
- Planning, designing and execution
- Development and programming
- Debugging of data
- Maintenance of data
- Testing of programmes custom-made to suit the requirement
- Implementation of programmes for output generation
- Preparation of two way tables
- Processing of data using Excel package
- Presentation of final output tables

Database designing was made with proper care by taking considerations of the primary key. Table creation and naming were done with the appropriate key words which matched with the proper criteria on the record, so that one can know the details regarding structure of the table, whether the field is made numeric or text or any other data type. The tables were designed in such a manner that its structure would strictly prohibit the duplication of data entry with the primary key. Similarly designing of forms was done based on the table structures. All the field names were designed based on the data records. It was done for the purpose of easy identification of the record, just in case something was found missing during the entry process.

After the creation of database software, data were entered separately for different colonies and separately for various sections as enlisted above. This was done for easy scrutinizing and analysis of data separately. The data were as far as possible cross checked with the original schedules, to ensure consistency and improve reliability. After that the data were transported to Excel sheet for further processing and analysis. The output was generated colony wise as well as for each of the question asked in the family profile schedule.

### **2.2.4 Public Consultation**

Considering the importance of people's participation in the project planning, public consultation and FGDs were also carried out at different levels at various stages of project preparation right from the survey from May, 2016 upto completion of the study. Both informal and formal consultations were undertaken. The informal consultation was carried out during field surveys. The formal consultations were carried out by providing advance intimation to the public with defined agenda. The objectives of the consultation were to disseminate information about the project to the potentially affected population in order to incorporate their views and suggestion in preparing the RAP. The consultation focused on identification of issues raised by the PAPs and its integration in the Resettlement Action Plan.

#### **2.2.4.1 Local Level Consultation**

It was ensured that intimation regarding the proposed consultations was given to the concerned village at least two days prior to consultations so as to maximize participation. The participants included village head and/or opinion leader of the village; community and potentially affected persons. The targeted segments included men and women affected by loss of residential structures; commercial structures; livelihood or sources of livelihood.

#### **2.2.4.2 Consultation with Other Stakeholders**

Consultations were held with concerned departments with the following objectives (i) to create awareness about the project among the district administration, and officials of line departments of the project and



other stakeholders.(ii) to study implementation arrangements and its capacity in delivering the R&R benefits

### 2.3 DEFINITIONS OF TERMS AND PHRASES

The following terms, words and phrases have been referred to and used in this RAP Report for better clarification of the reader. Though, some of the terms are indicated in the Act and Rules, for the purpose of relevance and importance the definition and connotation of all relevant words, terms and phrases are furnished below:

- 1) **Affected Area** means such area as notified by the Government of Odisha under the relevant land acquisition Acts for the purposes of land acquisition for the Project;
- 2) **Affected Household or Project Affected Household (PAH)** means either a single or joint family residing under one roof, using single kitchen and interdependent to each other.
- 3) **Family** includes a person, his or her spouse, minor children, minor brothers and sisters dependent on him: Provided that widows, divorcees and women deserted by families, shall be considered as separate families.
- 4) **Affected Family (AF)** means Affected family means a family whose land is affected by construction of the project but not necessarily displaced or required to be displaced.
- 5) **Displaced Family** means a family ordinarily residing in the project area prior to the date of publication of notification under the provision of the relevant Act and an account of acquisition of his/her homestead land is displaced from such area or required to be displaced.
- 6) **Project Affected Persons (PAPs)** means affected population consisting of major (above or 18 year of age) and minor (below 18 years of age) living within project affected area.
- 7) **Below poverty line or BPL Family** means below poverty line families as defined by the Planning Commission of India, from time to time, and those included in the BPL list of Odisha State in force.
- 8) **Central Government** means the Government of India.
- 9) **Cut off Date:** As all the households in the project lack formal title, the end date of baseline census and socio-economic survey is considered as the Cut-off date i.e. 25th May 2016.. This date shall be considered as the date for declaring affected persons eligible to receive entitlements. No persons who move into the project area after determination of the 'Cut-off-date" will not be eligible for any benefit. Here cut-off-date
- 10) **District Collector** means the officer appointed by the State Government as a Collector and District Magistrate of a District.
- 11) **Employee** means an individual engaged by a likely displaced commercial establishment in the proposed land acquisition, for compensation under a contract for employment whether oral or written, express or implied.
- 12) **Landless** means the landless person as defined in the Odisha Prevention of Land Encroachment Act 1972.
- 13) **Project** means construction of Additional Spillway of Hirakud Dam under (DRIP) for DoWR, Odisha in Sambalpur district.
- 14) **Rehabilitation and Resettlement** means as per policy carrying out rehabilitation and resettlement under ORRP, 2006.
- 15) **R and R or R & R** means Rehabilitation and Resettlement



- 16) **R & R Entitlements** means the benefits as prescribe and developed for this project approved by the Government of Odisha.
- 17) **Squatter** means those persons: i) who have illegally occupied government lands for residential, business and or other purposes for a minimum of 3 years prior to the Cut Off date and ii) those who have been residing or operating on public land as on date of baseline census survey.
- 18) **State Government** refers to the Government of Odisha;
- 19) **Tenants** are those: i) persons having bona fide tenancy agreements for three years prior to the acquisition of the land, with a property owner with clear property titles, to occupy a structure or land for residence, business or other purposes and ii) those identified during baseline census socio-economic survey
- 20) **Vulnerable groups:** persons such as differently abled, widows, and women headed household, persons above sixty years of age, Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribes and other groups as may be specified by the State Government of Odisha.
- 21) **Women Headed Household** means a family headed by a woman and does not have a male earning member or the Male member is not earning/ not capable of earning. This woman may be a widow, separated or deserted woman.



## CHAPTER-3: SOCIO-ECONOMIC PROFILE

This chapter describes the baseline information on socio-economic profile of the project area based on secondary information as well as project specific site surveys. The Chapter contains different sections which are;

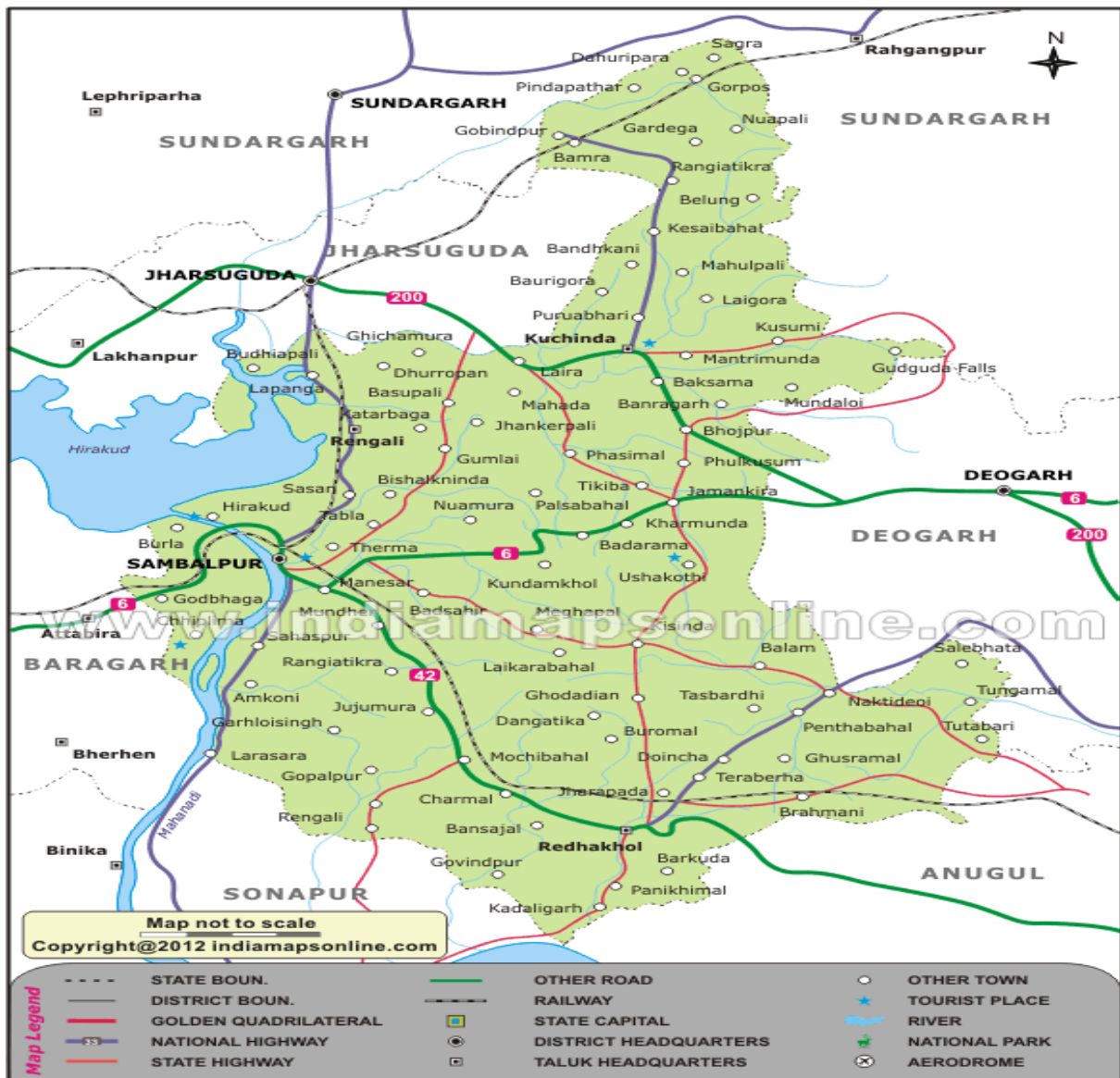
- 1) secondary data containing the baseline information on the district where the Hirakud Dam is located, the detail profile of the project area, the profile of the village/colony profiles, general infrastructure survey, village wise social and cultural activities.
- 2) Primary data both quantitative and qualitative pertaining to the affected families such as demography, occupation, income level, vulnerability, education etc.
- 3) Details of housing structure and condition in the project affected villages/colonies
- 4) Assets owned by the families, Govt. programmes availed by the families, health status, cultural practices, accessibility to service centres etc.
- 5) People's perception on the proposed project

### 3.1 DISTRICT PROFILE

Sambalpur District is located in the western part of the state of Odisha. It is surrounded by Deogarh district to the east; Bargarh and Jharsuguda districts to the west; Sundargarh District to the north; and Sonepur and Angul Districts to its south. The District covers a geographical area of 6702 sq km and lies between 20° 40' to 22°11' North Latitude and 82° 39' to 85°15' East Longitude.

The district is having a total population of 1041099 as per 2011 census distributed over 526877 male and 514222 female. The district has a schedule caste population of 191827 and schedule tribe population of 355261. For Administrative reasons, the district has been further divided into 3 Sub Divisions (Sambalpur, Kuchinda and Rairakhol), 9 Tahasils, 9 Blocks , 23 police stations , 136 Gram Panchayats and 1349 Revenue Villages. The district is famous for its rich cultural value and glorifying history. Sambalpuri Saree is famous for its ikkat style of weaving and colourful designs.

### 3.1.1 Physiographic condition of the District

Sambalpur district has three common geo-morphological features comprising of denudational hills, pediments and pediplains and can be divided broadly as; i) Northern hilly terrain of Bamra and Kuchinda, ii) South eastern plateau and ridges of Rairiakhol and iii) South eastern valley and plains of Sambalpur Sadar sub-division. Average elevation of major parts of the district ranges from 100- 300 meters above mean sea level with isolated hill peaks having height up to 600 meters above mean sea level. 7 Most parts of the district are drained by Mahanadi (with Harihar Jore, Surbali Jore, Karandi Jore and Jhul jore as tributaries), Ib (along with Bhedan as tributaries) and Bramhani (with Tikara and tributary). Famous Hirakud reservoir constructed by damming Mahanadi River occupies about 250 square KMs of area in Sambalpur district. Other important rivulets of the district are Maltijor, Harrad, Kulsara, and Phuljiharan.

### 3.1.2 Hydrogeology

Sambalpur district has been divided into two major hydrogeological units, viz; (1) Consolidated formations comprising of hard rocks of Precambrian age occupying 85% of the area and (2) Semi



consolidated rocks of Gondwana Super Group occurring in pockets in northern and southern eastern parts. Consolidated formations include Granite Gneisses, Khondalites, Charnockites, Schistose rocks and Epidorites. Secondary porosity forms the conduits for movement of groundwater and also act reservoir of groundwater. Groundwater occurs under pheratic conditions in upper weathered residium of rock masses at shallower depths. At deeper levels in fractured and joined rocks it occurs under semi confined to confined conditions.

Ground water regime conditions of the district are monitored through 46 National hydrograph stations for quantity and quality during January, April, August and November months. Depth to water levels during pre-monsoon period (April) range from 5 to 10 meters below ground levels in most parts of the districts. Whereas in limited western canal irrigated parts shallow depth to water levels of the order of 2 to 5 meters below ground levels are also observed.

A deeper water level of the order of more than 10 mbgl is observed in the southwestern part of the district. (Plate III) During the post monsoon period (November) most parts of the district have depth to water levels in the range of 2 to 5 meters below ground levels with shallow depth to water levels of the order of 0 to 2 meters below ground levels in the same period in some limited isolated pockets in western parts having canal irrigation network.

### 3.1.3 Demographic Profile of the District (2011 Census)

The demographic profile of the district may be presented as follow. It is to be noted that the population density per square Kilo Meter is arrived at 157 as per 2011 census.

### 3.1.5 Culture and Language of the District

Being situated in the lap of nature Sambalpur has a vivid culture mixed up with that of modern and the tribal culture of the forest region. The language, festivals, songs and dances and everything is deeply connected with the cultural heritage of Sambalpur. The language of the people is called “Sambalpur”. Sambalpur dance forms are mostly performed in order to convey the prayers to the deities. Sambalpur dance is also folkloric dance form which has its roots in western parts of Odisha. A dance form named Dalkhai is performed by young girls of several communities during festive occasions.

These young girls form a queue or form a semi-circular formation and sing the traditional song which are known as Dalkhai songs. Karma is another famous tribal dance form performed by the tribal to honour deities. Folk music is famous in the district. Rangabati has been an ever shining song of the district. Sital Sasti, Nuakahi, Rath Yatra, Bhai Jhunia festival, pua jhunia festival are the important festival of Sambalpur district. Sambalpur is also famous worldwide for its Sambalpur Saree that combines in it beauty, rich textile and ikkat style of hand weaving.





### 3.1.6 Economy of the District

The economy of Sambalpur District is basically dependent on agriculture and secondly on forests. Forests play an important role in the economy in terms of contribution to revenue, domestic Product as well as dependence of people for livelihood. In the past Sambalpur has been a great centre of diamond trade. Kendu leaf (*Diospyros Melanoxylon*) is also produced in Sambalpur. Tendu leaf is one of the most important non-wood forest products of Sambalpur and is also called as green gold of Odisha. Lately industrialization has started in the district and the prime industries of power, alumina and steel have been established. The place is famous for its globally renowned textile bounded patterns and fabrics locally known as Baandha. Sambalpur is famous for its Hand loom textile works, popularly known as Sambalpuri Textile. It has earned international fame for its unique pattern, design and texture. Apart from textiles, Sambalpur has a rich tribal heritage and fabulous forestlands.

The important crops grown in the District are rice, gram, tur, arhar, sesame, groundnut, mustard, castor, linseed. Sugarcane is the most important cash crop grown in the District. Hirakud Dam is located near Sambalpur city that has contributed to the agriculture sector a lot in terms of providing irrigation facilities through its canal system and hydro-power generation.

### 3.1.7 Economic Activities of the District

The major economic activity in Sambalpur district is agriculture based that has led to the establishment of agro-processing units. Handloom Textile is another important economic activity. In the trading activity forest produces play an important role in the economy in terms of contribution to revenue and domestic product. Kendu leaf or Coromandel Ebony or East Indian Ebony also forms part of the economy of Sambalpur with many bidi manufacturing units functioning in and around Sambalpur. Sambalpur city is the main merchandising area of the people in the district. It is famous for handloom and other textile products. Mahanadi Coal Field Limited, a subsidiary of Coal India Limited located at Sambalpur produced 100.28 million tonnes of coal and had a profit before tax during 2010–2011 at Rs 4039.30 crore. The Hirakud smelter, set up by Indal in 1959 at Hirakud was the country's second aluminium smelter operating on grid power sourced from the hydro power station of the Hirakud Dam. It was the first in India to adopt clean coal combustion technology that uses a circulating fluidised bed, which is considered environmentally friendly. Currently the smelter has a capacity of 213,000 tpa, it provides employment to around 1700 persons.

### 3.1.8 Factors Contributing to Local Livelihoods

Agriculture has been the main livelihood of the people. Irrigation facilities developed under the Hirakud Dam project particularly the canal system has contributed significantly to the growth of the sector in the district. The multiple crops grown are rice, gram, tuar, arhar, sesame, groundnut, mustard, castor, linseed. Sugarcane is the most important cash crop grown in the District providing income opportunities to the farming families. Agro based processing units that exists based on agro-products are providing employment opportunities to the people for sustenance of their livelihood. As tendu leaf is available in sufficient quantity in the nearby forest, bulk of population mainly marginalized sections engage themselves in bidi making activity to sustain their livelihood.

As mentioned elsewhere in the report, Sambalpuri textiles are world famous for their ethnic designs, ikkat style of weaving, beauty and richness of textile fabric. Being a traditional occupation of certain communities, people practice the same as major source of income earning for their livelihood sustenance. Mining activity is another important activity that provides jobs to large number of people who work in coal mines. The major mining player found in the district is the Mahanadi Coal Fields Ltd.



The big industries like Hirakud Smelter dealing with aluminium smelter provide employment to thousands of people. It is to be noted that the Hirakud Smelter consumes power from the Hydro Power unit of Hirakud Dam. Trading of different produces also provide ample opportunities to the major chunk of population in the district.

### 3.1.9 Soil Type, Land Type and Use

The topography of the district is mostly undulating comprising ridges and valleys. All the ridges crest are the uplands and the upper slopes—the unbanded and banded are locally called Att and Mal lands respectively. These together constitute the high lands. The valley bottom lands are called Berna lands. The low lands are called Bahal lands.

Mainly two types of soils occur in Sambalpur district i.e. (1) Ultisols consisting of red, yellow and lateritic soils & (2) Alfisols predominantly include red gravelly, sandy, loamy, red earth mixed with black soils. The alfi soils cover about 60% of the area and are devoid of any lime concretions with pH ranging from 6.5-7.3. These are very fertile soils. The red forest soil is available in Rairakhol and Kuchinda sub division, which are suitable for orchards & dry land crops like Arhar. The brown forest soil is available in Kuchinda area, which is suitable for fruit crops, Sandy soil suitable for Ground nut & pulses are available in several areas.

The district has been divided into 3 Agriculture Districts namely Sambalpur, Kuchinda and Rairakhol comprising nine (9) blocks. Out of these nine blocks Dhankauda, Maneswar, Jujumura are mostly and part of Rengali as well as Jamankira are coming under Hirakud Command area. The rest blocks are of rain-fed. The area under the Command area of Hirakud Dam Project has a fairly developed agricultural zone which contributes for the development of the locality and supports to other sector.

### 3.1.10 Climatic Condition

Sambalpur District experiences extreme type of climate with 66 rainy days and 153 centi meters rainfall on an average per annum. Most of the rainfall is confined to the months from June to October visited by south west monsoon. Mercury raises upto 47 degree C during May with intolerable heat wave and falls as low as 11.8 degree C during December with extreme cold. The rainfall is highly uneven and irregular.

## 3.2 SOCIOECONOMIC PROFILE OF THE AFFECTED AREA

The proposed area of the project is located on the downstream of the left bank canal. The entire project area is located in the urban area. The project area is owned by the Govt. mainly the Water Resources Department. In course of time squatters started settling down there including the few of the displaced families during construction of Hirakud Dam project. The proposed project area is extended over seven colonies such as First Gap colony, Cable Colony, Rerolling Colony, Premnagar, Laxmi Nagar, Gujatal and Gandhi Nagar. The habitation in these areas consists of multi-caste people such as General, OBC, SC and ST.

The households in the affected settlement areas are located in a scattered manner. Caste and ethnic feelings are reflected in the concentrated groups of caste wise households. For instance, STs have preferred to stay together in proximity with each other and the same for other caste groups also. The Sambalpur Municipal Corporation has acknowledged the households and provided house numbers to some of the households mainly in cable colony, rerolling colony, Premnagar and Gandhinagar. There are primary schools, SHGs and other caste specific cultural groups within the colonies. The dispensaries, higher level of education facilities and market places are near to the colonies within a distance of 3 kms. The Hirakud Dam has its site offices within some of the colonies. The internal road communication within the community is partly pucca and kachha.



Since most of them are squatters, they have adopted different occupations such as petty shops, trading, vending, fish business, wage labour, job holders etc. A majority of them are under below poverty line and lead a subsistence living. All of them have access to Govt. schemes and programmes. With the initiative of the Govt. drinking water, electricity and other facilities have been provided to them.

As regards educational status of the families, majority population are found to be literate and education level is high up to matriculation level. Higher level of education like Graduate, Post Graduate and technically qualified persons are very insignificant. Generally they speak Sambalpuri language except tribal people having their own language to communicate within their kith and kin. Sambalpuri dance such as Dalkhai dance or Karma, a dance form of tribal groups are performed by the community members to please the deities.

Sital Sasthi, Nuakhai, Rath Yatra, Bhai Junta Festival, Puajuntia festival are some of the important festivities in the colonies besides many other caste and tribe specific rituals. The community members live together in brotherhood relationship with each other and manifest the unity and togetherness for the larger interest of the humanitarian cause. The community level disputes are amicably solved in colony level meetings.

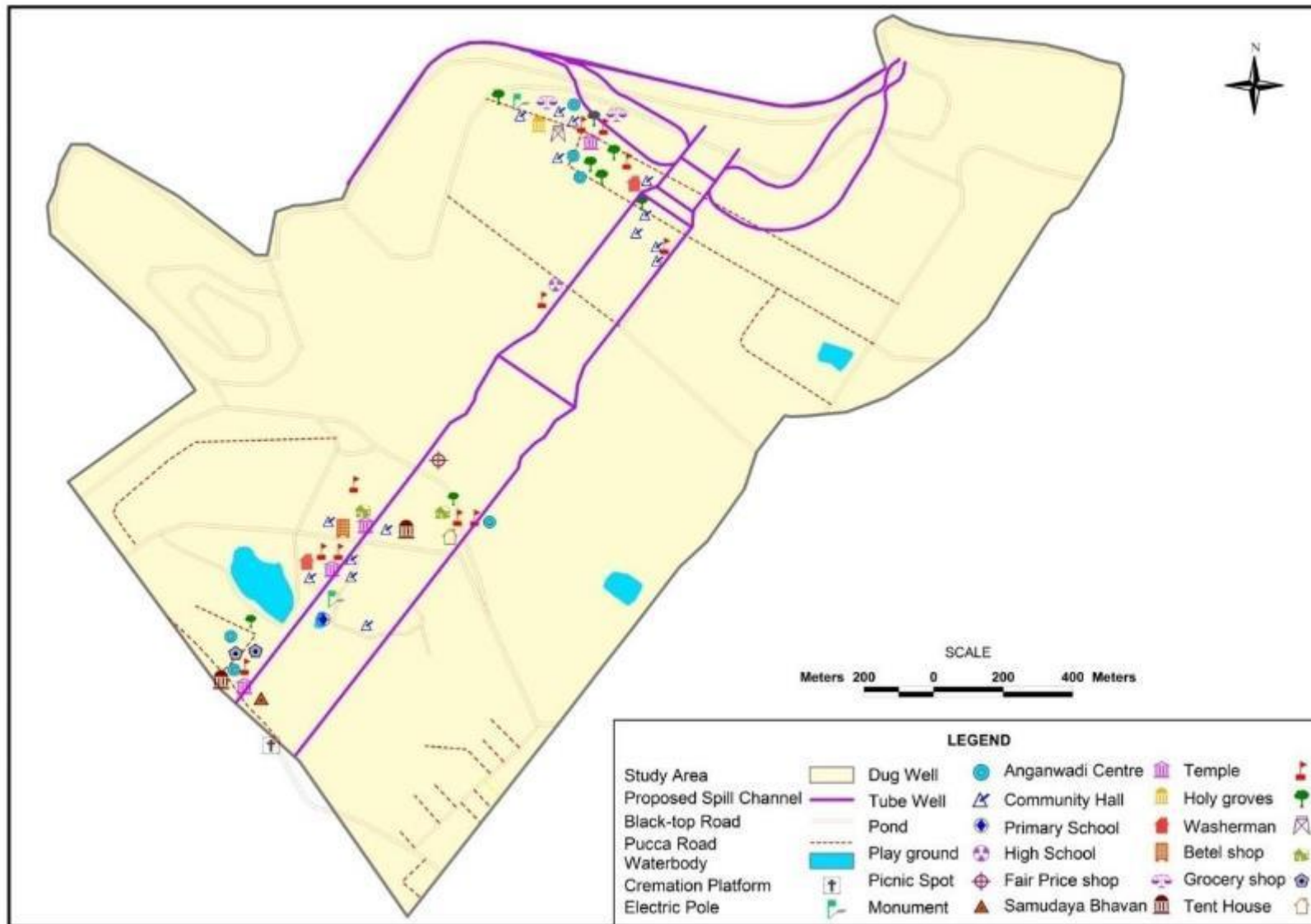


Fig. 3-4: Resources map of Project affected area through GPS

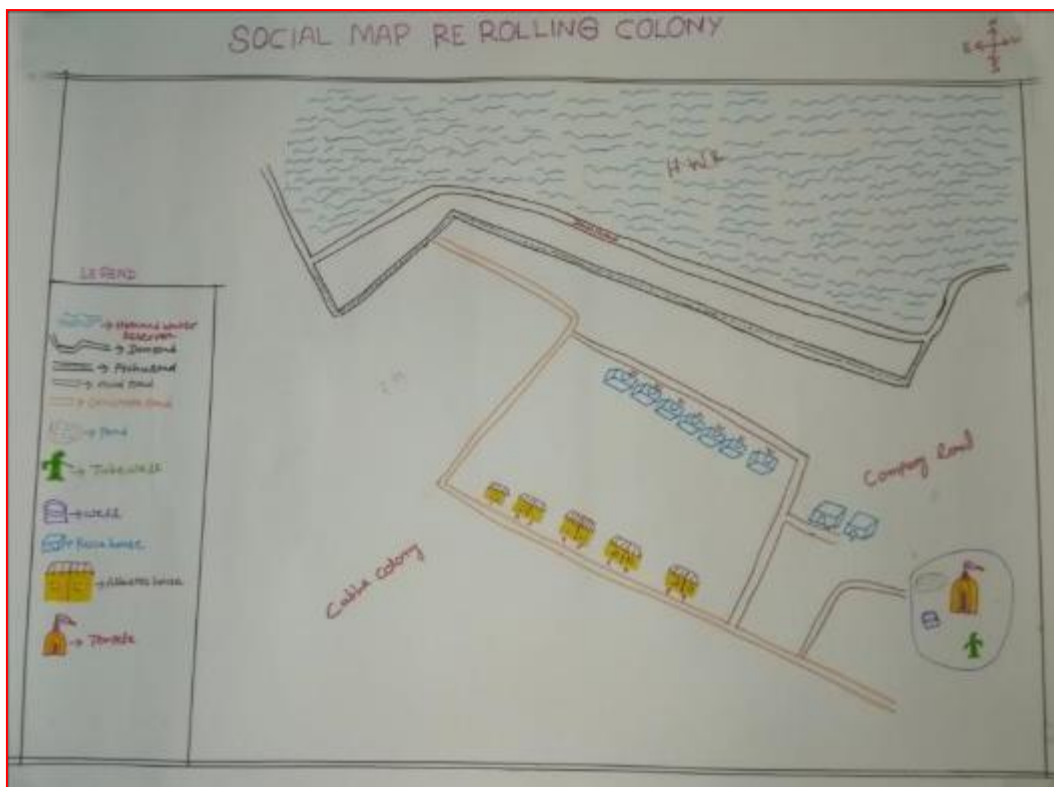


Fig. 3-7: Social map of Rerolling colony

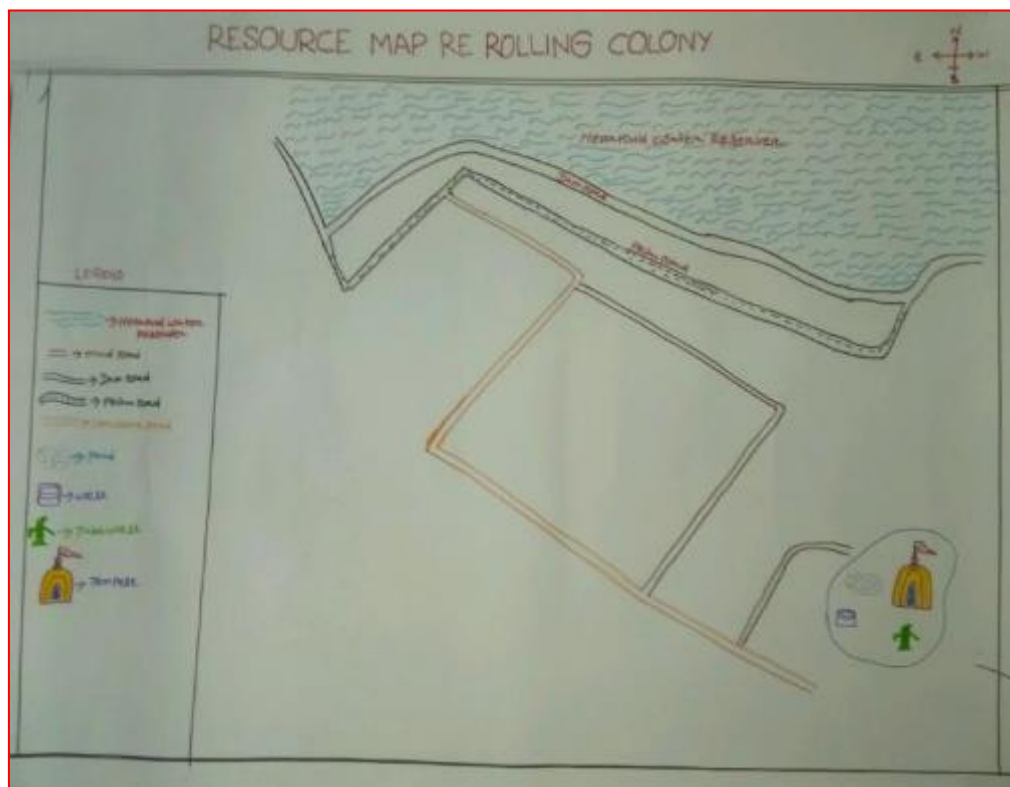


Fig. 3-8: Resources map of Rerolling colony

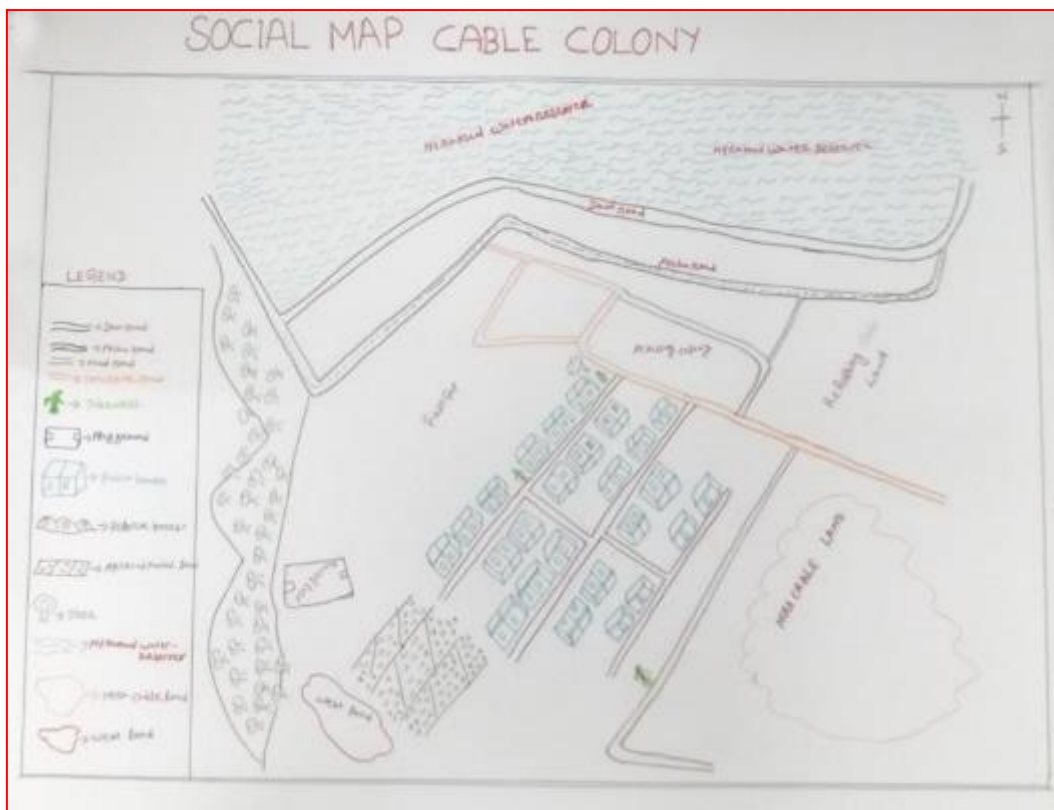


Fig. 3-9 : Social map of Cable

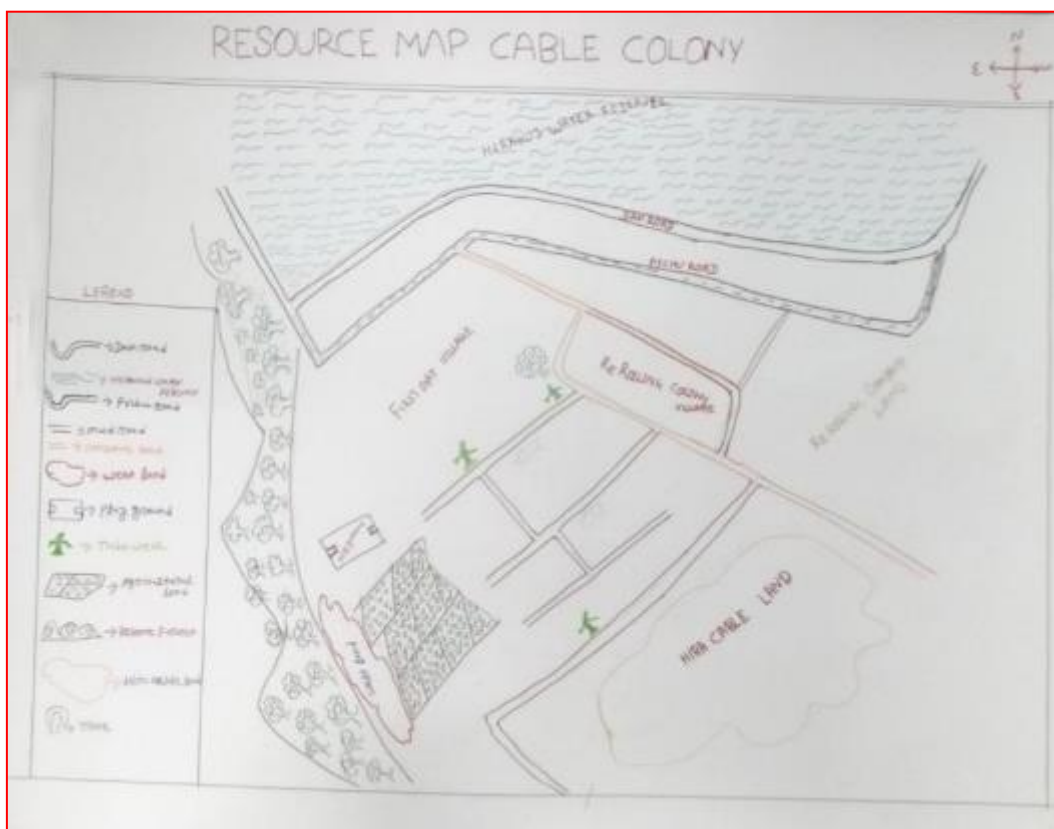


Fig. 3-10 : Resource map of Cable colony

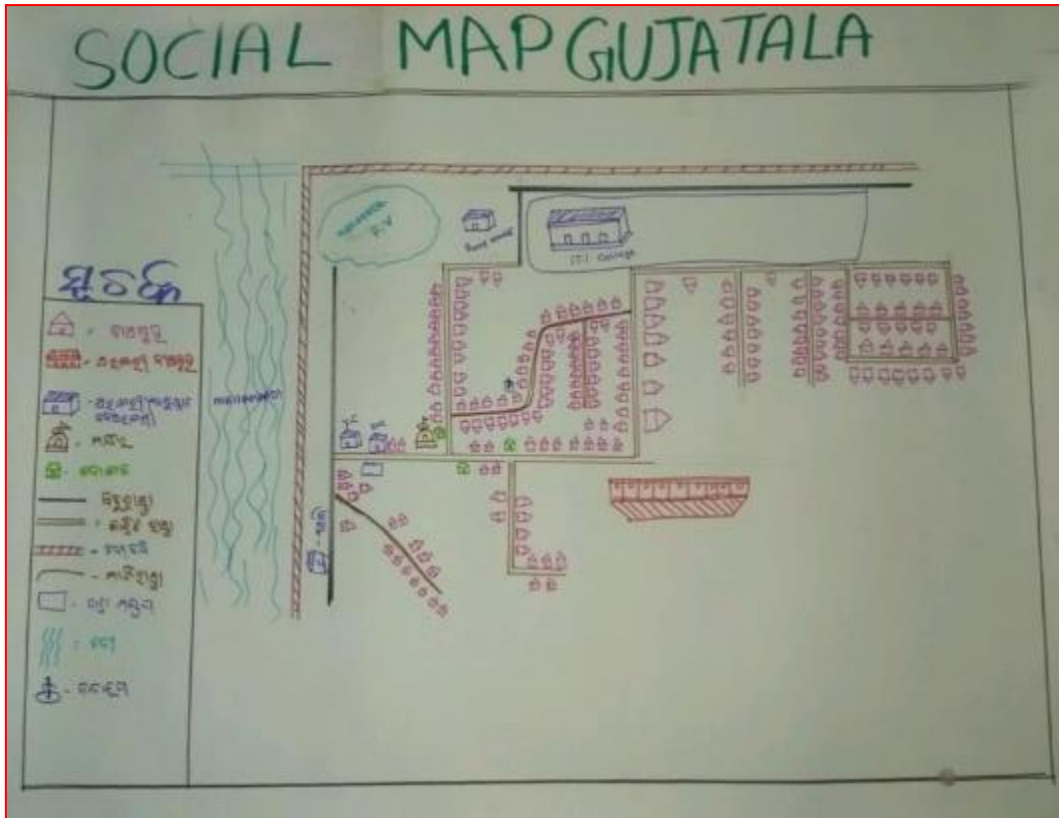


Fig. 3-15: Social map of Gujatal

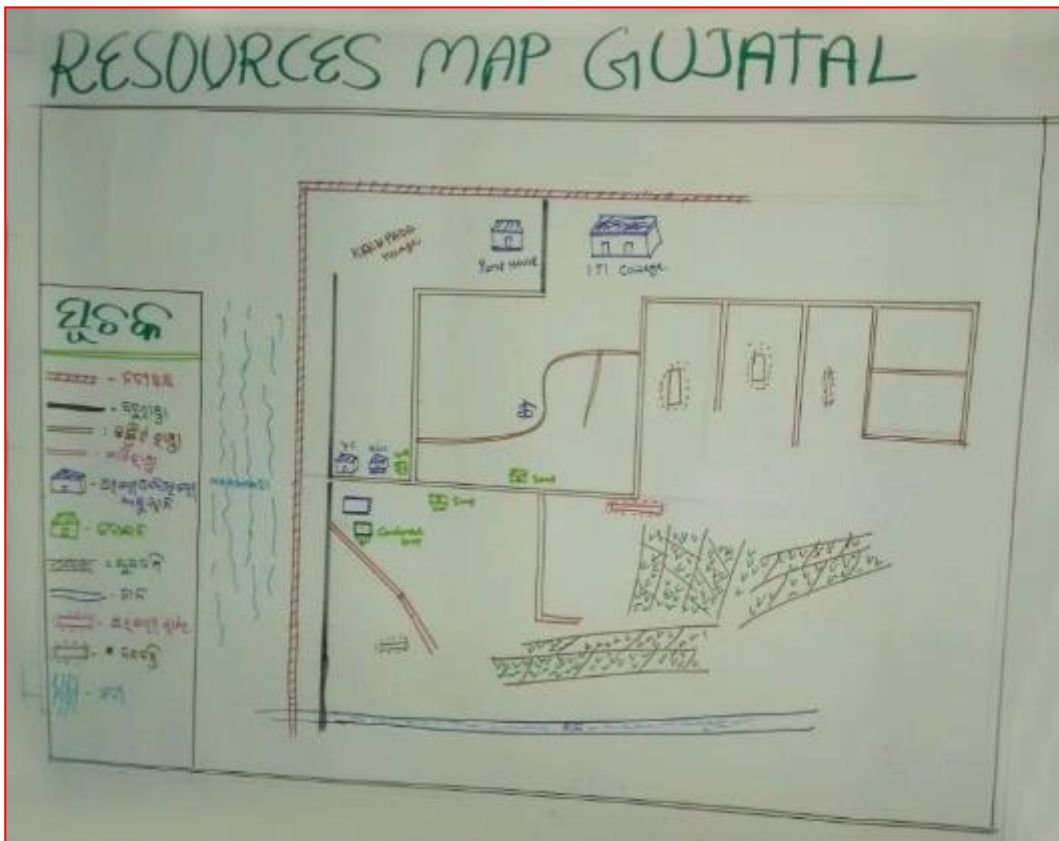


Fig. 3-16: Resources map of Gujatal



### 3.2.2 Socio-Cultural Practices of the People in Affected Colonies

Since all colonies are part of the Hirakud urban area so the cultural traditions are observed with much pomp and gaiety in all colonies. All bow down and respect “Maa Samalai” as their principal deity. Some of the major festivals are listed below:

- “*Nuakhai*” is the most important social festival of Sambalpur. Generally it takes place during the month of August and September. Preliminary preparation of the festival starts 15 days before the occasion. The first grains of the paddy crop, cooked into various dishes are offered to the deities. There after the eldest member of the family distributes new rice to other members of the family. People observe and practice much serenity during this festival.
- The *Bhai-juntia* festival is celebrated on the Mahastami Day of Durga Puja. It is a total fasting undertaken by women without water for the whole day and night to seek Goddess Durga's blessing for the long life of their brothers.
- The *Puo-juntia* festival is observed by mothers to invoke the grace of Lord Dutibahana for the long life and prosperity of their sons by staying fasting the whole day.
- *Chaitra Punei* is another festival which is celebrated by the Khadia people of Firstgap colony. In that festival people are offering animal sacrifices (*Pasu Bali*) to their almighty god to full fill their desire. Karma puja is also celebrated by the Khadia community. They consume homemade brewery called as “Handia”. At the age seven the every member of Khadia community will have ear piercing to wear silver and gold ring.
- *Dushahara* is also another attraction of Hirakud town, which is celebrated for seven days with big mela.
- “*Manabasa*” is also celebrated by the affected people in the months of November to December to worship the Goddess Maa Laxmi for wealth.

## 3.3 SOCIO ECONOMIC CONDITIONS OF THE AFFECTED PEOPLE

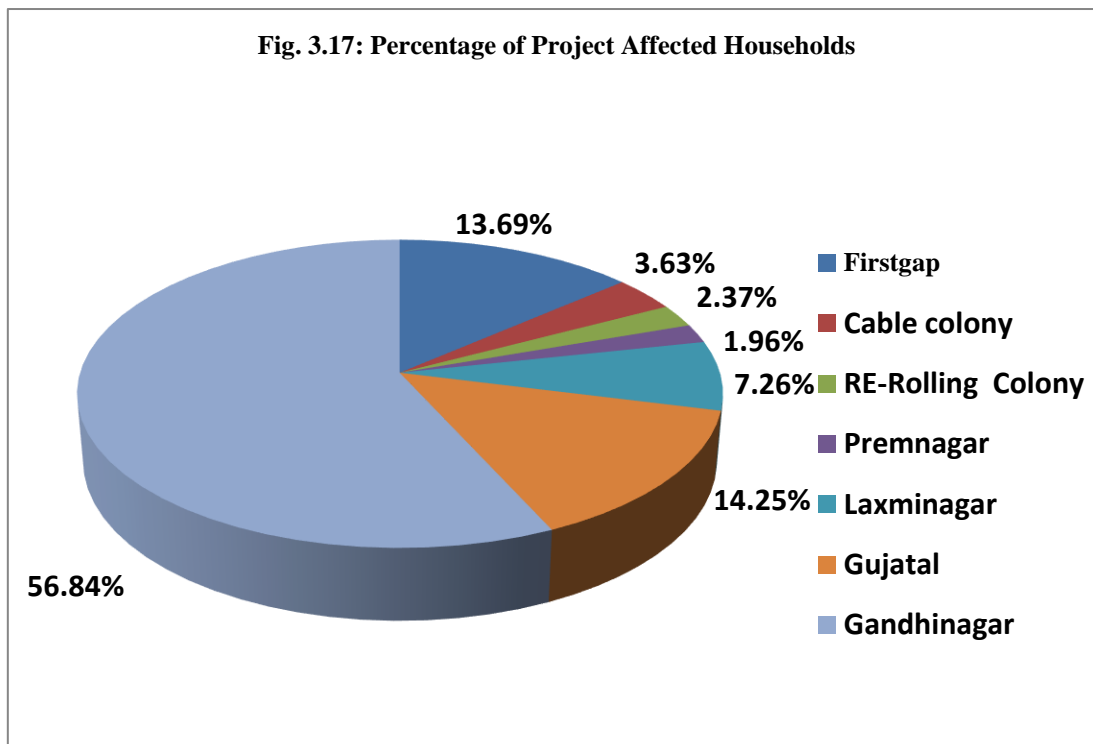
### 3.3.1 Quantification of Affected Households Colony wise

The objective of the present study is to assess the impact of proposed land requirement for the proposed Spill Way and Spill Channel on the left side of Hirakud Dam. A detailed survey has been done in order to collect necessary information, and to draw neutral assumptions based on the facts and figures for a better planning towards resettlement and rehabilitation of the affected population.

As per detailed survey within the impact corridor, a total number of 716 house hold will be affected due to the proposed project. The colony wise details are presented in **Table 3.5** below. It is evident from the table that major concentration of affected households are in Gandhinagar 407 (56.84%) followed by Gujatal 102 (14.25%) and First Gap 98 (13.69%). In other colonies the affected households vary from 14 – 52. For more details, Please refer to **Annexure- III**.

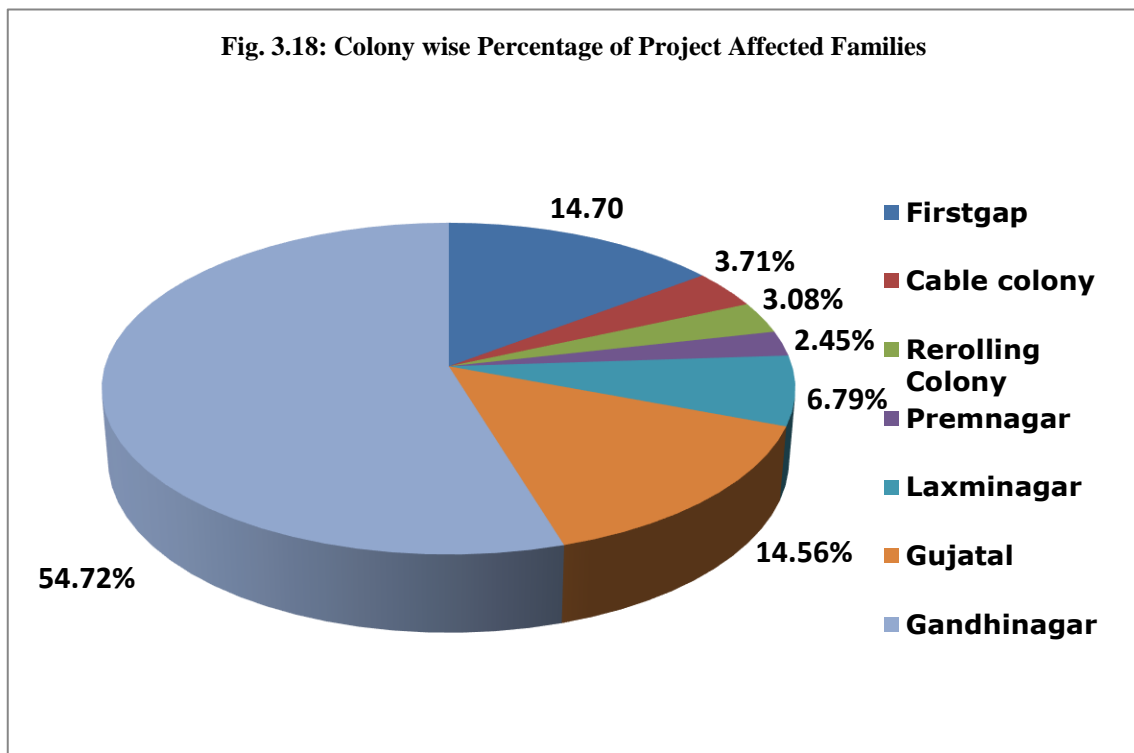


### 3.3.1.1 Total number of Project Affected Families

As per the definition of the R&R policy 2006 of Govt. of Odisha, the numbers of affected families have been estimated to 1415. The families include major sons, daughters, brothers, sisters, grandsons and granddaughters, persons with disability, widow, divorcee and orphans in the family living in the house with the head of the family. The table shows that there are 774 (54.70%) families in Gandhinagar, 208 (14.70%) families in Gujatal, 207 (14.63%) in Firstgap are going to be affected. ### 3.3.1.2 Category-wise project affected families

As per this categorization of families under the R&R policy 2006, the survey reveals that out of the 1415 total families, 716(50.1%) are head of the families, 396 (28.0%) are major sons followed by 145 (10.1%) major daughter, 41 (2.9%) major grandson, 40 (2.8%) widowed, 22 (1.5%) major brother, 15 (1.0%) disables, 25 (1.75) dependent father/mother/in-laws, 13 (0.9%) major granddaughter, 7 (0.5) divorcee, 8(0.6%) major sister and 1 (0.1%) orphan. The majority of families (782) are in Gandhinagar followed by 210 in First Gap, 208 in Gujatal, 97 in Laxmi Nagar, 53 in cable colony, 44 in Rerolling and 35 in Premnagar.

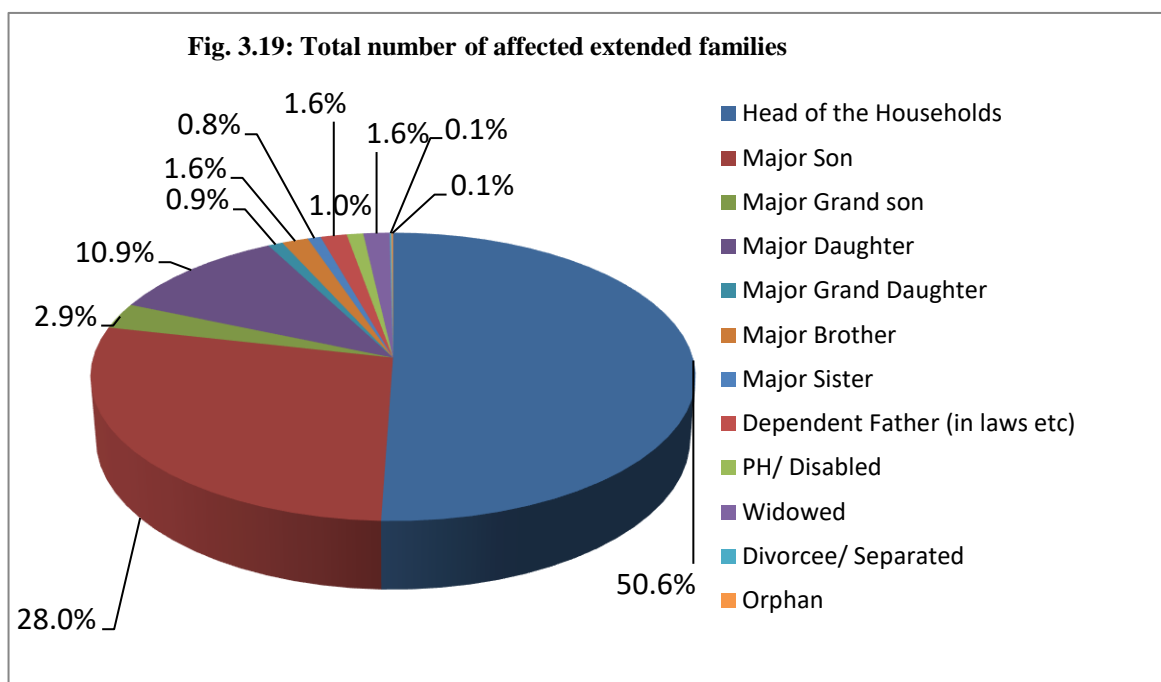

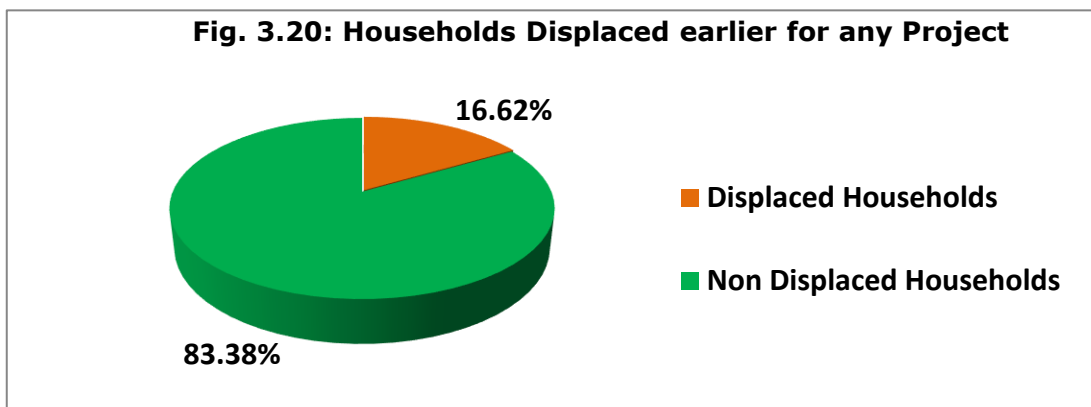
### 3.3.2 Displacement Population

The study reveals that the affected households have prior displacement experience. Out of 716 affected households, 119 (16.62%) across 7 colonies have earlier displacement experiences. Out of total 119 displaced households, 90 (12.57%) households are from First Gap colony constituting 12.57% of total affected households from this area. In rest of the affected settlement areas, the ratio of such earlier displaced household vary between 1-2% of the total affected households in respective colonies. This shows that, the remaining 597 (83.38%) households do not have any earlier displacement experience, the maximum being 395 in Gandhinagar colony. The detailed list of colony wise households with prior displacement experience is presented in **Table 3.8** below.

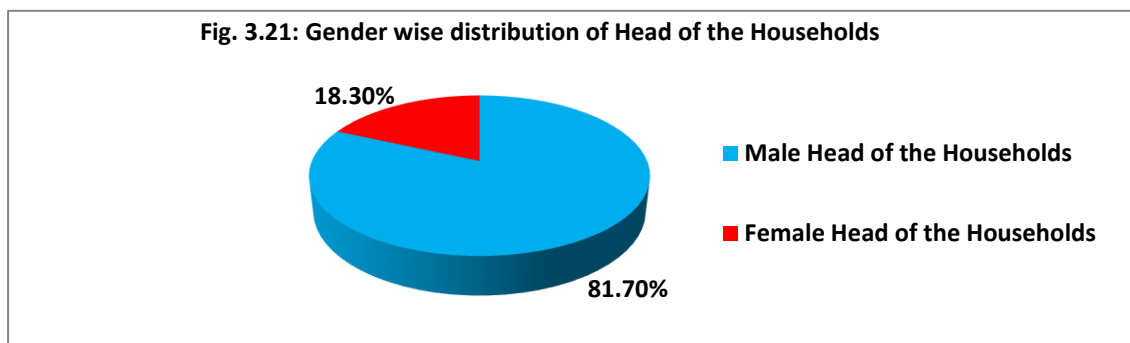


### 3.3.3 Gender wise distribution of Heads of Household

It is to be noted that out of 716 households, 585 (81.7%) are male headed households and 131 (18.3%) are female headed households. As 18.3% of households are headed by women, they need special attention while planning for resettlement of the affected families. As observed, while the male headed households are majority in Gandhinagar i.e 335, there are 84 male headed households in Gujatal followed by 75 in First Gap. In other colonies the number varies within 12-46. Similarly in the category of Female Headed households majority are from Gandhinagar representing total 72 numbers followed by First Gap (23), Gujatal (18) and in rest other colonies the number varies within 2-6. 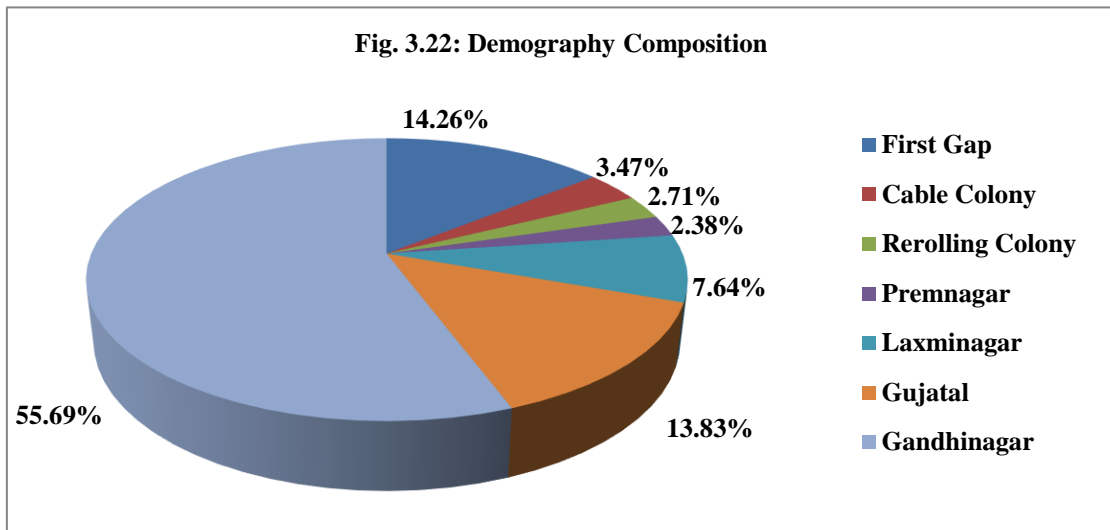


### 3.3.4 Colony wise affected Population and gender profile of Project Affected Households

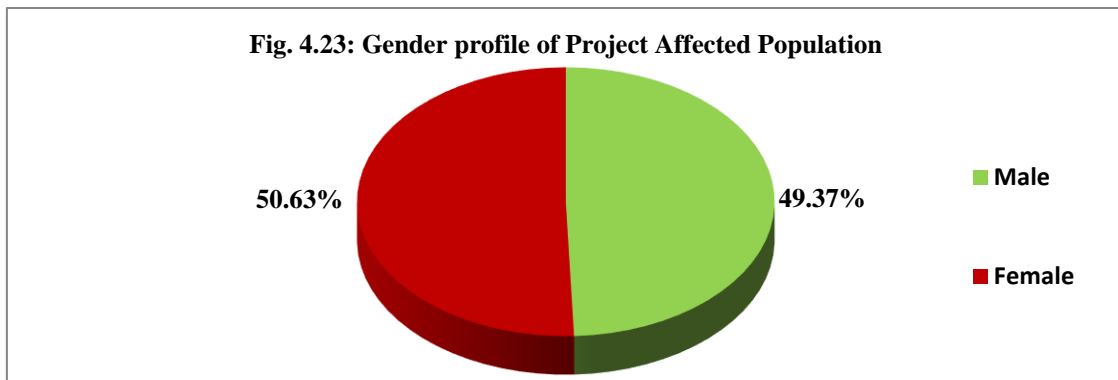

Coming to the colony wise classification of the affected population, it is observed that in First Gap colony out of total 3022 affected persons, 431 reside in First Gap Colony, 105 in Cable Colony, 1683 in Gandhinagar 418 in Gujatal, 72 in Premnagar, 82 in Re-rolling colony and 231 in Laxminagar.. 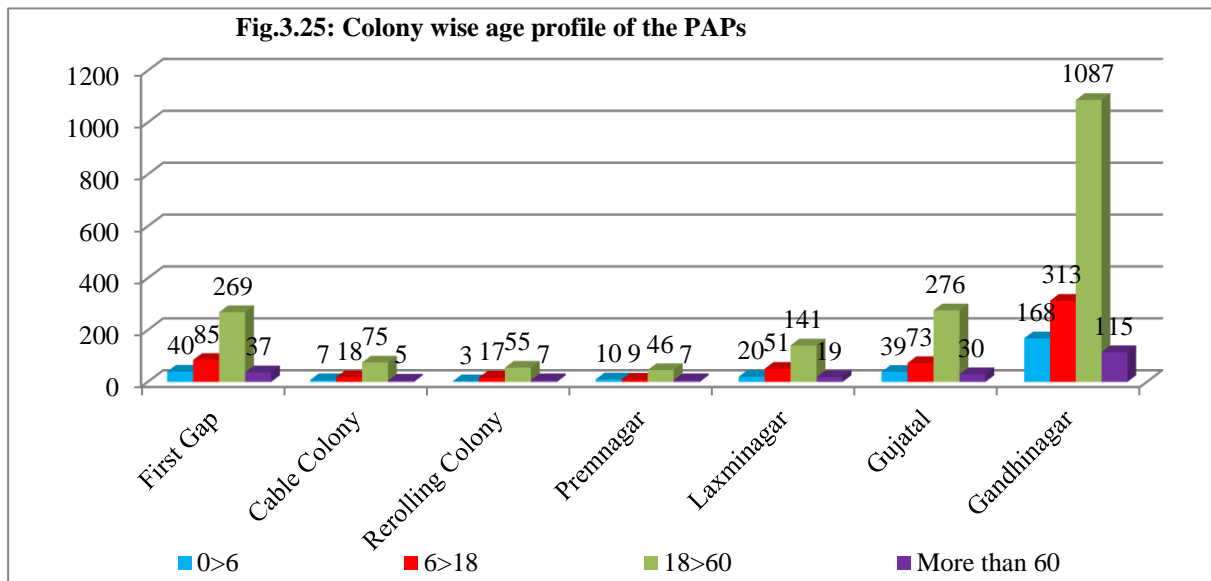


### 3.3.5 Colony wise Age profile of affected population

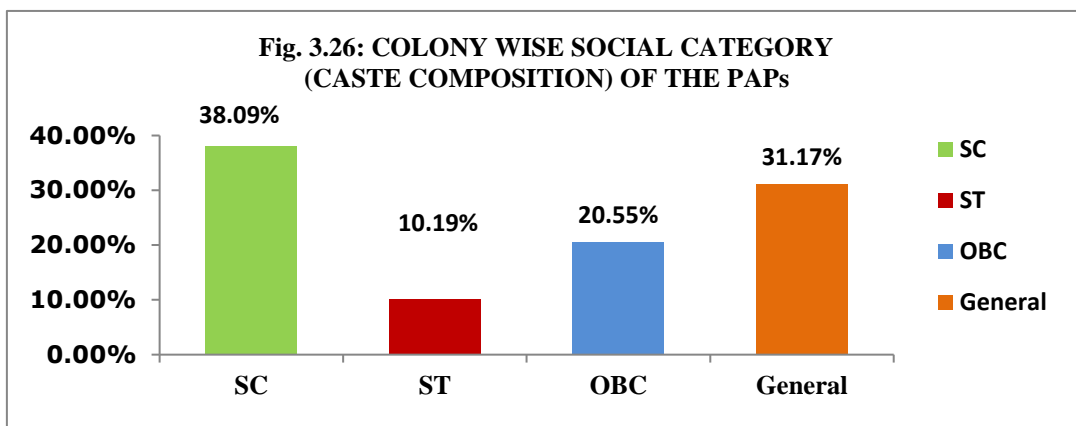

### 3.3.6 Social Category (Caste Composition) of PAPs

All seven colonies are multi-caste communities. The details of caste wise population composition are presented in the following table no 3.12. It is understood from the table that there are 1151 (38.09%) SC population, 308 (10.19%) ST population, 621 (20.55%) OBC, and 942 (31.17%) general caste population across all colonies. Gandhinagar represents more than 50% of the total population across all colonies. The ST and SC population together constitute 48.28% of the total population. Adding the OBC into them would take figure to 2080 which means 68.82%, a large majority who belong to vulnerable and backward class. Therefore, focus must be given to their issues and concerns while designing RAP.

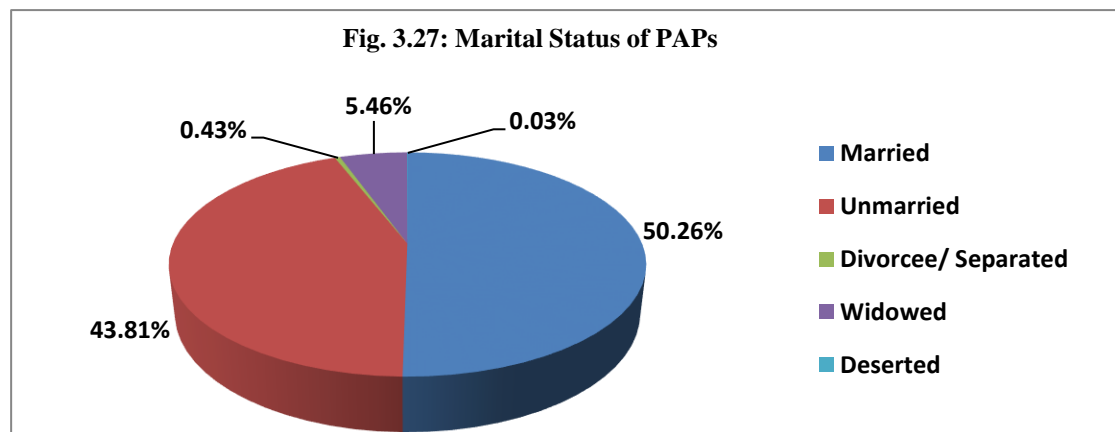


### 3.3.7 Marital Status of PAPs

In all 7 colonies people pursue varied occupation in search of livelihood. Only 65 persons are in Government jobs who account 2.15% of the total affected persons. A total of 1136 (37.59%) affected persons of the total population are in different primary occupations, 1886 (62.41%) are non-earners (minors, students, dependents, old and aged, students etc.) and 67 (2.19%) other having subsidiary occupations. It shows that a large majority do not have subsidiary income sources. Majority of the people are the Agriculture labour followed by private jobs and non-agricultural labour as their main occupations. As agricultural labour there are 337 (11.15%) persons, private job holders are 267 (8.84%) and in non-agricultural labour there are 166 (5.49%) persons. This being semi urban location most people are found to be agriculture labour as agriculture activities are taking place around the project location. Substantial persons are in private jobs and work as agriculture & non-agricultural labours with low payments. The occupations which strengthen the socio-economic life of the people seem less rewarding contributing towards lesser economic growth. There are other occupations like selling of fire wood, collecting and selling of forest produces, shops, barber shop, fishing, bamboo work, vegetable vending, tailoring etc in negligible numbers. The colony wise details are presented in the following tables.

### 3.3.9 Income Level of Affected Households

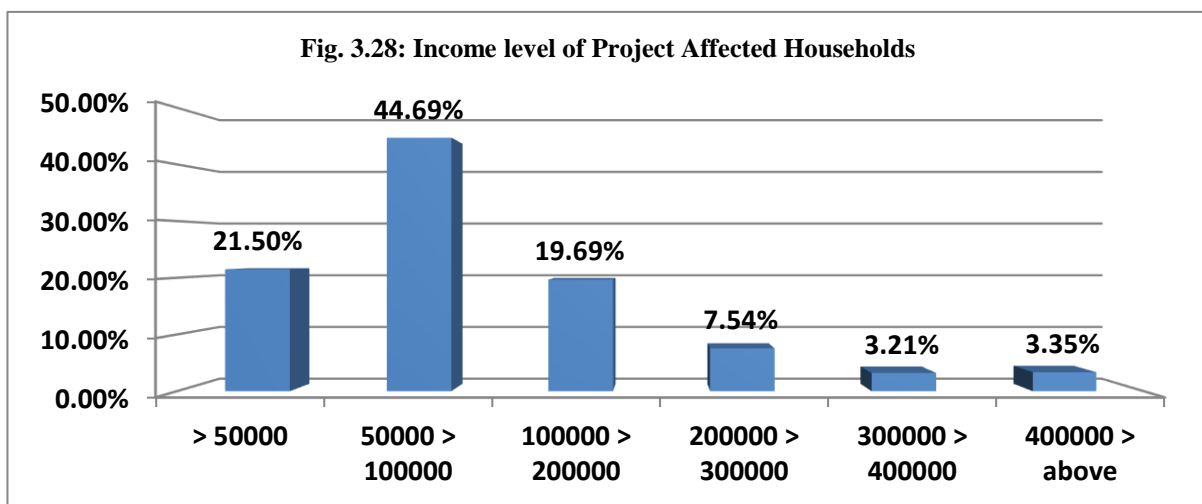
The table below presents the income level of the affected households. As observed out of 716 households there are 154 (21.51%) households who earn less than rupees 50,000/- annually while 320 (44.69%) households earn between 50,000 to less than 1,00,000/-, 141(19.69%) between 1,00,000 to less than 2,00,000, 54 (7.54%) between 2,00,000 to less than 3,00,000, 23 (3.21%) households between 3,00,000/- to less than 4,00,000/- and 24 (3.35%) households above 4,00,000/-

This indicates a poor income level of majority of the household in the surveyed location with a considerable dependent population. A substantial number of households i.e. 154 of the total households earn a very little and suffice to below the line of poverty as per NFSA guideline. Further, the households earning less than 1,00,000 per annum is 474 (66.20%). All above facts substantiate a poor economic profile of majority of households with regard to annual income who are to be affected under the project. The details of habitation specific level of income are illustrated in the following table.

It is, therefore, to be mentioned here that while designing RAP adequate care must be taken to provide the affected families income opportunities so that they sustain their existing income level or improve upon that.

### 3.3.10 Education Status of the PAPs

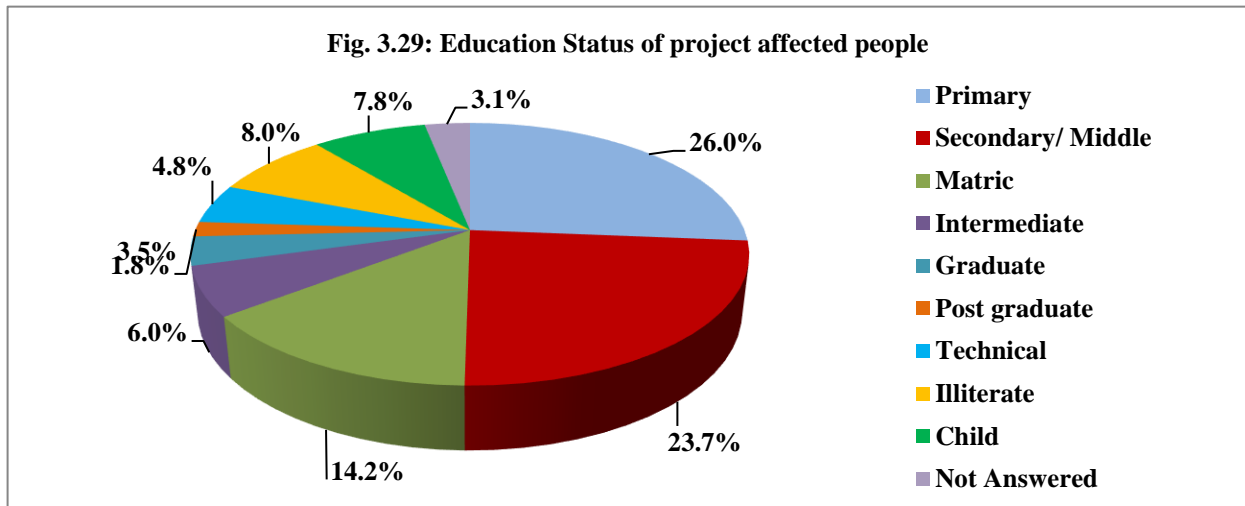
The educational analysis has been done considering the entire population of all 7 habitations. Out of 3022 population, only 243 (8.0%) persons are found illiterate in the survey. Sparing child population of 236 (7.8%) and persons who did not answer 95(3.1%) and the illiterates as mentioned the remaining 2444(80.87%) population are literate with varying academic achievements. Educational achievements shows high at Primary level and secondary level i.e. 801 (26.0%) and 721(23.7%) respectively.

This indicates a good motivation among current generation towards education having more enrolment and continuation. As far as higher education is concerned there are 439 (14.2%) matriculates, 181 (6.00%) intermediates, 107 (3.5%) graduates and 53 (1.8%) post graduates. There are 146 (4.8%) persons who have gone for technical education. The resettlement must take into consideration for the continuation of the education of the children who are studying now in different schools. The detail scenario on education is given below.

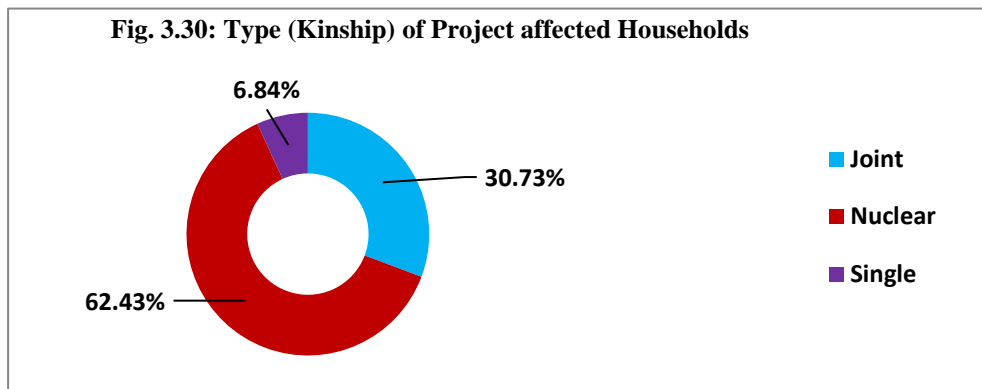


### 3.3.11 Joint, Nuclear and Single Family households

Out of the total 716 households 220 (30.73%) households are joint family households, 447 (62.43%) are nuclear family households and the remaining 49 (6.84%) family households and single headed households. Joint family household which once upon a time was considered breeding place for fraternity, fellow feeling and cohesiveness is gradually decaying.

However, it indicates that still the joint family culture in our society is in place and people are living together. Other significance is that for the resettlement of the affected people, it might be easy to convince the nuclear family households since the family/household shall consist of husband, wife and children only than the joint family where besides the head of the households others will play an important role, probably consuming more time.

### 3.3.12 Vulnerability Status

Vulnerability, the susceptibility to harm, results from an interaction between the resources available to individuals and communities and the life challenges they face. Vulnerability results from developmental problems, personal incapacities, disadvantaged social status, inadequacy of interpersonal networks and supports, degraded neighborhoods and environments, and the complex interactions of these factors over the life course. Vulnerable groups or people are therefore, at risk. While vulnerability of people could be considered on the basis of income, gender, age, social deprivation and discrimination, physical inability, lack of access and ownership to assets and facilities etc. the survey could identify Persons with disability, widowed, women headed households, BPL households, divorcee and orphan across caste compositions as most vulnerable.

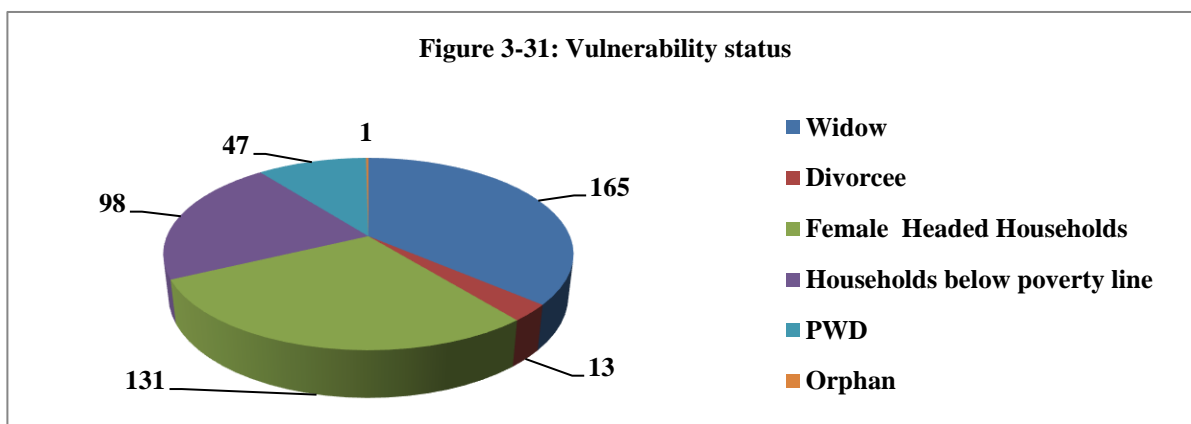
The Person with Disabilities (PWDs) vary with different levels disability who depend on others for their survival, widowed include both men and women who just maintain a subsistence of living, women headed households who take the burden of maintaining the family without any other support and struggle, BPL households are economically poor, divorcees who depend on others for their survival or lead a struggled life, the orphan who has no one to look after.

In all the 7 habitations there are 165 widowed, 13 divorcees and 47 Person with Disabilities (PWDs), 131 women headed households, 98 BPL Households and only one deserted- clubbing them together to 455 who are identified as vulnerable persons. While the vulnerable cases are more among SCs i.e 206, there are 112 persons from the general caste who are vulnerable followed by 83 in OBC and 54 among STs. The persons identified from among total population are presented in the following Table 3.19 and figure 3.31

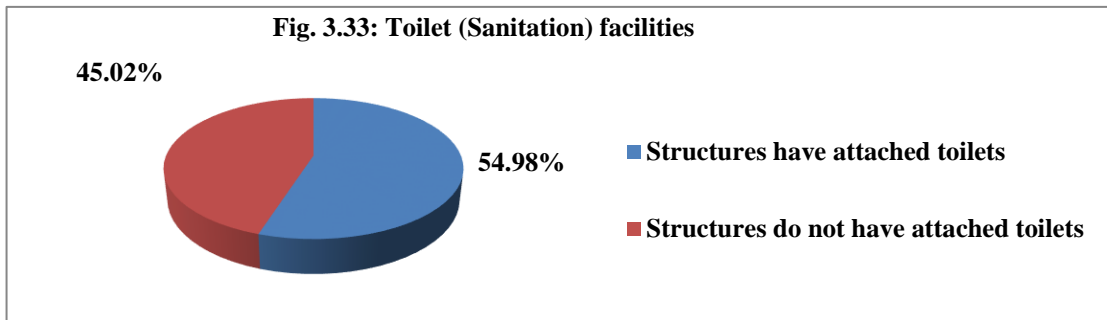
#### 3.3.13.1 Type of House

Total 716 households are residing in 622 houses. Out of 622 structures, majorities are of Semi-Pucca and rests are Pucca houses mainly quarters allotted by Dam, Re-rolling Mill and by Cable. Again out of 622 structures 566 numbers are belongs to structure owners and rest 56 are belongs to different company.

#### 3.3.13.2 Housing Amenities

Out of 622 housing structures, only 342 (54.98%) have toilet facilities in their houses while rest 280(45.02%) do not have such facilities. This indicates that about 45% house adopt open defecation practices that pollute the environment. Ensuring clean and hygienic environment is important for good health and community living. It is also priority of the Govt. to promote sanitary latrines in every household. Therefore, all households who will be resettled in other locations should be linked with the Swachha Bharat Mission scheme of the Govt. to install toilets in every household.

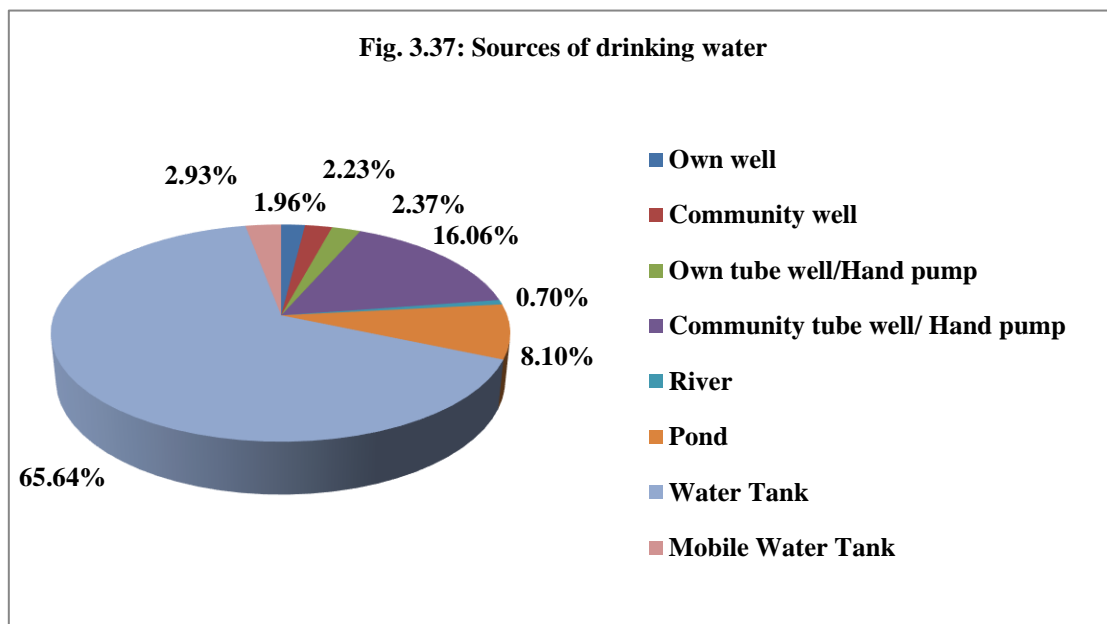
### 3.3.13.3 Sources of Drinking Water

For the purpose of drinking water and other domestic use the people in all 7 habitations mostly rely on open wells, tube wells and piped water supply. As far as practice is concerned out of 716 households 14 (1.96%) depend on own well, 16 (2.23%) on community well, 17 (2.37%) on own tube well, 115 (16.06%) on community tube well and 470 (65.64%) households on piped water supply.

Yet, piped water supply system is inaccessible to 246 families. Yet, 5 families (0.70%) are using water from river and quite a large number of families i.e 58(8.10%) are using pond water which are unsafe sources particularly for drinking purpose. There are 21 (2.71%) households that are still served with Mobile Water supply system. Again, if we talk about respective colonies, the people from Firstgap, Premnagar and Re-rolling colonies have no accessibility to piped water supply. However, 372 households of Gandhinagar and 94 of Gujatal avail the benefits of pipe water supply.

It is suggested that the households in resettled colonies may be linked with Water and Sanitation Department of the Govt. for supply of water and sanitation facilities. However, to begin with the project should provide community tube wells to ensure safe drinking water facilities to the resettled households. The details of access to drinking water sources are given in the following table.

### 3.3.14 Assets

#### 3.3.14.1 Assets Owned by Affected households

The details of assets hold by the affected households are given in a tabular form. Categorically, it indicates poverty of the people that hinder them to own assets for their necessity, comfort and luxury. The habitation specific asset lists are quite indicative of the fact. 897 Phone sets are only available across all colonies taking a total population of 3022.

Another example is that people have more bicycles i.e 760 which they might afford but 253 bikes are available across all 7 locations which is quite less. Although there are 716 households in total 545 TV sets are available only. We may not talk of quality and costly sets but TV as a minimum requirement is not available to some considerable number of households. Another analysis is that very negligible number of 29 agricultural equipment like Ploughs, Tractor, Spray Pump and Pump Sets are available. It indicates people are not into agriculture mode although majority of people work as Agriculture labour.

The people owning pump sets might be using the same for rent purpose or might be doing small scale agricultural activities. There are 8 sewing machines. This indicates that women folk have skills on tailoring. They may be linked with Odisha Livelihood Mission to get schematic support to undertake tailoring activity as micro business. Similarly, light and sound system as business activity as 49 light and sound systems are there. The number of assets colony wise are presented in the following table.

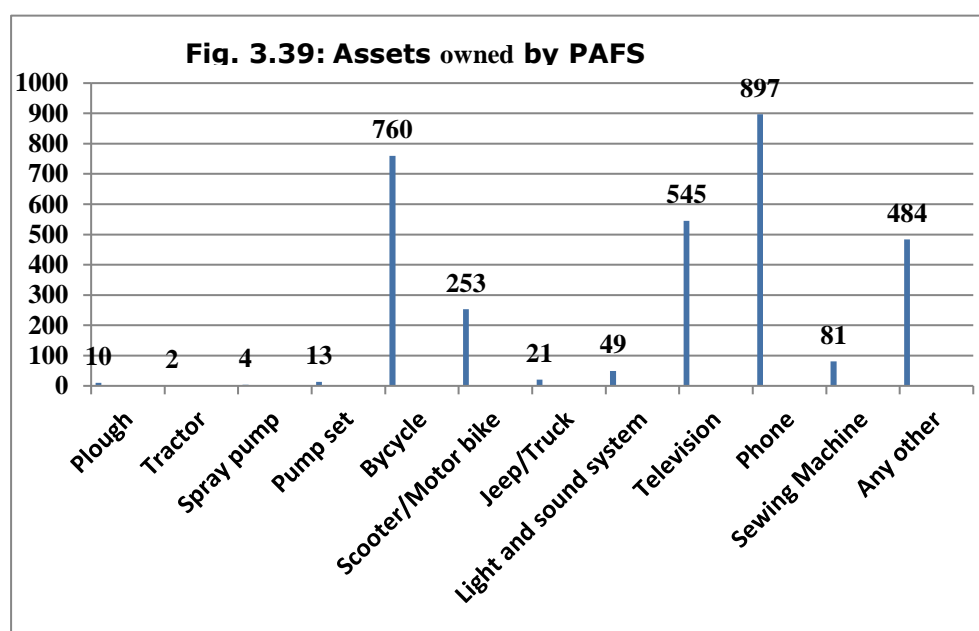

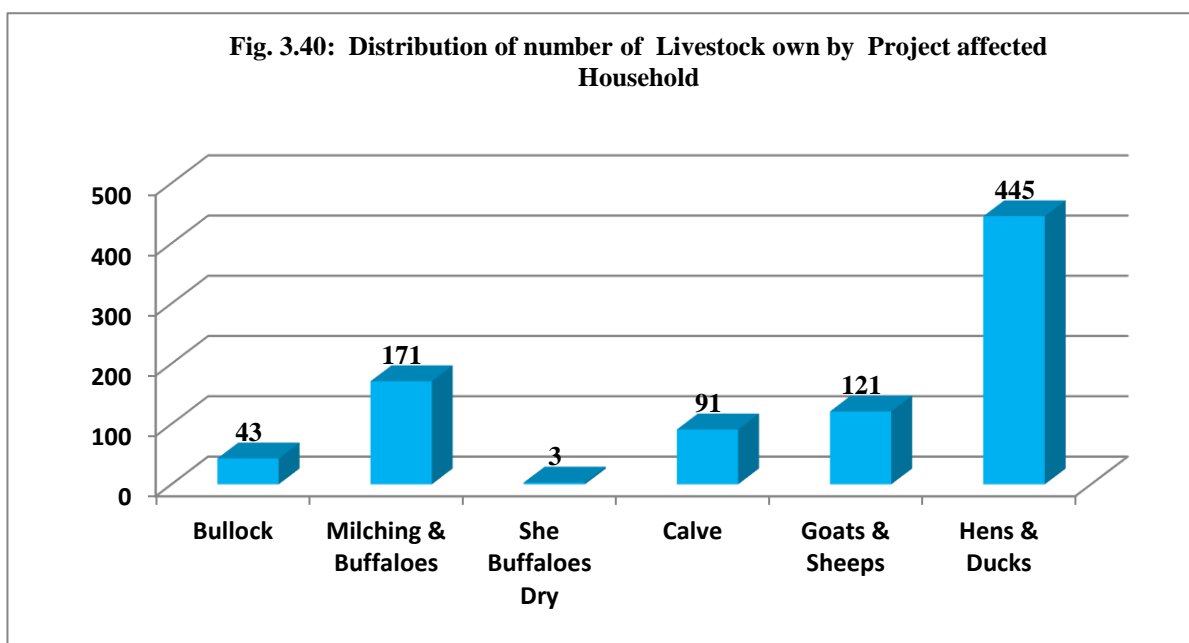
### 3.3.14.2 Livestock Population

Occupational shift, lack of grazing lands, mechanization in the field of agriculture, and the changing life style have impacted livestock population under domestication at household level. Among the 7 habitations, Firstgap has more population of livestock i.e. 395 followed by 390 in Gandhinagar, 49 in Gujatal, 7 in Cable Colony, 6 in Rerolling colony, and 23 in Laxminagar colony. Surprisingly not a single livestock are there in Premnagar colony. In total there are 43 bullocks, 171 milching cows and buffaloes , 3 dry buffaloes, 91 calves, 121 goats & sheeps, 445 hens and ducks. Having mulching cows and buffaloes, goats and sheeps and hen and duck is the indication that people know the skills of rearing those livestock and in case of their economic rehabilitation these may be promoted through appropriate schematic linkage. The details are given in the following table.

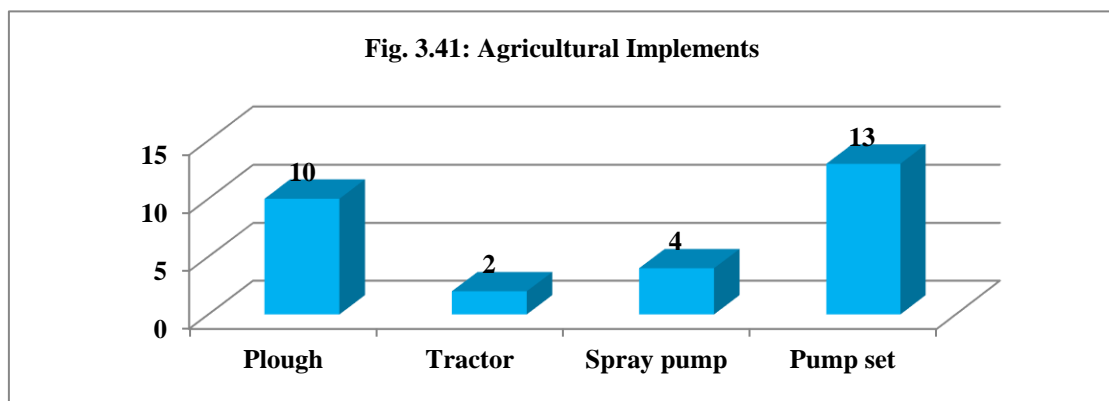

### 3.3.14.4 Agricultural Implements

In addition to above livestock the following agricultural implements are found in the mentioned 7 habitations. It is to be noted that almost all implements are available in Firstgap except pump set although in very small number. The table presented below indicates that people own very less number of agricultural implements. In Gandhinagar colony there are 10 pump sets owned by households. It is mainly for the purpose of rent or for use in the small scale agricultural activities. This gives an understanding that people are not into agriculture activities although majority of them are agriculture labours.

### 3.3.14.5 Loan & Indebtedness Profile

The loan profile indicates a total of 7,807,700 INR availed by households for various purposes that include business, house construction, children's education, marriage of sons/daughters, household consumption, medical expenses, investment in agriculture and farming, fishing and repayment of debt. The survey reveals that there are 29 households who share 21.61% of total loan for business purpose, 41 households share 35.07% of loan for house construction, 9 households sharing 9.71% for education purpose, 11 households who share 7.71% for marriage purpose, 5 households sharing 0.98% for household consumption, 8 households sharing 7.06% for medical expenses, 12 households who share 1.97% for agriculture purpose, 03 households sharing 0.28% for fishing activities, 06 households sharing 2.28% for repayment of debt and there are 18 households who share 13.33% of the total loan for other purposes. It indicates that only 142 (19.83%) households only have availed loan. It seems there are more families who have taken loan for house construction and business investment. (41 & 29 respectively). Surprisingly, there are 5 households who have taken loan for household consumption. It is a matter of concern as these households are likely to fall under the poverty trap.



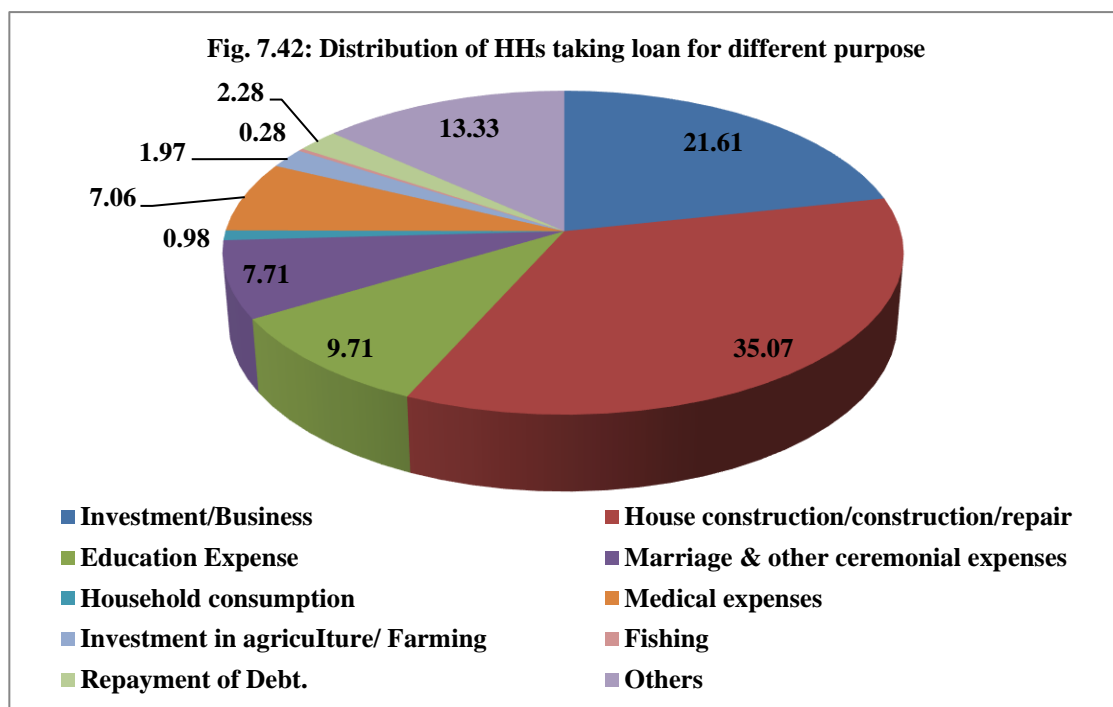

People have taken loan for medical treatment which is 7.06% of the total loan amounting 551000 INR. This indicates poor saving and poor medi-claim facilities among the people.

For agricultural purposes very less amount has been taken which is Rs. 1,54,000/- and only 1.97% of the total loan. But surprisingly no agriculture activities as occupation by the households are found in the survey. It means households have availed loan for the agriculture purpose but probably utilized the same for other purposes. There are 6 households who have availed loan for repayment of debt is also a concern. The trend shows that for productive purpose the loan taken is less than unproductive purposes. Details are presented in the following table.

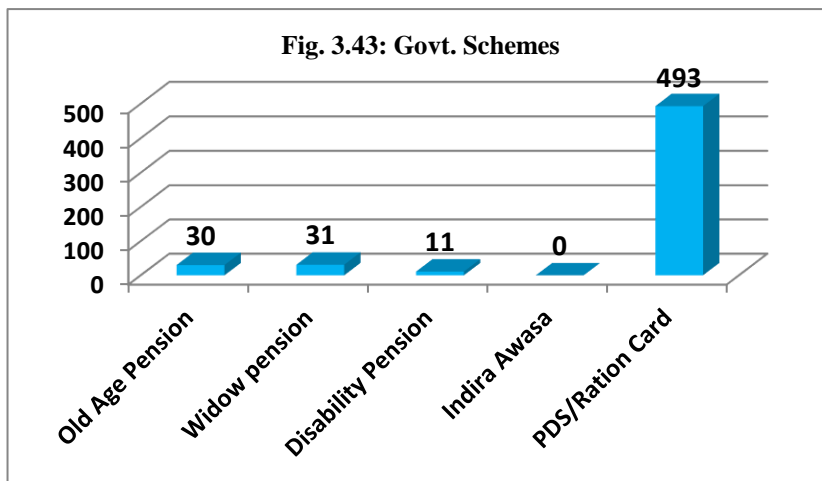


### 3.3.15 Govt. Schemes and Programmes Availd by any Family Members

Out of 716 households, 565 family members have been linked with various Govt schemes. 30 persons have been getting old age pension which include 7 persons from Firstgap colony, 13 from Gandhinagar, 8 from Gujatal and one each from Premnagar and Laxminagar. Similarly 31 women are availing widow pension which include 3 from Firstgap Colony, 14 from Gandhinagar, 12 from Gujatal and one each from cable colony and Premnagar. There are 11 persons with disability who are receiving disability pension and 493 family members who have been linked with PDS and getting ration on a regular basis.

It is noted here that the family members' entitlements and benefits may be restored at the resettlement sites so as to avoid any suffering of the recipient family members. Moreover, effort should be made to link all other potential beneficiaries under different schemes. Discussion in this regard may take place with the BDO, Municipal Corporation etc. to help the family members to get benefits under different schemes.

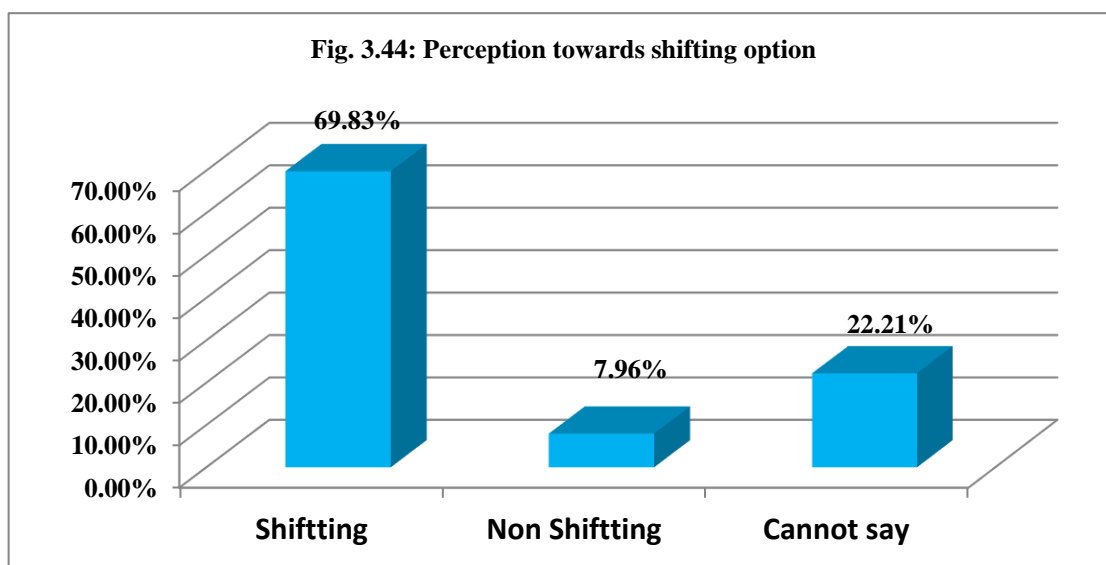


### 3.3.16 Perception towards Shifting Option

Out of 716 households the perception of 558 households was drawn towards shifting while 158 families could not respond. A large majority of 501 (69.83%) families favoured shifting while 57(7.96%) families were against shifting. The details are as follows;

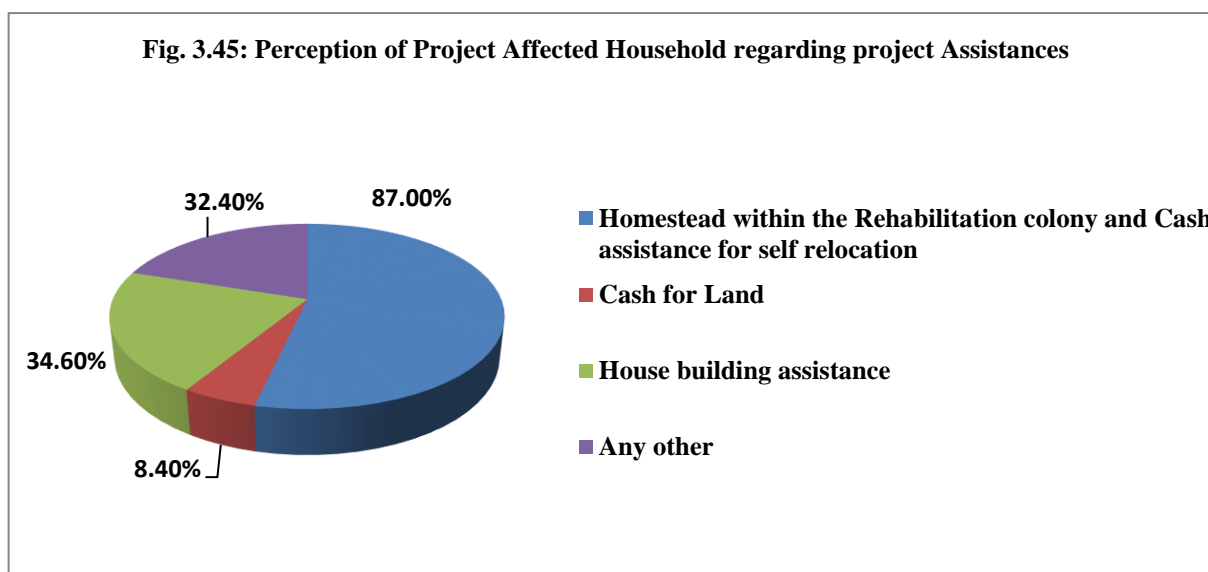
### 3.3.17 Perception Regarding Project Assistance

Similarly with regard to resettlement all 716 households have given their views. Against the loss of their houses and land 623 households about 87 % of the total households have sought for homestead in the resettlement colony and cash assistance for relocation. 60 households about 8.4% have sought cash for land. 248 households about 34.06% of the households seek cash for land and 232 (32.4%) households have asked for other type of compensation.\*

### 3.3.18 Awareness on the Project and Sense of Benefit

A large majority of about 95% of the affected families are aware of the project. Yes, one thing is clear to them that Govt. will give them compensation package, relocate their location. In the absence of detailed understanding of the R&R benefits they apprehend many challenges and difficulties in the future. Hence, it is highly required by the project authority to adopt appropriate communication mechanism to consult with them on project details and benefits. Community level consultative committees may be formed in this regard. There should be public disclosure on the impact of the project on them and their mitigation strategy. They have also pending issues that need to be addressed by the Government.

### 3.3.19 Key Social Issues

1. The additional spillway construction will affect 716 households comprising 1,415 Families and 3,022 persons in all.
2. Of the 716 households, about 17% (119) had undergone displacement earlier, during the construction of the dam, sixty years back.
3. The households are spread across seven habitations/ colonies and all of them are in an 'urban' area.
4. None of them own title to the land/ house and are considered as 'squatters'.
5. Half the PAPs are female, with female headed households accounting for 20%.
6. Among the PAPs, 38% are Scheduled Caste (SC); Other Backward Communities, 21%; and Scheduled Tribe, 10%. Remaining 31% (one third) belong to the General Category.
7. Majority of the PAPs (65%) are (employable) in the age group of 18-60 years. Yet, only 25% are 'earners' and the remaining 'dependents'.
8. Occupation wise, it is quite spread out and only a small number account for 'service'.
9. 81% are literates, though, not educated fully in school / colleges. Less than 10% have stepped into college.
10. Majority of the households (66%) are poor (annual income less than Rs 100,000) with 15% fall into the category of 'vulnerable'.
11. Though one fourth of the houses can be categorized as 'pucca' (with RECC roof), most houses are in a dilapidated condition and hence fall more into 'kachcha' category.
12. One third of the households do not have access to Piped Water supply and 50% lack sanitation services (who resort to open defecation).
13. Transport and other access facilities are also quite poor.
14. Project will also affect one school, three temples and one crematorium.



## CHAPTER-4: STAKEHOLDER ANALYSIS AND CONSULTATIONS PLAN

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Public participation and community consultation has been taken up as an integral part of social impact assessment process. Public participation has been viewed as a continuous two way process, involving promotion of public understanding of the process and mechanism through which developmental problems and needs are investigated and solved. Focus Group Discussion (FGD) was used as a tool to inform and educate stakeholders about the proposed project. It assisted in identification of the problems associated with the project as well as the needs of the population likely to be impacted. This participatory process helped to reduce the public resistance to change and enabled their participation in this development process.

### 4.1 OBJECTIVES OF PUBLIC CONSULTATION

The public consultations have been conducted during the SIA study with the following objectives:

- To promote public awareness and understanding of the project.
- To identify the major issues of environmental and social problems
- To develop an effective community friendly planning of mitigation measures.
- To settle the problems of PAPs with mutual consensus.
- To inform the PAPs about the entitlement framework and RAP
- To assist the PAPs during relocation and rehabilitation

### 4.2 METHODOLOGY

A three-phase consultation programme was conducted for the present project. At the first stage, people were consulted for the projects likely Socio-economic impacts due to the proposed project. The potential PAPs were identified through Socio-economic census. Both informal meetings with the local residents of the affected settlements areas and Focus group discussions were held to assess the Social and Environmental impacts in and around the project corridor. Project affected persons (PAPs) were consulted to assess their loss of property, structures and assets. Questionnaires were prepared for different socio-economic issues. In the local level meetings and Focus group discussions, the participants were informed about the purpose and preliminary design of the project and feed backs were received on their issues of concern. Focus group discussions were held in all the affected settlement area within the project vicinity.

#### 4.2.1 Level of Discussion

The discussion process established for the project has employed a range of formal consultative tools including in depth interviews with key informants and on-site Focus Group Discussion and meetings. The enactment of participation and consultation with the habitants in the direct project influence area has been done at various locations within the project corridor.

After completion of SIA study and R&R Plan, a second level consultation was held on 26 September, 2017 in the presence of district authority for disclosure of the documents and the proposed compensation and assistance package.



#### 4.2.2 Local level discussion

These discussions were held in project area to inform people about the purpose and preliminary design of the project. These discussions were carried out to identify:

- Specific social issues
- Extent of likely impact due to the project
- Expectation and reservations of people towards project; and
- Resettlement and rehabilitation options.

Local level Focus Group Discussions were held at selected locations to understand the implication of the project impacts on various groups, especially those with distinct degree of vulnerability. The venues of the meetings were in the colony settlements in the project area. At these meetings, the people were invited covering project affected persons, prominent persons of the area, panchayat members, teachers, health workers, etc. Continuous local level consultations along with consultations with different district authorities were carried out in all the 7 affected colonies between **May, 2016 to December, 2016**

The general issues discussed in all locations are given below:

- Perception on the existing project
- Benefits and problems faced if any with the existing project
- Perception on the proposed improvements and rehabilitation options
- proposed features of the spillway and impacts on local properties and business
- Displacement and resettlement issues.

### 4.3 STAKEHOLDERS ANALYSIS

As a part of participatory planning process, different stakeholders were identified who could be involved to identify critical issues, impacts, provide suggestions relating to resettlement and rehabilitation project planning, execution, monitoring and evaluation. The stakeholders have been classified as primary and secondary stakeholders. The project requires part of its own land where squatters had settled down long back. Therefore, their displacement, resettlement and rehabilitation are of paramount importance. It required a participatory process from the beginning of project initiation. People in common have been considered as primary stakeholders and others include the service providers, authorities who have a say in the project etc. The details of the identified stakeholders are described below.

#### 4.4 FOCUS GROUP DISCUSSIONS (FGDs)

Given a context where the squatters have settled down on the patches of Govt. owned land for a long time, some of them having past experience of displacement from their home land mainly due to Hirakud Dam project, their displacement for second time from the present location for the purpose of the Dam Safety is a bolt from the blue for such people. However, for the larger interest of the state and the country, this is inevitable. It raises many questions for them on their further resettlement, rehabilitation particularly their livelihood.

Under the above circumstances, the social impact assessment was carried out collecting relevant information on the impact of the project on the community. While the project purpose and the objective of the survey were explained to them at different levels of consultation be it; village meetings, FGD, large group discussion, stakeholder meetings etc, mixed response was received from them.

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Most of them expressed the fact that Hirakud Dam is a pride of the state and the nation and therefore, the proposed project for its safety is a necessity. However, they expressed their concerns on their resettlement, restoration of livelihood and other litigated matters that required the administrative action. ### 4.4.1 Consent and Willingness of the Family towards the Project

As it is earlier mentioned in the report, people, by and large, are positive about the project as it is of dam safety importance and pride of the state and nation. However, it seems their resettlement and rehabilitation is a priority to them as they have faced the earlier challenges of displacement. Therefore, to them their displacement is conditional. First Govt. has to make arrangements for their resettlement and rehabilitation, then only the project should start. Otherwise there shall be non-cooperation and resistance from the people.

### 4.4.2 Views towards Income Restoration Assistance

In the surveyed villages discussion was held with the family members at length to seek their views on income restoration assistance. Diverse range of responses was noted. Some of the common views are as follows;

- Petty business assistance to establish new business operations.
- Trade based skill trainings and subsequent support to establish new skill based enterprises.
- Market opportunities
- Transition allowance till new business takes up
- Land for agriculture activities
- Shopping complex in the new location
- Engagement in the proposed project
- Wage employment
- Entrepreneurial activities through women SHGs

## 4.5 2<sup>ND</sup> LEVEL PUBLIC CONSULTATIONS

2<sup>nd</sup> level public consultation was conducted on 26th September, 2017 near the proposed Nehru Udyan, Gandhinagar near dam area on Draft SIA & RAP report having draft R & R plan.

### 4.5.1 Process:

For conducting 2<sup>nd</sup> level Public Consultation, the laid down procedure for conducting public consultation of the Odisha State as well as the World Bank was followed. A prio notice for 2nd level consultation was circulated by the Sambalpur District Authority to all the affected areas, district authorities, forest department, pollution control boards and other stakeholder institutions. The salient features of SIA and R&R Plan in local language (oriya) and english language was widely circulated to all the panchayat offices, block office, district office, and district administration's website. Entire proceedings of this consultation were videographed.

### 4.5.2 Issues raised during 2<sup>nd</sup> level Public Consultation:

An interactive detailed discussion was conducted between Dam Authority, representative of District authority, District Land Acquisition Officer present, forest official, etc. and project affected persons. People were made aware about Project, Benefits to PAPs, approved Ex-gratia package and suggested resettlement site by the authorities. The most important issues raised by the PAPs are as follows:

- To explore and identify the resettlement sites in the vicinity of proposed displaced colonies, i.e. within Hirakud, Sambalpur Municipality Corporation area.

- To develop the resettlement site with all basic & necessary public amenities/ infrastructure
- To allot plots to the PAPs along with Patta/ Ownership rights
- To facilitate service/ job to at-least one member of each family or Skill Development Trainings
- To initiate project and area specific income generation and livelihood restoration programs
- Some of the PAPs requested to provide constructed house in the proposed resettlement colony

Overall, Project Affected and Displaced Families shown their willingness and agreed for the proposed project in terms of the condition that, they shall be provided with proper/ suitable ex-gratia package. The detail proceeding & discussions of the meeting has been incorporated in the report in **Annexure-IV**.

#### 4.6 PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing for the project was conducted by the Odisha Pollution Control Board for the proposed Additional Spillway Project under the chairmanship of Additional District Magistrate, Sambalpur as a process of obtaining Environmental Clearance as per EIA Notification, 2006 on 8<sup>th</sup> December, 2017 by following the laid down procedure for conducting Public Consultation. The 1 month advance notice for Public Hearing was published in Oriya and English news paper informing about the purpose of the Public Hearing meeting, venue and time of the meeting and inviting objections and suggestions from all the stakeholders. The summary EIA report indicating the finding of the EIA and SIA study was uploaded on



the website of the State Pollution Control Board in both English and Oriya languages. The hard and soft copies of the same was made available to public at different government offices, panchayat offices, of the affected area, office of dam authority, etc and information of such offices were notified to the public.

The public hearing meeting was attended by the residents of all the affected settlement area, local leader, media persons, district authorities, local officers, local NGO, and other public representatives. About 500 persons attended the meeting.

In the consultation meeting the Dam Authority presented the salient features of the proposed additional spillway, its necessity and finding of the EIA and SIA study for the proposed project. The approved R&R package for the affected families due to the proposed project and the process for disbursement was also explained to the public.

Most of the participants were aware about the proposed project due to previously held continuous during surveys, FGDs and 2<sup>nd</sup> level public consultation. Most of the queries raised by the public was related to R&R packages for the affected families and resettlement sites. Most of the people are in favour of the proposed additional spillway as a dam safety measures. However their concerns were related to R&R package and their timely disbursement.

They expressed their satisfaction about the selection of alternate resettlement site close to the dam area. During 2<sup>nd</sup> level consultation they resisted the proposed resettlement site at Rengalipalli (about 30 km away from the present site) Basantpur (22 Km away) and Larbanga (8 Km away) and requested to identify close to the dam area. The Dam authority confirmed that the new alternate resettlement site is located in Garmunda, Solband and Solpali area around the dam area within 3 Km radius from the proposed project site. It was also informed that the area will be developed to provide social infrastructure such as internal road network, electric supply system, drainage, water supply network, primary health centre, etc.

The public also wanted to the action taken for inclusion of public representative in the team of GRC and RAP implementation. The District Authority confirmed that they have already in the process of formation of GRC cell and received the name of public representative of 6 settlement area and awaiting for remaining 1 name for the 7<sup>th</sup> affected settlement area. Then it will be notified by the District Authority. The copy of the public hearing proceedings has been enclosed as **Annexure-III**

#### **4.7 CONSULTATION AND PARTICIPATION PLAN DURING IMPLEMENTATION STAGE**

PAPs and other stakeholders will be continuously engaged during implementation phase to promote public understanding of the project as well as on issues and prospects of resettlement and rehabilitation. RAP Execution Agency shall undertake the following key activities:

- Communicate and inform PAPs and beneficiary households of their entitlements through distribution of pamphlets and through conducting of colony level public meetings;
- Hold one to one meeting with the PAPs to explain their eligibility for micro-plan preparation;
- Display micro plan in affected villages for prior review before finalization and thereby minimizing grievances;
- Consult PAPs on development of facilities at the chosen resettlement sites
- Conduct household level consultation to identify skill improvement training needs; counsel PAPs on usage of assistance amounts; elicit interest amongst households for available work opportunities with civil works contractor and besides undertaking other actions towards livelihood restoration/enhancement and



- Explain the available mechanisms for redressal of grievances.

Information dissemination would be carried out at least twice a month or even more frequently as necessary, by organizing public meetings at each colony on a pre-decided date, time and venue. The meetings would involve PAPs, local communities, project authorities and relevant departments, besides the RAP Execution Agency. The meetings will be a forum to inform all about the key aspects of the project, importance of consultations and seek PAPs participation and co-operation in the project. Affected communities would be given opportunity to provide suggestions and discuss issues which concern them. After the public meeting, Minutes of Meeting (MoM) would be prepared in local language - Oriya and read out to people present in the meeting. The MoM would be signed by all the participants present at the meeting. The MoM would be kept in project file for documentation purpose as well as pasted on the notice boards of respective colonies.



## CHAPTER-5: IMPACTS ASSESSMENT

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The impact of any project is important to be assessed in the beginning. Larger interest of its impact is usually valued not ignoring the negative impact the project will create for some of the families and people. When it becomes a matter of larger public interest and that significantly contribute to the socio-economic development of a large section people such projects becomes inevitable and is welcomed despite some negative impact. Such considerations are there in rules and enactments ever made to guide big projects which have adverse impact of displacement, land acquisition and require environmental clearances. Rules and enactments of Govt of India and state Govt. of Odisha and the World Bank guidelines have been followed while dealing with the assessment on the impact that the project is going to create. It is to be noted here that the current project under study is Dam Rehabilitation and Improvement Project (DRIP) that plans for construction of spill ways on both sides that help in discharging water with added safety to the dam and also reduce the flood chances of Sambalpur city and other parts in Odisha. Hence, the project is of great importance that caters to the vast public need most. Further, the chapter also deals with risks and assumptions in implementation of the project.

Like any other infrastructure development project this proposed additional project will have some social impact which may be positive and negative. The analysis of impacts due to the project reflects that the negative impact due to the project will be of short term duration, but the positive impacts on overall social setups will in the long run overshadow the negative impacts. The following section describes the anticipated impacts due to the proposed project.

### 5.1 POSITIVE IMPACTS

The Project will have following positive impacts:

#### 5.1.1 Enhanced Dam Safety

The proposed additional spillway will enhance the safety of the dam to a great extent as it will add additional discharging capacity of the dam when there is high rush of water impeding the capacity of the dam and prevent large scale loss to life in case of dam break or overtopping of dam (more than 300,000 population) and huge properties in the downstream areas.

#### 5.1.2 Secured tenure

The affected families will be allotted piece of land as per RAP with patta/formal ownership rights for constructing their house. Title will rest jointly with both man (husband) and women (wife).

#### 5.1.3 Better Opportunity of Living Conditions

At resettlement site well developed social infrastructure facilities will be provided which will include all weather internal road networks, drainage networks, water supply and sanitation arrangements, electricity supply network, primary health centre, playground, etc. Thus, the resettlement will result in better living condition for the resettled families, which in the long run will help in improved health conditions.

#### 5.1.4 Livelihood Support

All the affected families will get livelihood support and assistance. It is also proposed to include skill development plan for all affected families for their livelihood support, which will enhance the livelihood



opportunity for the affected families. This will help in overall economic development of the affected population

### **5.1.5 Income Generation and Livelihood Support Activities to FHH and SCs/STs:**

To provide financial assistance to the needy FHHs for income generation activities (Rs 25,000 per household: and livelihood support assistance for SC/ STs among the affected families.

### **5.1.6 Other Perceived Project Benefit**

The other perceived project benefits are.

- New opportunities for small scale business
- More employment opportunities in the area
- Restoration of common property resources
- R&R package including livelihood support.

## **5.2 ADVERSE IMPACTS**

### **5.2.1 Impact on Land Resources**

It is worthwhile to mention here that 716 head of households along with total 1,415 families will be affected in the process. All are squatters and have been occupying the land since long with their houses on it. Such encroachment dates back to the displacement days of Hirakud Dam Project where most of the present displaced families occupied the place and lived. Out of 716 families 119 families were displaced by Hirakud Dam Project. This is again a humanitarian concern of these families who need to be relocated with dignity. During the initial days of Hirakud displacement there were no appropriate policies for the displaced and resettlement was mostly a responsibility of the displaced families. Here as 1415 families are losing their piece of residential unit or the dwelling place, it becomes a concern to make sound resettlement plan for these families. These families have been backed with Government favors and are linked with various schemes and amenities those are required for all inhabitants in the colonies.

The project will definitely make these families shelter less and deprive them from their community living and the basic facilities they were enjoying being part of such community. They will be deprived of education, health what they were availing in the locality. They will also be deprived from their common property resources like the temples, playground, market place, cremation ground, parks and other such resources availed by them in the locality.

### **5.2.2 Impacts on Livelihood**

Livelihood is always dependent on several factors. It is directly or indirectly influenced by several factors and the prominent among them include the resources available with the person, skill , population and relationship, market and practice of the concerned person. Here, majority of the household who are engaged with private jobs because of Hirakud township and other business interventions there those people will suffer a lot following the displacement. It depends on the place and distance of their relocation in post displacement. Living at far off place may affect doing their jobs and some have to forego or loose even. Even if they continue they might have to meet additional costs which may not be permissible to their earning. The agriculture based labors may certainly lose their occupation as they have to relocate in a different location. Some of the families who have petty shops, fishing, washing clothes, hair cutting and providing milk to household, worshipping in temples will lack this opportunity. Because all these businesses/ services are based on the population, consumers and relationships, they will suffer a lot on this ground.



### 5.2.3 Impact on Women & Children

Displacement has always impacted on women and children. In most of the Indian families, it is the women who suffer more negative impacts of displacement. Hence, they should be considered in planning process so that they can give their opinion and plan for the relocation of their families. Their social cohesiveness, health issues, child caring need to be considered while planning for resettlement. Besides, it is to be noted that there are women headed houses who may suffer a lot in displacement. Hence adequate guidance, hand holding, escorting need to be provided to those families in the implementation of resettlement and rehabilitation plan so as to restore livelihood of women headed families following the shifting from the displacement colonies. Similarly, displacements affect a lot to children. They have to forego crèche facilities, school facilities and the park where they have been playing. As the family life itself gets disturbed over the process certain negligence might occur in child care.

### 5.2.4 Impact on vendors & construction workers

Definitely new spill ways in the left dyke will go through a construction process which will require activities like site clearances, construction of approach roads, stock yard for storage of materials and parking of machineries. Construction of sheds for people and even temporary office of the vendor companies and construction. On the other hand, there are grieved families who if not satisfied with their need and if not properly rehabilitated may become disturbing concern for the vendor companies. This will be difficult for them to carry on their construction activities uninterrupted and meet the deadlines. Hence, all preparedness lies in resettlement and rehabilitation planning of the affected families/population.

The vendor companies must involve the local people particularly the displaced families in the construction process. They may be involved based on their skills and expertise in the construction activities. The vendor companies must keep close coordination with different authorities who are responsible for rehabilitation and resettlement of the affected families. In the process, the vendor company should not keep isolated from the displaced families and must care their concern by involving them, giving gainful employment to them and supporting them in the rehabilitation and resettlement process.

### 5.2.5 Impacts on Social Set Up

The project is going to impact the social set up in the affected area that consists of SHGs, youth clubs, community hall, Kalian Mandap, Anganwadi centre and other set ups. These set ups are part and parcel of the people’s community living and hence carry much importance to sustain their unity, cohesiveness and common activities. Due to the project these set up are going to be affected. The details of the social set ups are presented in the following table.

### 5.2.6 Cultural Impacts

The affected families belong to different caste groups and sects and there are tribal populations as well. The total population includes general caste, other backward caste, schedule caste and schedule tribes. They have different festivals – some common to all and some festivals based on their caste orientations. They have their place of worships, separate cremation grounds and places of assembly. All will be disturbed in the wake of displacement. Such variations need to be considered in the rehabilitation and resettlement plan. The present cluster of houses is caste based and this factor must be taken into consideration while planning further. The details of the cultural and religious places found to be impacted are presented in the following table.

### 5.2.7 Impact on Common Property Resources

Here, it is important to mention the general infrastructures that the affected communities are availing at present. The families are entitled to avail all these facilities in their rehabilitation and resettlement. Table 5.1 above describes some of the common property resources and includes the cultural aspect also. They have burial grounds, cremation platforms, play grounds, roads and electricity connections, water supply units and so many facilities those have been enlisted very carefully. The list is given herewith for better



understanding of the common property resources people have been using as inhabitants of the respective colonies.

### 5.2.8 Impacts due to Labor influx

Construction works will require labor force and associated goods and services. All the required labor will not be fully supplied locally for a number of reasons, such as worker unavailability and lack of technical skills and capacity. In such cases, labor force (total or partial) needs to be brought in from outside the project area. As workers on infrastructure projects are likely to be predominantly young and male, who are either single or are separated from their family or spouse, and are outside their habitual sphere of social control, the risk of sexual harassment for local women (and co-women workers, if any), is likely to be higher, in particular for younger women and girls, but also boys. In addition, this influx of labor may affect the project area adversely in the terms of additional burden on public infrastructure such as health services, utilities such as water and electricity, housing and social dynamics. Other related issues could be increased risk of spread of communicable diseases, and increased rates of illicit behavior and crime.

The responsibility to manage these adverse impacts would be clearly reflected in the contractual obligations of the Civil Works Contractor with appropriate mechanisms for addressing non-compliance. The bid documents for construction of Additional Spillway of Hirakud Dam, incorporate requirements for Environment, Social, Health and Safety (ESHS) including list of applicable labor laws<sup>2</sup> and provisions and the metrics for periodic reporting by contractors. The bidders are required to submit the following as part of their technical bid: ESHS strategy and implementation plan; code of conduct; and declaration of past ESHS performance. The successful Bidder will submit an Environmental, Social, Health and Safety (ESHS) Performance Security @ 1% of accepted contract value.

Prior to starting construction, the contractor will prepare and submit the Contractor ESMP (CESMP) to the Project Authority for acceptance. The CESMP will include a detailed explanation of how the contractor will comply with the project's safeguard documents, and demonstrate that sufficient funds are budgeted for that purpose. It will include Management Strategies and Implementation Plans (MSIPs) for: (i) work activities; (ii) traffic management; (iii) occupational health and safety; (iv) environmental management; (v) social management; and (vi) labor influx. The C-ESMP shall be approved prior to the commencement of construction activities. The approved C-ESMP shall be reviewed, periodically (but not less than every six (6) months), and updated in a timely manner, as required, by the Contractor to ensure that it contains measures appropriate to the Works activities to be undertaken.

As part of the Labor Management Plan under CESMP, following activities would be undertaken to address Gender Based Violence and Labor Influx and thereby avoid /minimize impacts on the local community:

- (i) to address labor influx, contractor will:
  - source all unskilled labor from within the project area and its vicinity to minimize labor influx into the project area. Skilled labor force, if unavailable locally, would be brought in from outside the project area either from within or outside the state.

- develop a Workers' Camp Management Plan that addresses specific aspects of the establishment and operation of workers' camps e.g. cordoning of separate areas for labor camps and material storage;
  - conduct training programs on HIV/AIDS and other communicable diseases
  - develop a complaint handling mechanism at the project level
  - provide information to communities in project area and to host communities about the contractor's policies and Worker Code of Conduct (where applicable).
- (ii) to address Gender Based violence, contractor will:
- conduct mandatory and repeated training and awareness raising for the workforce about refraining from unacceptable conduct toward local community members, specifically women;
  - inform workers about national laws that make sexual harassment and gender-based violence a punishable offence which is prosecuted;
  - introduce a Worker Code of Conduct as part of the employment contract, and including sanctions for non-compliance (e.g., termination), and
  - adopt a policy to cooperate with law enforcement agencies in investigating complaints about gender-based violence; and
  - provide specific facilities for women workers including, designated health centre, Day Crèche Facilities for workers with infants and small children; organizing of construction schedule so as to exempt women workers from night shifts as far as possible;

The Contractor will periodically submit report to the Project Authorities as per ESHS metrics and update the Labour management Plan as necessary during construction period.



## CHAPTER-6: RESETTLEMENT & REHABILITATION

### 6.1 ANALYSIS OF THE ACTS AND POLICIES APPLICABLE FOR RAP

The Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Resettlement and Rehabilitation (RFCTLAR&R) Act 2013, enacted by the national government is the latest legislation. This is in force and superseded all other old acts for land acquisition and to determining R&R activities throughout the country. Odisha too has adopted the same. Unfortunately, the affected families of the current project would not get any benefit according to RFCTLAR&R Act 2013, because all the PAFs are squatters.

To protect these PAFs from the impending adverse impact due to displacement and treating it as an opportunity to provide them a better living condition with strengthening of their livelihood, a special R&R package have been developed, based on an earlier existing state policy, i.e. the Orissa Rehabilitation and Resettlement Policy (ORRP) 2006 and its further amendments for squatters. This fulfils all the requirements of the WB Policy OP 4.12. In fact, Hirakud package is much better as it provides generously for 'squatters'. Yet, a comparison between R&R policy of 2006 and that of the OP 4.12 is presented here for library purpose.

#### 6.1.1 Comparative Gap Analysis of Above Legal Provisions

The Comparative Gap Analysis between Orissa Resettlement and Rehabilitation Policy 2006 (with 4th Biennial revision of the rehabilitation grants in monetary terms) and World Bank's Operational Policies has been explained in the table mentioned below.

**6.1.2 Approved Entitlement Framework (In form of Ex-Gratia) by Department Of Water Resource, Government Of Odisha**

After several meetings and discussion held among Project Authority, Authorities from R&R cell of DoWR (Odisha), World Bank (Experts) representatives and Experts from Consulting Agency, a project specific suitable Entitlement Framework had been prepared and appraised to the Government vide letter no. 3767 on date 09.05.2017 by the Chief Engineer & Basin Manager, Upper Mahanadi Basin, Burla for approval.

Later on, considering different components like Residential housing/ House sites/ Cash Assistance in Lieu, Moving Allowance/ Transport Allowance and Subsistence Allowance (Maintenance Allowance)/ Rental Allowance etc. the Government in Water Resource Department of Odisha has approved and suggested a suitable Ex-gratia package for Compensation & Assistance vide letter no. 20765 (WR-RR-MISC-0034-2017) on date 31.08.2017 according 2017 price index. Refer to **Annexure-IV**. The approved ex-gratia package has been suggested for all eligible entitled project affected families irrespective of their residential ownership category. The Ex-gratia package approved by Government of Odisha for this project is given below:

- (iv) provide financial assistance to the FHHs for income generation activities (Rs 25,000 per household: and
- (v) (ii) livelihood support assistance for SC/ STs, drawing upon the resources from Special Component Plan (CP) / Tribal Sub Plan (TSP).
- (vi) For other vulnerable groups, project authorities will encourage the Civil works Contractor to provide work opportunities on a preferential basis to at least one able bodied member of the affected household.

Project Authority shall be provide support to PAPs who are physically unable to build their own houses. Such PAPs shall be identified by the RAP Execution Agency during the consultations process and requisite support shall be recorded in their micro-plan details.

As per guidelines, each displaced family shall get 10 decimals of housing site/ land in case of rural area and 04 decimals of housing site/ land in case of urban (Municipal) area. Accordingly two types of Entitlement Framework have been suggested by the Project Authority during 2<sup>nd</sup> Stage Public Hearing. The details R&R package is present in the proceedings of public hearing attached in **Annexure-II** .

## 6.2 CUT OFF DATE

As per the policy guidelines of the World Bank Persons covered under Para- 15(a) and (b) are provided compensation for the land they lose, and other assistance in accordance with Para- 6. Persons covered under Para- 15(c) are provided resettlement assistance in lieu of compensation for the land they occupy, and other assistance, as necessary, to achieve the objectives set out in this policy, if they occupy the project area prior to a cutoff date established by the borrower and acceptable to the Bank. Persons who encroach on the area after the cutoff date are not entitled to compensation or any other form of resettlement assistance. All persons included in para 15(a), (b), or (c) are provided compensation for loss of assets other than land.

It is therefore important to declare a cutoff date prior to the Social Assessment to enumerate the eligible persons for the compensation and entitlements. In this context **25<sup>th</sup> May 2016** (Household survey carried

<sup>3</sup> -- Decimals equals 40.50 Sq Mtr



out) has been taken as cutoff date for assessment. No persons who move into the project area after determination of the ‘Cut-off-date’ will not be eligible for any benefit.

### 6.3 DISPLACEMENT

The displacement should take place only after the affected families build their houses or after they receive land or cash and house construction grant as per allowed ex-gratia package. The implementation of resettlement activities is linked to the civil works schedule and ensures that displacement or restriction of access does not occur before necessary measures for resettlement are in place. For impacts covered in Para- 3(a) of this policy, these measures include provision of compensation and of other assistance required for relocation, prior to displacement, and preparation and provision of resettlement sites with adequate facilities, where required. In particular, taking of land and related assets may take place only after compensation has been paid and, where applicable, resettlement sites and moving allowances have been provided to the displaced persons. For impacts covered in para. 3(b) of this policy, the measures to assist the displaced persons are implemented in accordance with the plan of action as part of the project (see para. 30).

Preference should be given to land based resettlement strategies for displaced persons whose livelihoods are land based. These strategies may include resettlement on public land or on private land acquired or purchased for resettlement. Whenever replacement land is offered, resettlers are provided with land for which a combination of productive potential, locational advantages, and other factors is at least equivalent to the advantages of the land taken.

If land is not the preferred option of the displaced persons, the provision of land would adversely affect the sustainability of a park or protected area, or sufficient land is not available at a reasonable price, non-land based options built around opportunities for employment or self-employment should be provided in addition to cash compensation for land and other assets lost. The lack of adequate land must be demonstrated and documented to the satisfaction of the Bank.

### 6.4 RESETTLEMENT SITES

The GoO has been quite responsive in identifying pieces of land at different locations for resettlement of the displaced population. Initially the GoO identified two resettlement sites one at Basantpur and another one at Rangapalli village about 20 km away from the affected site. Both the resettlement sites were located in rural area.

The details of the area is given below:

- **BASANTPUR:** This site is located parallel to the main road on the way to Chipilima. It is about 22kms away from the dam site and 8 kms from town Chipilima. NH-53 is at a distance of 2km from this site. This area is a plain and gently undulating land, without having any structures and trees except a few shrubs. The area of the land is 38.85 ha. In this site 650 families can be accommodated. This land is owned by Dept. of Water Resources, Govt. of Odisha.
- **RENGALIPALLI:** This site is located 1km inside from the main road and near Chipilima power house which is about 30 kms away from the dam site. There exists a metal road to the identified site from the main road. This area is a plain and gently undulating land, without having any structures and trees except a few shrubs. The area of the land is 118.81 ha. In this site 1500 families can be accommodated. Amenities like school, market and Public Health Centre exist at Chiplima within a radius of 1km from this site. This land is owned by Dept. of Water Resources, Govt. of Odisha



- **LARBANGA:** Two patches of land were identified in this village (Larbanga) to accommodate the families likely to be displaced due to project implementation. This site is located about 8 kms from the dam site on the dam road in eastern direction. This is a gently sloped land. At present this area is apparently filled with trees, shrubs, herbs and bushes may be due to rain. All trees may not be required to cut if the site is selected for rehabilitating the identified families to be displaced. Since this land is close to the revenue village Larbanga most of the service facilities are available very close to the site. However, this land belongs to Revenue Dept., Govt. of Odisha. 850 families will be accommodated in this land. The area of the land is 48.03 acre.

However, during 2<sup>nd</sup> level consultation most of the affected families disagreed to these sites owing to the long distance from their present settlement, They express their concerns about risk of their livelihood, difficulty in commutation to their work site and disruption of brotherhood relationship. They requested to find out alternative resettlement site close to their present settlement.

In view of the above, the GoO in consultation with local representative identified three more sites at Solpali, Solband and Garmunda that are located adjacent to each other and are connected with all weather road. They are nearly 3 km away from the proposed spillway site. All these three sites fall in urban area and are within Sambalpur Municipal Corporation (SMC). The Larbanga is also located in Sambalpur Municipal area is also available as a resettlement site option.

By and large these three sites have been accepted by the affected families. A brief description of each site is given below and the site map is attached as **Annexure-VI**.

- **SOLPALI, SOLBAND and GARMUNDA (at Hirakud, Within SMC):**

Combinedly all three locations have a total area of 55.21 acre and there are 28.30 acres have been required for establishment of resettlement colony will be accommodate all project affected 1,415 families as per approved packages, with extra area for other basic facilities. The families will be resettled here can get the benefit of existing common facilities such as School, College and public health centers etc. situated at Hirakud. Besides it, Project Authority is willing to provide provision of Primary School, High School, and Anganwadi etc. areas for future development perspective.

Details of the proposed rehabilitation site have been furnished in the below mentioned table.

Thus, six sites have been identified by Project Authority. After finalization of site with definite number of families by getting their consent, the area will be developed and necessary amenities such as road, water source, electricity, health facilities etc. will be provided prior to handing over plots to the affected families.

**6.4.1 Resettlement Plan/ Proposal for Basic public amenities and infrastructural facilities to be provided in the resettlement area:**

1	Connecting colony roads along with an all-weather road link to the nearest pucca road or BT road, passages and easement rights for all the resettled families are adequately arranged.

The rehabilitation process will be completed prior to implementation of project.

**6.4.2 Resettlement Plan/ Proposal for public amenities and infrastructural facilities to be provided within or nearby/ vicinity of resettlement area:**

## 6.5 INCOME RESTORATION/ENHANCEMENT PLAN

There will be adequate compensation to restore income level and sources for the different livelihood groups. Income restoration strategy (IRS) is required for the vulnerable persons who have a chance to lose their livelihood. As project displaced persons will be resettled in the vicinity of the current location (i.e. near by Hirakud) in the newly identified resettlement sites at Solipali, Solband, Garmunda and Larbhanga, most of the families would not lose their livelihood/ occupation as most of the families are either agricultural/ non. Agricultural/ daily wage/ contract labor or they are working in different private sector in nearby locality. However, before getting consent from PAPs regarding their choice amongst the resettlement sites a generalized Income Restoration/Enhancement and Generation Strategy has been drawn below with indicating different available Schemes. From displacement to resettlement, within this definite time, two types of IR and generation activities i.e. Short term and Long term activities will be implemented.

### 6.5.1 Short term Income Restoration plan/ activities

Short-term Income Restoration activities are intended to restore PAF's income in the periods immediately before and after relocation focusing on relocation and subsistence allowances, and providing short term allowances such as: (a) subsistence allowance; (b) shifting assistance; (c) promoting PAF access to project-related employment opportunities such as work under the project construction and maintenance contractors. The project authorities will encourage contractors to maximize positive impacts for women, ST, SC participation in the project by providing employment opportunities for them and conducting sensitization initiatives to the communities and include the provisions of work opportunities on a preferential basis within the contract documents.



### 6.5.2 Long term Income Restoration plan/ activities

Long-term options are either project financed or government financed. Therefore, Project will coordinate with District Administration including Rural Development, Tribal development and Social welfare Departments to assure PAFs access to all existing government schemes that can contribute to additional income including drawing upon the resources from Special Component Plan (CP) / Tribal Sub Plan (TSP). Besides, skill development/ vocational training will be provided to the PAFs by dovetailing with different existing govt schemes.

### 6.5.3 Existing schemes and programmes

#### 6.5.3.1 Odisha Skill Development Authority

There are several skill development schemes available in different trade/ field to enable self employment and livelihood restoration. Like, Craftsman Training Scheme, Technical Training Scheme, Modular Employable Skill (MES) by Directorate of Technical Education and Training (DTET), Odisha and Skill Development and Technical Education Department (ET&T), Odisha. Eligible members of PAFs can be linked up in such vocational/ skill development training programs as income generation and livelihood sustainability approach.

#### 6.5.3.2 Rural Self Employment Training Institute (RSETI)

Rural Self Employment Training Institute is a Government of India programme jointly implemented by Commercial Banks and State Government. RSETIs are non-profit institutions established with the support of State Government and Central Governments. The objective of this institute is to generate self-employment in rural areas through training for capacity building. These RSETIs are imparting comprehensive quality residential training programs in personality and skill development areas to rural youth free of cost. SBI has set up 116 Rural Self Employment Training Institutes (RSETIs) across the country as an institution to mitigate the unemployment and underemployment problems among the rural youth in the country. There are 17 centers in Odisha and there is one in Jajpur also. Rural unemployed youth in the age group of 18-45 are trained in these institutes. RSETIs provide short duration residential trainings on Skill development and Entrepreneurship. The trained candidates are also provided handholding support for 2 years post training. Odisha livelihoods mission (NRLM) reimburses training cost of BPL candidates trained in RSETIs.

#### Uniqueness in RSETI training

- Free Residential training.
- Training for short duration ranging from 1-6 weeks.
- Handholding to trained candidates for 2 years.
- Focus on Motivation and Self development of the candidate.
- Providing Skill and Entrepreneurship training.
- Candidates trained on preparation of DPR, trained on various facets of setting up and managing a micro enterprise.
- Support for availing credit linkage from banks.

#### Trades



- RSETIs offer different kinds of trainings. Every year the training calendar is prepared based on the potential of the district, market demand and performance of candidates trained in trades previous year. RSETIs offer trainings under the following categories.
- Agriculture based Entrepreneurship Development programs.
- Product based Entrepreneurship Development programs.
- Process based Entrepreneurship Development programs.
- General Entrepreneurship Development programs.
- Skill up gradation program for established Entrepreneurs

### **6.5.3.3 National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (NREGS)**

The beneficiaries (PAFs) will get 95 days wage as per applicable wage rate during construction of their house under IAY scheme. So, it must benefit the vulnerable category a lot to get Income generation source for a short term period.

### **6.5.3.4 Some of the other Schemes may be considered to link up are:**

- (a) Rashtriya Swasthya Bima Yojana (RSBY)
- (b) Employment State Insurance Scheme (ESIS)
- (c) Swarnjayanti Gram Swarozgar Yojana (SGSY)
- (d) Prime Ministers Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP)

## **6.6 PROPER USE OF RESETTLEMENT ASSISTANCE**



From the past experience it is understood that people utilize the compensation amount in unproductive ways that leads them towards impoverishment. People need to be properly guided on this critical aspect. Hence the RAP Execution Agency has a great role in guiding people to utilize the ex-gratia amount in productive ways. The PAPs should be guided appropriately so that they do not squander away precious ex-gratia amount.

### **6.7 PROVISION FOR COMPENSATION OF DISPLACED PERSONS FROM CONSTRUCTION OF MAIN HIRAKUD DAM**

In order to compensate persons who lost their lands and were displaced during construction of main Hirakud Dam, Government of Odisha has established a mechanism and provisioned a sum for this purpose. GoO periodically issues notices in local newspapers for persons to submit required documentation to claim compensation. These persons are required to apply for the same after verifying their names from list available in the office of the Collector, Jharsuguda; Sub-Collector office, concerned Tahsil office and Revenue Inspector office. In addition, those families whose DC Patta/Records of Rights (RoR) have not yet regularised or those who have not yet received homestead land as per rules, are to apply for the same with requisite documents/facts at their concerned Revenue Inspectors office, Tahsil office, Sub-Collector Office or Collectors office. Such notices will also be prominently displayed in the existing colony habitations. From the project's side, efforts will be made to put forward the cases out of the 119 persons identified by the census study as experiencing second time displacement.



## CHAPTER-7: INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS AND IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

### 7.1 INTRODUCTION

The chapter outlines the institutional and implementation structure for RAP planning and implementation and details the activity wise responsibility of different institutions.

### 7.2 INSTITUTIONS RELATED TO PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION

The institutions related to planning and implementation are mentioned below;

- Central Water Commission, Govt. of India
- Ministry of Forest and Environment, Government of India
- Department of Water Resources, Govt. of Odisha
- SPMU – DRIP, Government of Orissa
- Directorate of R&R, DOWR, GoO
- Revenue and Disaster Management Department, Govt. of Odisha
- Public Works Department Govt. of Odisha
- Office of the Dam Safety, Hirakud Dam, Government of Odisha
- Office of the District Collector (DC)
- Sambalpur Municipal Corporation

### 7.3 KEY INSTITUTIONS IN RAP IMPLEMENTATION

RAP implementation will involve multiple agencies and require coordination in execution of various activities. The Central Water Commission, GOI is responsible for overall project implementation guidance and monitoring. Whereas, Dam Authority will play an apex role through the State Project Management Unit (SPMU) established under the DRIP Project, Special Land Acquisition cum R&R Officer (Spl. LARRO), functioning under the guidance of the District Collector (DC), will support the RAP Execution Committee and RAP Execution Agency in field level implementation of the RAP. Composition of these two key agencies is presented below:

- RAP Execution Committee: This committee under Hirakud Dam Authority will be headed by Superintending Engineer. Other members will include: Special LARRO from the district Administration, representatives of SMC and PWD, other respective departments as necessary.
- RAP Execution Agency: It will comprise of R&R experts, gender experts, community organizers and other support personnel. The agency will support the RAP Execution Committee

Roles and responsibilities of these institutions by activity is presented in the next section.

### 7.4 ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES IN RAP IMPLEMENTATION

RAP implementation will involve multiple agencies and require coordination in execution of various activities. The Central Water Commission, GOI is responsible for overall project implementation guidance and monitoring. Whereas, Dam Authority will play an apex role through the State Project Management Unit (SPMU) established under the DRIP Project, Special Land Acquisition cum R&R Officer (Spl. LARRO), functioning under the guidance of the District Collector (DC), will support the RAP Execution Committee and RAP Execution Agency in field level implementation of the RAP.



A RAP Execution Agency will be put in place will shoulder day-to-day responsibility for the implementation of the RAP. They will mobilize and involve people in the project implementation, facilitate grievance redressal, look after relocation and resettlement, restoration of common property resources. They will be supervised by R&R Directorate and the Dam Authority. Further, GoO has an Administrator in in each district to manage after R&R interventions of the development projects. As per R&DM Department notification RDM-RRC-Policy-0014-2014/34160 DATED 17/11/14, sub- collectors working in the district have been assigned the duty of Administrator, R&R of all projects located within their area of jurisdiction. During the process of the survey the district collector, sub-collector, Tahsildar, Revenue Inspector, Land Acquisition Officer, have already been in terms of participating in the meetings with the colony people, discussion with the survey team etc. **Table 7.1** presents the roles and responsibilities of different agencies by activity.

## 7.6 RAP APPROVAL AND DISCLOSURE

The draft RAP has been disclosed by the DOWR on its website <http://www.dowrorissa.gov.in/>. The Executive Summary of the RAP has been translated into the local language (Oriya). Following review and approval of the Draft RAP by World Bank, it along with a translated Executive Summary in local language (Oriya), and a list of PAPs with impacted assets will be shared with each colony through public consultative workshops before implementation. These will also be disclosed on websites of Central Water Commission, Orissa WRD and World Bank (Operational portal).

## 7.7 IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

The Relocation and resettlement will be completed over a period of 12 months. Subsequently, rehabilitation, could continue for another one year. The relocation will be linked to the construction schedule that shall span across 30-36 months period. As per the indicative construction schedule, works are proposed to be undertaken in two Phases. Phase I will involve upstream area of hill near proposed Spillway Gate, i.e. First Gate, Cable Colony, Rolling Colony and Premnagar area which are located in the influence area of blasting. The rest of the area i.e. downstream area (near Spill channel, i.e. Laxminagar, Gujatal and Gandhinagar hamlets) will be covered in Phase II. Hence it is estimated that Phase I works will displace 300 PAFs, while Phase II will involve 1,115 PAFs. No blasting of the hillock



or dismantling of the existing spillway shall be done prior to the complete relocation and resettlement of all the households. **Figure 7.1** presents the RAP Implementation Schedule.

## CHAPTER-8: MONITORING & EVALUATION

### 8.1 INTRODUCTION

The overall objective of the RAP is to ensure that the PAPs restore and preferably improve upon their pre-project living standards. In order to achieve this objective, Resettlement and Rehabilitation activities need to be monitored so as to ensure timely and effective implementation. Hence, in a development project with a long gestation period, effective Monitoring and Evaluation of RAP implementation would be key to achievement of intended objectives and outcomes. In respect of planning, monitoring and evaluation the following institutions will monitor RAP implementation.

### 8.2 PROJECT LEVEL REHABILITATION & RESETTLEMENT COMMITTEE (PLRRC)

In order to intensify implementation and monitoring of rehabilitation and resettlement activities the Government of Odisha has formed “Project Level Rehabilitation & Resettlement Committee (PLRRC) concerning the particular project and the activities. The committee will be headed by District Collector with following members.

- Additional District Magistrate
- Project Director, DRDA
- President, Zilla parishad
- Chair Person of the affected Block
- Chair Person of the affected Municipality
- Sub Collector of the concerned area
- Tahsildar of the concerned area
- BDO of the concerned area
- LAO/Spl LAO/PD- R & R entrusted with land acquisition and R & R function
- Representative of Project Authority
- 5 members from affected communities including 1 SC, 1 ST and 1 Woman member

### 8.3 AT STATE LEVEL DIRECTORATE OF R & R

This is a state level structure to discharge and oversee R & R activities across the state of Odisha. They shall monitor the RAP implementation and provide necessary guidance.

### 8.4 PROJECT LEVEL MONITORING AND EVALUATION ARRANGEMENTS

Monitoring of RAP implementation will be undertaken at two levels.

1. **Internal Monitoring by SPMU, DOWR:** Firstly internal continuous monitoring will be undertaken by the SPMU Committee based on information provided by the RAP Execution Committee. The committee shall coordinate with the concerned stakeholders and monitor the implementation accordingly. Periodic monitoring and review meetings of different stakeholders would take place from time to time. Key progress indicators (indicative) for monitoring RAP Implementation are as given below:
  - establishment of required institutional structures for RAP implementation, M&E, grievance committees;
  - disbursement of ex-gratia to PAFs affected in Phases (Phase I and II);
  - finalization of site and allotment of plots;
  - relocation to resettlement sites including provision of amenities/site infrastructure;
  - Completion of relocation and shift to resettlement sites before initiating of blasting activities;
  - Incorporation of specific provisions in the civil works contract relating to: i) preference in work opportunities to local persons and ii) management of migrant labor
  - roll-out of livelihood support activities;
  - consultation meetings with PAPs communities around resettlement and rehabilitation issues; and
  - grievances received and redressed at each level





All of the data against the above indicators shall be segregated by gender and vulnerable group category. It will prepare and submit monthly reports to CWC every month. Progress Reports will be shared with the Bank on a quarterly basis.

2. **Concurrent Monitoring and Evaluation by Contracted Agency:** An agency would be contracted to undertake concurrent M&E of RAP implementation. The agency shall be mobilized within a month of commencement of work by RAP Execution Agency. The agency's team will comprise very experienced professionals in the field of resettlement and livelihood. Besides it will also include a which a civil engineer who can assess the quality of houses built and also the common properties that are being rebuilt/relocated. The M&E agency shall undertake monitoring and verification of processes and activities in RAP implementation and would submit bi-monthly reports. It would also undertake an end-term evaluation post RAP implementation to ascertain if the RAP objectives have been achieved. The agency shall identify gaps based on desk reviews and field visits and provide timely inputs for course-correction to RAP Execution Committee and RAP Execution Agency to improve implementation and outcomes. Besides it will recommend measures necessary to build capacity and also provide requisite training to implementation staff and other stakeholders such as civil works contractor. Some of the key activities would include monitoring and verification of:

- timely payment of installments to PAFs and prior to commencement of civil works;
- processes followed in dissemination of information on project and eligible entitlements;
- processes followed in allotment of plots to each PAF and relocation of PAFs as per relocation plan;
- provision of all ex-gratia amounts (towards cost of structures, shifting and house-building assistance);
- relocation of all common properties such as crematoria, temples;
- provision on livelihood support measures, trainings;
- provision of work opportunities to PAFs and other community members during civil works; and
- grievances received and redressed by level

While monitoring shall be a concurrent activity, impact evaluation of the project shall be taken up at the end of RAP implementation. The impact evaluation exercise will be carried out within two months of completion of RAP implementation. It will evaluate the RAP implementation – activities, processes, and outcomes; ascertain if there are any pending issues and make recommendations towards improvement of outcomes, if any. The exercise will be based on the key socio-economic indicators developed during SIA as presented in Chapter 3 of this report. These indicators will be further refined and improved upon by the agency in consultation with RAP Execution Committee. A few indicative parameters for Evaluation are as given below in **Table 8.1**

The total estimated budget for RAP implementation is **Rs. 95,41,35,308/-** The proposed budget along with ex-gratia package report has been approved by the DoWR, Govt. of Odisha (Refer **Annexure V**).

However, the actual budget for all above (including budget for registration and development of Resettlement site, i.e. all weather road connectivity, supply of water, electricity and other basic necessary amenities) shall be determined and finalised by the appointment of special LARRO by the Odisha State Government in coordination with project authority.



## CHAPTER-10: GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL MECHANISM

### 10.1 GRIEVANCE REDRESS MECHANISM

Grievance redress forums may be organized and its regular meetings may be conducted so as to allow people to put forth their grievances so that it becomes easy for the authority to find solutions. There will be a three tier grievance redress mechanism will be followed, one at the project site level, the second at the district level and the third at the state level.

First level would be a Project level Grievance Committee comprising representatives of the project authority, representative of R& R Directorate, district administration, Sambalpur Municipal Corporation RAP execution team and representatives of the colonies. The committee shall include at least two females from the affected colonies, besides the Gender Expert from RAP Execution Agency to better articulate concerns of female PAPs. Key functions of the committee will be to: i) record the grievances received, categorize and prioritize them and provide solution; ii) committee may undertake site visit to ascertain facts and status and seek information as necessary from concerned authorities; iii) fix a time frame to resolve the grievance; and iv) inform PAPs through SPMU about their decision to PAPs for compliance. The first level committee shall try and respond to each grievance within a period of not more than 21 days. If the complainant is not satisfied, the complainant can approach the second level committee.

Grievances can be recorded either in person, through post/ email, verbal or written communication through the RAP Execution Agency. RAP Execution Agency will also support illiterate or physically challenged PAPs to record their grievances. Grievances will be received at the Office of Project level RAP Execution Committee within the Hirakud Dam Authority. Additionally, RAP Execution Committee will set up a landline phone number to receive and record grievances. RAP Execution Committee shall designate one person to attend to these phone calls, record details, provide PAP with a complaint number and explain the redressal process and finally document it in a MS -Excel based Grievance Management Database. S/he shall then, inform concerned officials of the complaint for necessary follow up and action. Contact details (phone number, email id and address) of the Grievances Redressal Committee and Team Leader of the RAP Execution Agency will be incorporated in the pamphlets/brochures which would be disseminated among all affected persons.

The Second level Committee would be constituted at the District level under the Chairmanship of the District Collector and comprise representatives of R&R Authority, Project Authority, R&R Manager, Police and the representatives of the colonies. At this level, attempt will be made to resolve the complaint within a period of 14 days. If the complainant is not satisfied, the complainant can approach the second level committee.

The third level committee will be at the state level under the Chairmanship of Secretary, Department of Water Resources and shall comprise R&R Director, Engineer in Chief, Water Resources Department, Chief Engineer, Dam Safety, District Collector, R& R authority, R&R Manager and representatives of the colonies. At this level, the committee will take not more than 7 days to resolve the issue.

The decision of the Grievance Committees will not be binding on the PAPs and they will have the option of taking recourse to court of law, if s/he so desires at his or her own expense.

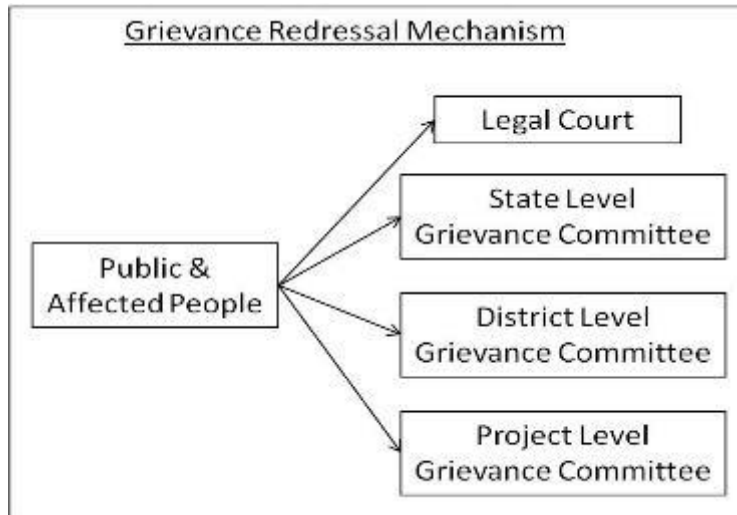

It was also decided to allow the PAPs to ventilate their grievances if any on the SIA study in writing in the office of the Executive Engineer Main Dam Division, Burla, Asst. Executive Engineer Left Bank Sub-Division Hirakud, & ADM, Sambalpur on proper receipt.

It was also decided that, the Project proponent shall hold regular consultation, meetings and discussions with PAPs at different locations by involving the district administration for proper and smoother implementation of R & R displacement & execution of the project.

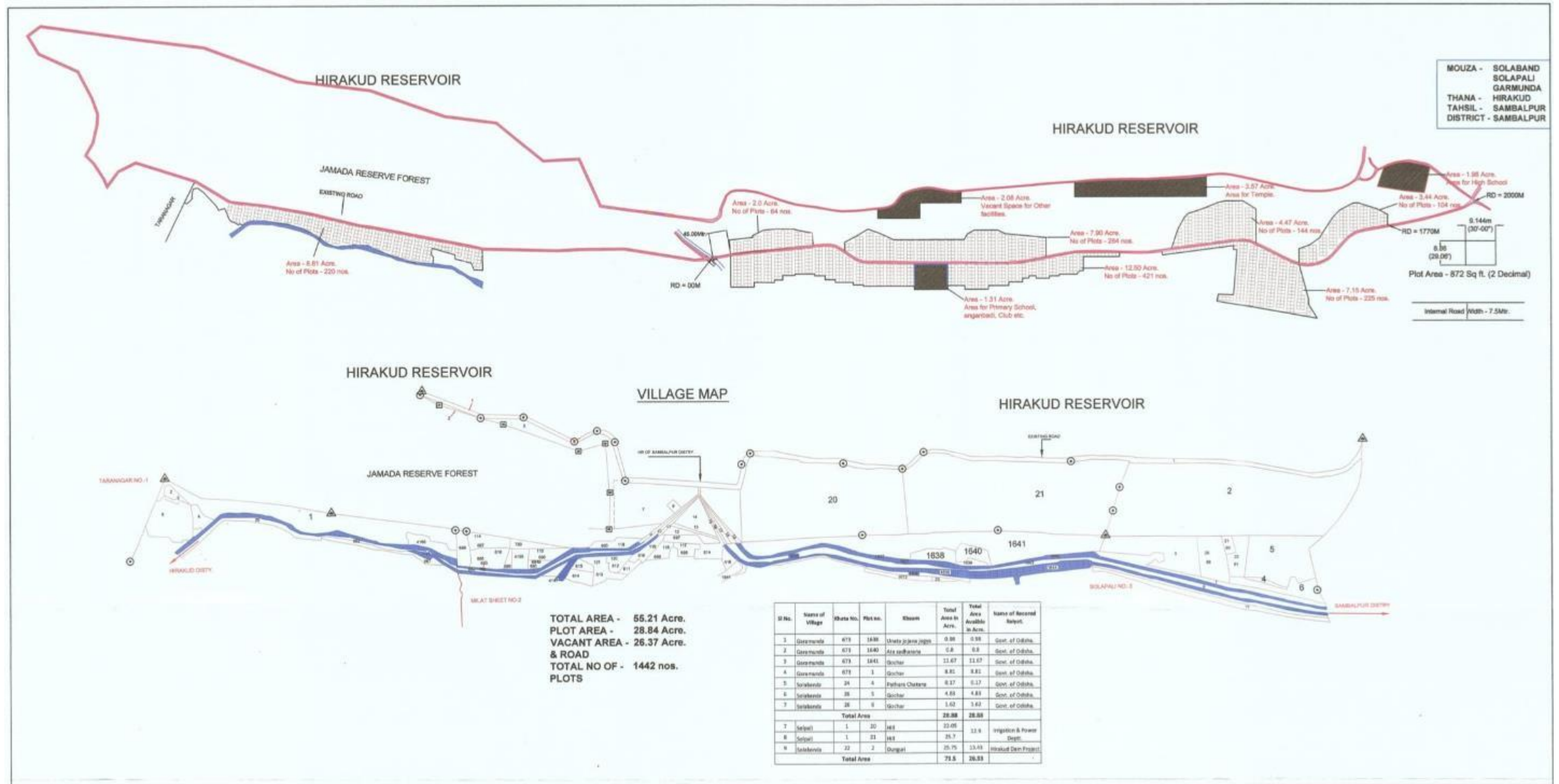

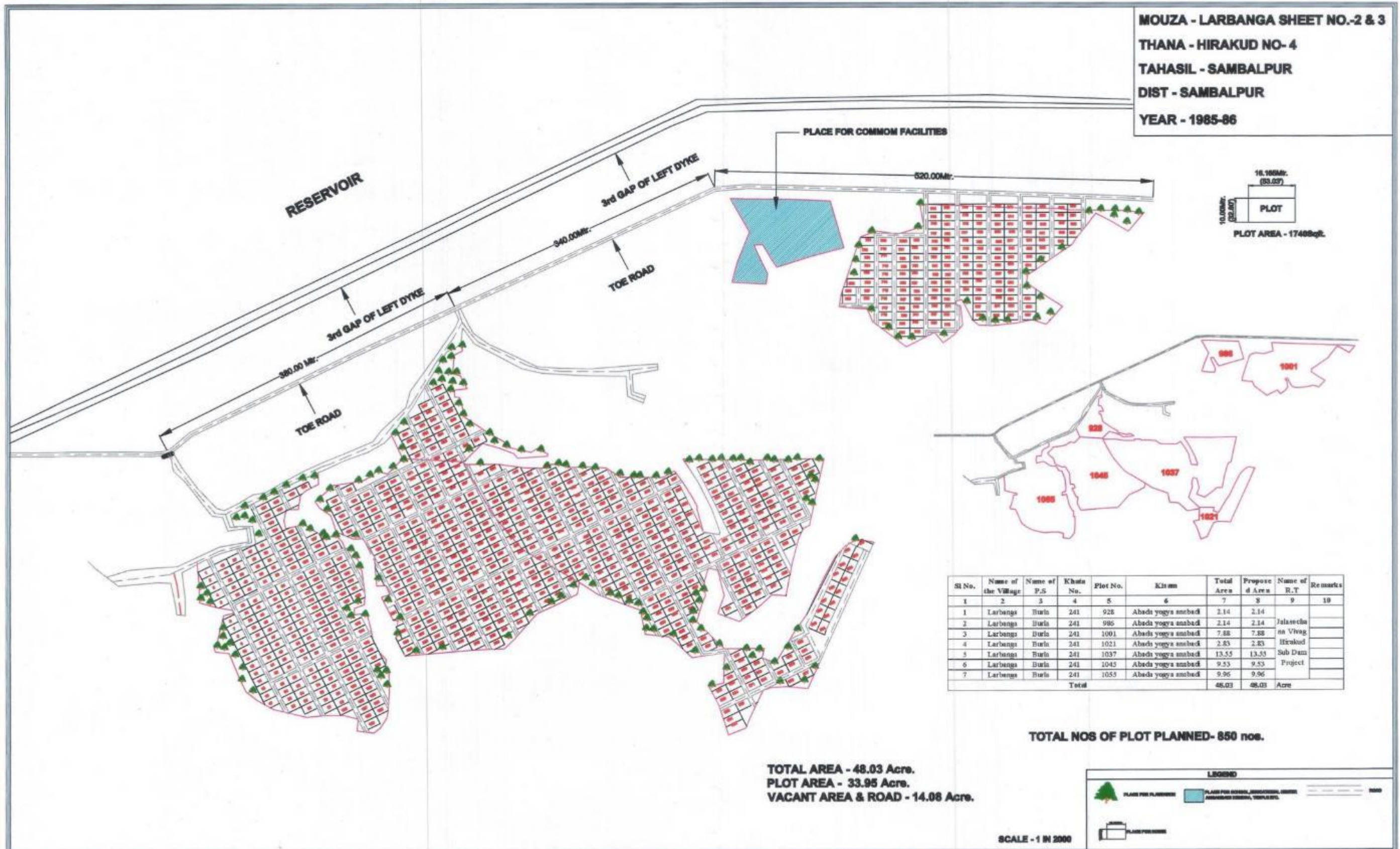

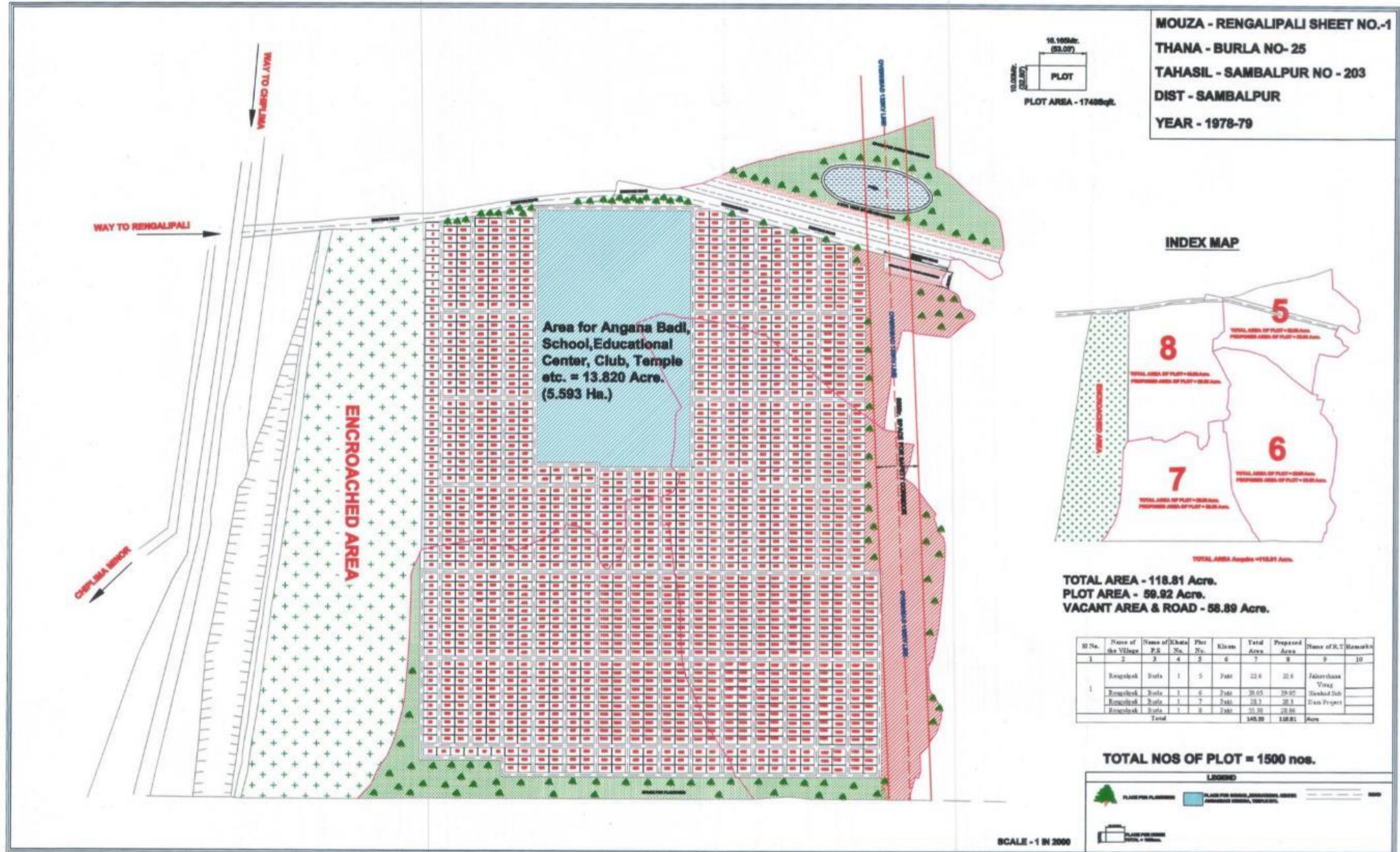


Annexure – VI: Maps of Resettlement Sites





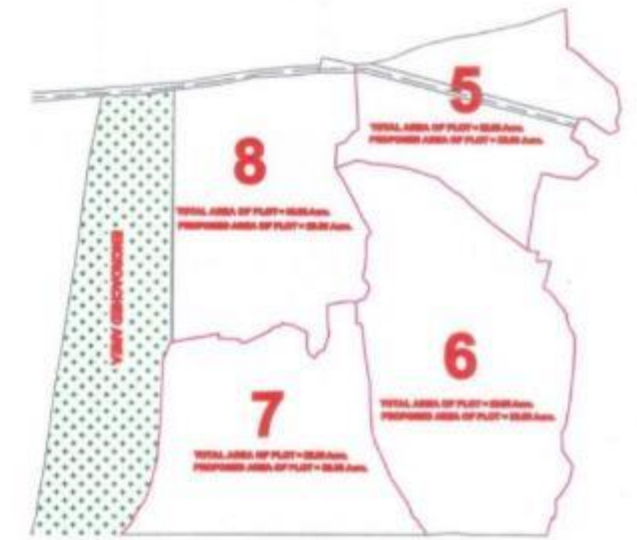
