II. OBJECTIVE AND JUSTIFICATION

- 2.1 The objective of the TC is to create a user-friendly platform for sharing knowledge, accessing indicators policies and best practices related to housing conditions. The indicators will be a combination of publicly available indicators, and indicators obtained from specific surveys, such as the ones carried by the Bank for the 2012 Housing DIA, Habitat for Humanity for the Global Housing Indicators, and HOFINET.²
- 2.2 The interactive tool will enable users to share indicators, knowledge and best practices to describe and identify the determinants of the housing affordability and other housing market characteristics in the region, including social housing and access to basic services. The indicators will contribute to the assessment of housing policy performance, the identification of priority areas for reform and donor investment, and the analysis of the impact of country reform efforts.

- 2.3 Key features of the web tool are: (i) the information provided (methodology used, indicators' reliability, validity and suitability for comparisons across countries and over time); and (ii) the creation of a community of users (peer-to-peer exchanges and bottom-up innovations form municipal and regional policy-makers).
- 2.4 The platform will showcase three areas of content: (i) a shortlist of featured indicators on an annual basis, defined as top five indicators; (ii) an easy-to-access in-depth selection of indicators on core sectors; and (iii) an open-source interactive community space for researchers, policy-makers, and practitioners to showcase and discuss their work.
- 2.5 <u>Value added</u>. With this TC the Bank will be the first donor institution to lead a process of global partnership in data gathering to benefit policy makers in the housing sector. The TC is aligned with Bank's GCI-9 sector priorities, as it will not only help support social policy and infrastructure development but also strengthen the institutional capacity of policy makers at the national and local levels.

III. DESCRIPTION OF ACTIVITIES

3.1 Component I. To gather indicators for the 18 cities in the region.³ The objective of this component is to have relevant and solid data for the housing sector. This component will cover the costs of hiring, reviewing, drafting, and translating services to: (i) carry housing market and policy assessment surveys in relevant countries at both the national and city level, focusing on cities of more than one million inhabitants; (ii) update part of the existing city level data processed from national household surveys; (iii) analyze the data; and (iv) draft policy papers in 2 cities. Component II. To create a platform. The objective is to have the Bank host the first interactive tool for housing indicators in the region. This component will cover the costs of designing and making operational a web platform to: (i) identify and feature five key indicators; (ii) organize and present core data by clusters; and (iii) build an online community.⁴

The 18 cities will be selected among the following list: Argentina (Buenos Aires, Cordoba, Mendoza, and Rosario), Bolivia (La Paz and Santa Cruz), Brazil (Belem, Belo Horizonte, Brasilia, Curitiba, Fortaleza, Porto Alegre, Recife, Rio de Janeiro, Salvador de Bahia and Sao Paulo), Chile (Santiago and Valparaiso), Colombia (Bogota, Cali and Medellin), Costa Rica (San Jose), Dominican Republic (Santo Domingo), Ecuador (Guayaquil and Quito), El Salvador (San Salvador), Guatemala (Guatemala City), Honduras (Tegucigalpa), Mexico (Guadalajara and Mexico City), Nicaragua (Managua), Panama (Panama City), Peru (Lima), Paraguay (Asuncion), Uruguay (Montevideo) and Venezuela (Caracas).

The five key indicators and the core data will be discussed and regularly updated by a workgroup of partners working in the region. Current members of the workgroup include: Habitat for Humanity, UN Habitat, World Bank, USAID, HOFINET (Wharton), Catholic University, University of Pennsylvania, Wilson Center, Cities Alliance, Millennium Challenge Corporation, IFRC, HUD, GIZ, Global Urban Development. The workgroup has been meeting for the past 2 years under the leadership of the Bank and is currently meeting every trimester to discuss individual progresses in systematizing data collection.
