Project Description

According to EIB's website, the proposed operation will finance cleaner, more climate-friendly and more diversified infrastructure project components across four municipalities in Heilongjiang Province (Jixi, Hegang, Qitaihe and Shuangyashan), which are currently in a phase of economic decline, due to their historic dependence on coal. The operation will include improved flood and water management, biodiversity protection at old mining sites, cleaner public transport and more energy-efficient district heating. The Asian Development Bank and the EIB will co-finance this project. The proposed operation will be structured under the Bank's own-risk Climate Action and Environment Facility (CAEF).

ACCOUNTABILITY MECHANISM OF EIB

When dissatisfied with a complaint to the EIB Complaints Mechanism, citizens can then turn towards the European Ombudsman. A memorandum of Understanding has been signed between the EIB and the European Ombudsman establishes that citizens (even outside of the EU if the Ombudsman finds their complaint justified) can turn towards the Ombudsman on issues related to 'maladministration' by the EIB. Note that before going to the Ombudsman, an attempt must be made to resolve the case by contacting the EIB. In addition, the complaint must be made within two years of the date when the facts on which your complaint is based became known to you.
