Project Description

According to the Bank's website, the project involves the reconstruction of the Sycdom household waste transfer and treatment center located in Romainville and Bobigny.

The future facility will comprise four main components: a residual household waste reception and transfer unit, a sorting center for recyclable materials, a port capacity on the banks of the Ourcq Canal, and a center of excellence in the circular economy. The new facility is expected to process 350,000 tons/year of residual waste, 60,000 tons/year of recyclable materials, and 40,000 tons/year of separately collected food waste. The project will incorporate strict environmental and architectural standards to minimize nuisances and improve the site's integration into the urban landscape.

ACCOUNTABILITY MECHANISM OF EIB

The EIB Complaints Mechanism is designed to facilitate and handle complaints against the EIB by individuals, organizations or corporations affected by EIB activities. When exercising the right to lodge a complaint against the EIB, any member of the public has access to a two-tier procedure, one internal - the Complaints Mechanism Office - and one external - the European Ombudsman. When dissatisfied with a complaint to the EIB Complaints Mechanism, citizens can then turn towards the European Ombudsman. A memorandum of Understanding has been signed between the EIB and the European Ombudsman establishes that citizens (even outside of the EU if the Ombudsman finds their complaint justified) can turn towards the Ombudsman on issues related to 'maladministration' by the EIB. Note that before going to the Ombudsman, an attempt must be made to resolve the case by contacting the EIB. In addition, the complaint must be made within two years of the date when the facts on which your complaint is based became known to you. You can write to the Ombudsman in any of the languages of the European Union.
