Project Description

According to the bank website, the project consists of the construction and operation of five photovoltaic (PV) plants for a peak capacity of 230 MWp in the municipalities of Budia, Durón, Cufuentes and Trillo (Guadalajara) and Toro (Zamora).

The project comprises the construction and operation of five solar PV plants and their grid connection facilities with a total capacity of c. 230 MWp. The plants are located in the Spanish regions of Castilla y León and Castilla-La Mancha. Once in operation, the project is expected to generate around 425 GWh per year.

ACCOUNTABILITY MECHANISM OF EIB

When dissatisfied with a complaint to the EIB Complaints Mechanism, citizens can then turn towards the European Ombudsman. A memorandum of Understanding has been signed between the EIB and the European Ombudsman establishes that citizens (even outside of the EU if the Ombudsman finds their complaint justified) can turn towards the Ombudsman on issues related to 'maladministration' by the EIB. Note that before going to the Ombudsman, an attempt must be made to resolve the case by contacting the EIB. In addition, the complaint must be made within two years of the date when the facts on which your complaint is based became known to you.
