

This CT-Intra seeks to generate an exchange of policies to reduce violence between Medellin and El Salvador. It will allow representatives from El Salvador to assess the impact of those policies in-site. Therefore, it should allow El Salvador learn from effective policies to reduce rates of violence, with a focus on schools. Given the multisectoral nature of violence, the activities of this CT Intra will include representatives from education, security and municipalities sector."
