This project will achieve its objectives by: (i) promoting best practices through gender gap assessments, training and policy recommendations and action plans for its implementation in sector institutions; (ii) strengthen the management and leadership capacity of women in mid-level management, through an intervention program that highlights women's leadership in the sector, (iii) coordinate and generate public-private strategic alliances for the joint promotion of gender equality , and (iv) systematize and disseminate the intervention model for its expansion and replicability in other countries of the region.
