The objective of this technical cooperation is to contribute to food security in the CAN countries by reducing economic and agricultural losses caused by the pathogen of the Fusarium oxysporum f. sp. cubense R4T (Fusarium R4T) in the musaceae crops (banana and plantain), through the implementation of coordinated actions at the regional and national levels. The specific objectives are to: (i) control the dissemination of the pathogen in areas that have already been affected (Colombia); and (ii) prevent the entry of the pathogen into new territories that have not yet been affected (Peru and Ecuador).
