Its specific objectives are: (i) support families in prioritized territories through the design and implementation of interventions to improve organization, provide technical assistance, and facilitate access to financing and markets (for either self-consumption or production in large scale); and (ii) increase the impact of interventions and reduce the learning curve through the scaling up of similar successful experiences in organized groups and families.
