These studies will collect information as well as best practices in potential new areas of collaboration with MOESC where key information is missing: i) programs to improve school readiness among early learners, taking into consideration special education needs; ii) public private partnerships in education for the provision of education, especially in the interior; iii) career path and in-service teacher professional development; iv) diagnostic of education management and information systems; and v) contents, technology and pedagogical approaches in secondary school.
