Project Description

According to bank documents, the project objective is to strengthen Sudan's national statistical system to produce and disseminate official data and promote usage of statistics for evidence-based policy-making.

The project has four components:

1. Institutional Reform and Human Capacity Strengthening
 - National Strategy for the Development of Statistics (NSDS)
 - Statistics Legal and Institutional Framework
 - Statistics Advocacy
 - ICT and Statistical Infrastructure
 - Human Capacity Development
2. Data Production and Dissemination
 - Household based surveys. This include National Household Budget and Poverty Survey (including modules on labor force and IDPs), and rapid surveys to track living conditions more regularly.
 - Improve price data
 - Revise/upgrade National Accounts
 - Administrative data
 - Data Dissemination
 - Use new technologies for data collection
3. Population and Housing Census
4. Project Management and Monitoring and Evaluation
